Bays Score Twice in First Half to Remain Undefeated In Western Half Flag Chase

Packers Topple Detroit, 14-0; Bears Whip Rams

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(DETROIT) - The Green Bay Packers, with six straight NFL triumphs, were more firmly than ever entrenched in first place today after pasting the Detroit Lions for the second time this season, 14 to 0, before a crowd of 30,844 fans here Sunday. Although the Packers were never pressed in recording their ninth successive victory over a Detroit eleven, they were a disorganized outfit all afternoon, only one putting together any semblance of a sustained drive.

START SCORING DRIVE

That was in the first period, within five minutes after the opening kickoff, when halfback Irv Comp pitched a 15-yard pass to Don Hutson, the Packers' "Mr. Record Buster", to start a 46-yard march for the first touchdown. On the next play Comp circled his own right end for 13 yards and a first down on the Detroit 17-yard line. Two incomplete passes and five running plays later the Packers sent fullback Ted Fritsch plowing through the left side of the Lion line from the one-yard line for the score. Hutson split the uprights to put the Packers on top, 7 to 0. The second Green Bay touchdown came with lightning suddenness with just 38 seconds of playing time remaining in the first half when Comp pitched a 30-yard strike to halfback Joe Laws on the goal line back of the Detroit defense. Hutson connected again for his 20th point after touchdown this season in 22 attempts, boosting his season scoring total to 50 points and his lifetime mark to 691.

ADDS TO RECORDS

Other league records increased by Hutson's three pass catches for 37 yards included: most passes caught (lifetime) 422; most yards gained catching passes (lifetime) 6,860. His league leading catching total this season was increased to 38 for 550 yards, more than twice the yardage of his nearest rival, Jim Benton of Cleveland. "Flatfoot" Frankie Sinkwich, the triple threat Detroit halfback who went into the game as the league's leading rushing leader with 288 yards, led the ball carriers of both clubs with a net 46 yards in 18 attempts. Tony Canadeo of the Packers advanced 35 yards in a dozen carries. Green Bay came out of the game with a comparable edge in only one statistical department - scoring. The Packers reeled off 11 first downs to Detroit's 10, clipped off 115 yards rushing to the Lions' 103, and advanced 112 yards on passes to Detroit's 93.

INTERCEPT TWO PASSES

The Lions, with Sinkwich pitching six passes for 73 yards in 15 throws, recorded a better completion percentage than the Packers, connecting on eight of 19 against Green Bay's eight out of 26. Two of Sinkwich's tosses and one by Bob Westfall were intercepted by alert Green Bay defenders. Each club attempted a field goal in the final period but neither was close, Sinkwich's effort from the 37-yard line falling short and Hutson's try from the 33 going wide. Detroit, with a season record of one win, one tie and three defeats, faces two straight games with the Card-Pitt combination, the first next Sunday at Pittsburgh. Green Bay is at Chicago next week for its second collision with the Bears.

MAKE NEAREST APPROACH

Detroit's nearest approach to the Packer goal line came in the second period of Sunday's struggle after end Dave Diehl scooped up Comp's fumble and was finally brought down on the Green Bay 48. Sinkwich drove for nine yards and after two running plays added three and a first down. Sinkwich pitched to end Jack Matheson for 23 yards and a first down on the Packer 13-yard line. Green Bay rose up to push the Lions back 13 yards in the next four plays and take possession on

the 26. Never again was Detroit inside the 20-yard line, though the Lions had the ball on the 24 at the end of the third period just before Sinkwich's futile placement effort. Canadeo and Sinkwich engaged in a thrilling punting duel during the third quarter, one of Canadeo's boots from the Lion 40 rolling dead on the three-yard line. Five plays later Sinkwich got away a quick kick from his own 24 that was downed by Matheson on the Green Bay three after traveling 73 yards. Detroit appeared to be opening a counter offensive immediately after Green Bay scored on the 12th play of the game. Art Van Tone, starting from his own 21, swung around the Green Bay right end and galloped 26 yards to the 47. Sinkwich traveled seven yards on the next play as the Lions moved into Packer territory, but Charlie Brock broke up the advance by intercepting Sinkwich's pass on the 40. Johnnie Greene of the Lions retaliated immediately by intercepting Fritsch's pass on the Detroit 35, and returning to the 41 but Detroit couldn't get moving and lost the ball on downs on its 45 by refusing to punt. The Packers, aided by a Canadeo to Laws pass worth 11 yards, pushed to the 32 but bogged down and Hutson missed a placement attempt for a field goal.

BAYS RECOVER FUMBLE

Detroit moved to midfield on Sinkwich's 14-yard run and his 12-yard pass to Westfall but Van Tone fumbled while trying to pass and the Packers recovered on Detroit's 32. Don Perkins and Fritsch slashed for a first down on the 20 in three plays but Comp fumbled trying to pass and Diehl raced all the way to the Green Bay 48 before hauled down. The Lions drove to the 13-yard line where they were thrown back to the 26 to lose the ball on downs. Canadeo punted and Detroit again shoved into Packer territory, going to the 33, where again the Packers held for downs. After a five yard running gain, Canadeo passed 15 yards to Harry Jacunski for a first down on the Detroit 47. Two passes fell incomplete and a stab at the line produced only two yards but Comp pitched 10 yards to Hutson on fourth down for a first down on the Detroit 35. Two more passes went wild but the Lions were penalized five yards for too many times out, setting the stage for Comp's dead-eye throw to Laws for the second touchdown. The half ended immediately after the kickoff and Green Bay had its 14 to 0 margin. Neither team could get going in the last half, though the Packers lost an opportunity early in the fourth when Westfall's slippy quick kick traveled only 10 yards before going out of bounds on the Lion 24. Three passes failed and Hutson missed his second field goal effort. That was the closest either club came to scoring in a rather listless last half played almost entirely between the 30 yard lines

Packers to Seek Seventh Victory Of Season Against Bears Sunday

PACKERS TO SEEK SEVENTH VICTORY OF SEASON AGAINST BEARS SUNDAY

OCT 31 (Green Bay) - Moving closer to clinching their first clean-cut Western division title since 1939, the Packers put their undefeated record on the block again next Sunday against their all-time toughest opponents, the Chicago Bears, in Wrigley field in Chicago. The contest should be one of the classics of the 1944 pennant race with the Packers fighting to come within one game of securing the flag and the Bears seeking revenge for the 42-28 defeat handed them by the Bays here in September. The Packer have a three game advantage over the defending champions, who have been all but counter out of the race by everyone but themselves. Coach Curly Lambeau's eleven has gone unscathed through six straight games while the Bears dropped two in a row at the start, came back to win two and tie another to take third place. A victory would put them in second if Cleveland loses to the Washington Redskins...IMPOSES STRICT SECRECY: Coach Lambeau, following a tradition set up when the two teams first met in 1921, has imposed strict secrecy on preparations for the tussle, No. 52 in a long string of arguments. The squad, he said, would go through stiff offensive and defensive sessions between now and Saturday. The drills began this morning after a meeting during which mistakes made in Sunday's game against Detroit were gone over. The Packers came up with their best defensive game of the

season against the Lions in Detroit. After going ahead by a touchdown the first time they got their hands on the ball, they resorted almost strictly to holding the Lions away from their end zone. This was particularly so in the second half. A second touchdown in the last seconds of the second quarter ended the string...SINKWICH IS STOPPED: Lambeau had praise for the defensive work of the club. They held Frankie Sinkwich as he hadn't been all season and also became the first team to refuse the Lions a point, thereby enabling their position as one of the league's least scored upon elevens. They have given up 69 points in six games, slightly more than 11 a game while scoring 161 or a 26 plus per game average. Another bright spot was that all those who got into the game escaped injury except for the usual bumps and bruises. The team will be at full strength against the Bears, who were extended in defeating the Rams, 28-21, after which they had left by a 21-7 margin at halftime...LUCKMAN RETURNS: Engineering the Bruins' attack was the Merchant Marine Sid Luckman, who has returned from a 7,500 mile voyage on a Navy tanker. It was Sid's first appearance in football togs since he played here in September. Incidentally, it may be well to recall that the Packers felt Bear power that day when they watched the Chicago team make a potent comeback to erase a 28-point deficit. The Bays resolved the deadlock in the last five minutes to win. A look at the league standings shows that a Packer victory would enable them to clinch the flag against the powerful Cleveland Rams in Cleveland Nov. 12. A loss would still leave Cleveland and the Bears with a mathematical chance for victory. Detroit and the hapless Card-Pitt combine are out of the running...TWO IN RUNNING: Cleveland now has three victories and two defeats while the Bears have two victories, the same number of defeats and a tie. The tie, against Detroit, may loom large before the season is over since it counts neither for nor against the Bears. It would, however, held reduce their percentage each time they lose. Consequently a Packer victory Sunday would eliminate their last chance. Indications were today that a crowd of 45,000 will be on hand when the oldest NFL rivals meet. The Packers have not won in Chicago since 1941, when they took a 16-14 thriller in the waning minutes to gain a Western division tie. In the series, the Bays have scored 541 points against 660 for the Bears.

45,000 TO SEE BEAR-PACKER DUEL SUNDAY

OCT 31 (Chicago) - This is festival week in the western division of the NFL with the Chicago Bears and Green Bay Packers meeting Sunday in their annual autumnal clash in Wrigley Field. It's a sort of Army-Navy game in the pro ranks. The festival part consists of a hunt in the loop for tickets. After a brisk sale yesterday at the Hub there still were a few remaining tickets for grandstand and box seats. Today 600 field seats will go on sale. It will be first come, first served, for the 5,000 bleacher seats which will be put up for grabs late Sunday morning.

All this will mean a crowd in the neighborhood of 45,000. For the first time in many years the Packer-Bear Chicago show does not have a red hot championship angle. Most seasons the Packers were trying to catch up with the Bears. This they did in November of 1941, 16 to 14, and the success caused a playoff in the west which the Bears won. Since losing to the Packers in '41, the Bears have played 17 league games in Wrigley field, winning 16 and tying 1. It is the 53rd meeting between the league's oldest rivals. The Bears have won 27, lost 20 and tied 5...LUCKMAN TO PLY AGAIN: The 45,000 will show up despite the fact that the Packers have outdistanced their old enemies by winning six straight, including a 42 to 26 decision over the Bears. The Chicago eleven has won two, lost two and tied one. This is the first season since 1940 that the Bears have lost more than one league game. In 1940 they lost three, but won in the west anyway. Unless there are unforeseen complications, Ensign Sid Luckman will be in a Bear uniform Sunday to help the Bears try to spoil the Packers' bid for their first perfect season. Never have the Packers won all their league games. They came closest in 1929 by winning 12 and tying 1. This was the beginning of a Green Bay dynasty. The Packers won in 1930 with 11 victories, 3 defeats and a tie. They came back in 1931 with 12 victories and 2 defeats...CANADEO WITH GREEN BAY: The Bears will begin workouts this morning for the contest. They came out of Sunday's 28 to 21 victory over Cleveland in good physical shape. Biggest task is to get Ray (Scooter) McLean in shape. He was in Sunday's game for only two pass plays and then retired because of an injured leg. Al Grygo, the Pennsylvania Pole who picked up a southern accent while playing for the University of South Carolina, made the fans forget about McLean. Al was the most potent runner on National league fields, picking up 144 yards in 13 rushes. this gives him 245 yards for the season in 27 forays for an average of nine yards. Green Bay also may have a serviceman in the lineup. He's Tony Canadeo, who is utilizing a 20 day furlough from the Army to play for his old boss, Curly Lambeau. Tony has been an important man in Green Bay's two more recent victories over the Rams and the Lions.

CAWTHON QUITS AS PRO COACH

OCT 31 (Brooklyn) - Pete Cawthon Monday resigned as coach of the Brooklyn Tigers in the NFL 24 hours after the club had lost its fifth straight game and thirteenth of fifteen in two years. Cawthon, who won fame as head coach at Texas Tech, said the Tigers had made a satisfactory financial settlement on his contract. Tom Gallery, general manager of the Tigers, said, "We have the second most expensive club in the league and although we can't always win we should give the fans a show for their money. This we have failed to do and hence the change even at midseason." Frank Bridges, end coach, and Ed Kubale, line coach, will be in charge until a successor is chosen.

LAWS - GRANDDADDY JOE PLAYED THE FULL 60 MINUTES AGAINST THE LIONS

OCT 31 (Milwaukee Journal) - The older he gets, the tougher 33 year old Joe Laws gets. Sunday, in the absence of Lou Brock, who is nursing a shoulder injury, the bouncing Laws, now in his eleventh year with Green Bay, played the full 60 minutes at right half...Don Hutson came out of the Detroit game Sunday with a badly bruised and puffed up nose...The dope is that Sid Luckman will remain in Chicago all week to work out with the Bears for Sunday's fray with Green Bay. Ho-hum...Hurry, Don, hurry. Jim Benton of the Cleveland Rams has started to threaten Hutson's lead both in scoring and in pass receiving. Hutson has scored 50 points, Benton 42. Hutson has caught 38 passes, Benton 23...Sunday's game between the Packers and Bears will be the fifty-second in their long feud dating back to 1921. The Bears have won 26, the Packers 20. Five of the games were ties. In points, the Bears have maintained a proportionate edge. They have scored 660 points, the Packers 541.

PACKERS TO SEEK SECOND VICTORY THIS SEASON OVER CHICAGO BEARS

NOV 1 (Green Bay) - Having proved to themselves that they are able to topple the defending champion Chicago Bears, the Packers will have one thought uppermost in their minds Sunday when they meet the Chicago eleven at Wrigley field in the second game of the 1944 series. 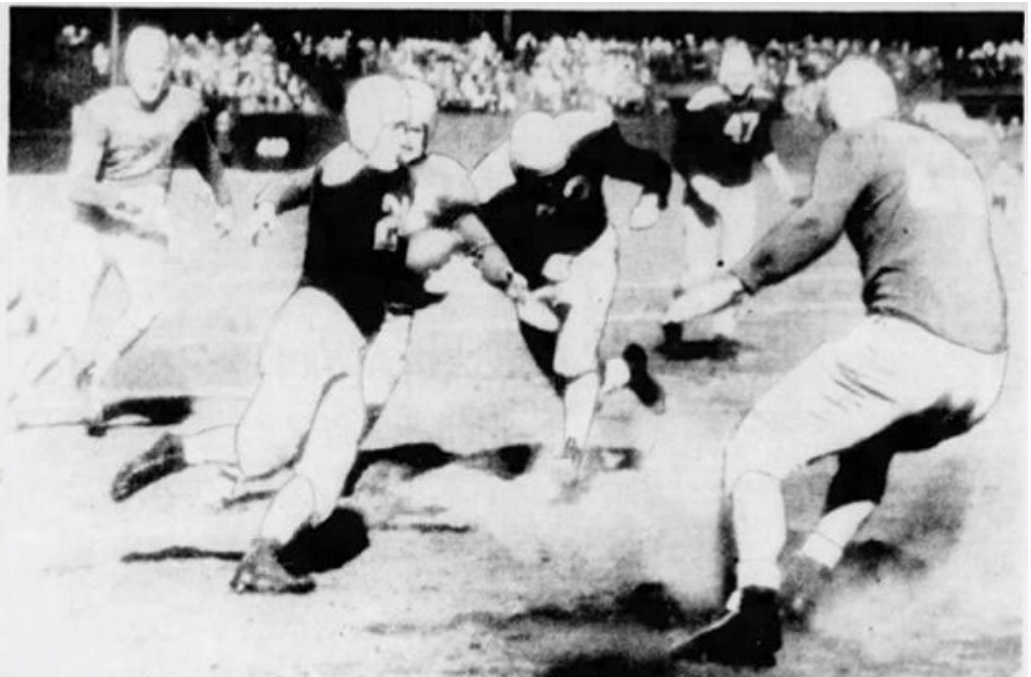

column of the Western division. The Bays have learned their lesson - that you can't fool around with the Bears and get away with it. This was proved in the game here earlier in the season. Green Bay roared to a 28-0 lead only to find the Bruins make a valiant comeback and knot the count at 28-all midway in the fourth period. Then the Packers moved ahead for good on a perfect play that carried 42 yards...SEEK RECORD SMASHER: Since in November, 1941, there has been quite a drought of victories for the Packers in the home field of the Bears. That year they unwound a last quarter attack that won, 16-14, last time they have been victorious in the ball park. They, however, are not alone since the Chicago team has won 16 of its last 17 league games there. The other was a tie. The Bays will be out to smash that record. Coach Curly Lambeau reiterated today, before sending the squad through two sessions, that the team's efficiency on both defense and offense will have to be 100 percent. The offense especially must come up from over what it was against the Detroit Lions last Sunday. The defense functioned extremely well, but the running and passing games were definitely not up to par...NO ADVANCE INFORMATION: Although he isn't giving out any advance information that the Bear staff can turn to its advantage, Lambeau makes no secret about the fact that the Wrigley field chore probably will be a no-holds-barred tussle that may result in a zooming scoring total for both teams. It is not likely that a deadlock will occur, as it has in 14 of the 52 battles between the teams in a series dating back to 1921. The Bay workouts are being almost equally divided between offense and defense. Long sessions Thursday and Friday will finish the heaviest part of the drills with a warmup Saturday. The team will leave here at 4:15 Saturday on the North Western road and will stay at the Knickerbocker hotel. They will return immediately after the game, arriving here at 10:20 on the Milwaukee road...MCLEAN TO PLAY: The Bears probably will have Sid Luckman with them.

With his quarterbacking last Sunday, they managed to take a 28-21 victory over the Rams. Also expected to be available for full-time duty for the first time in some weeks in halfback Ray (Scooter) McLean, who dashed 50 yards for the first score here, taking a lateral from George Wilson after an aerial by Luckman. There are other aces on the Chicago team. Gary Famiglietti, who had been lingering as an offensive threat for some time, finally snapped out of it against the Rams and was one of the standouts on the field. Al Grygo, the Pennsylvania Pole whose 66-yard touchdown dash in the fourth quarter, broke a 21-21 tie, picked up 144 yards in 13 tries.

He has averaged 9 yards a try this season...WILSON, BERRY POTENT: Two great offensive ends, Wilson and Connie Mack Berry, add power to the Bear attack. The defense is built around Bulldog Turner at center, Al Hoptowit and Dom Sigillo, tackles. Wilson and Berry between them have snatched 25 passes for five touchdowns against the same number of opponents. Wilson got two in the game here. In general, however, the Bruins' scoring has been evenly divided. The contest is getting the usual build-up in Chicago with an anticipated crowd of 45,000. The Packers will be in the driver's seat for the first time in several years and they do not intend to lose their advantage. Bear fans sense that the 1944 team here has the stuff to go all the way toward the pennant and they'll turn out in droves to see if their team can do something about spoiling Green Bay's perfect record...TRAFTON HOMECOMING: The battle will have another angle. It will be homecoming for Line Coach George Trafton, who will be making his first appearance against the Bears. Trafton was a bulwark of the Bruins' line during the grudge battles of the 1920s and had many a finger in the defeats handed the Packers on the Chicago field. He, like the team, more than ever now wants to turn the tables.

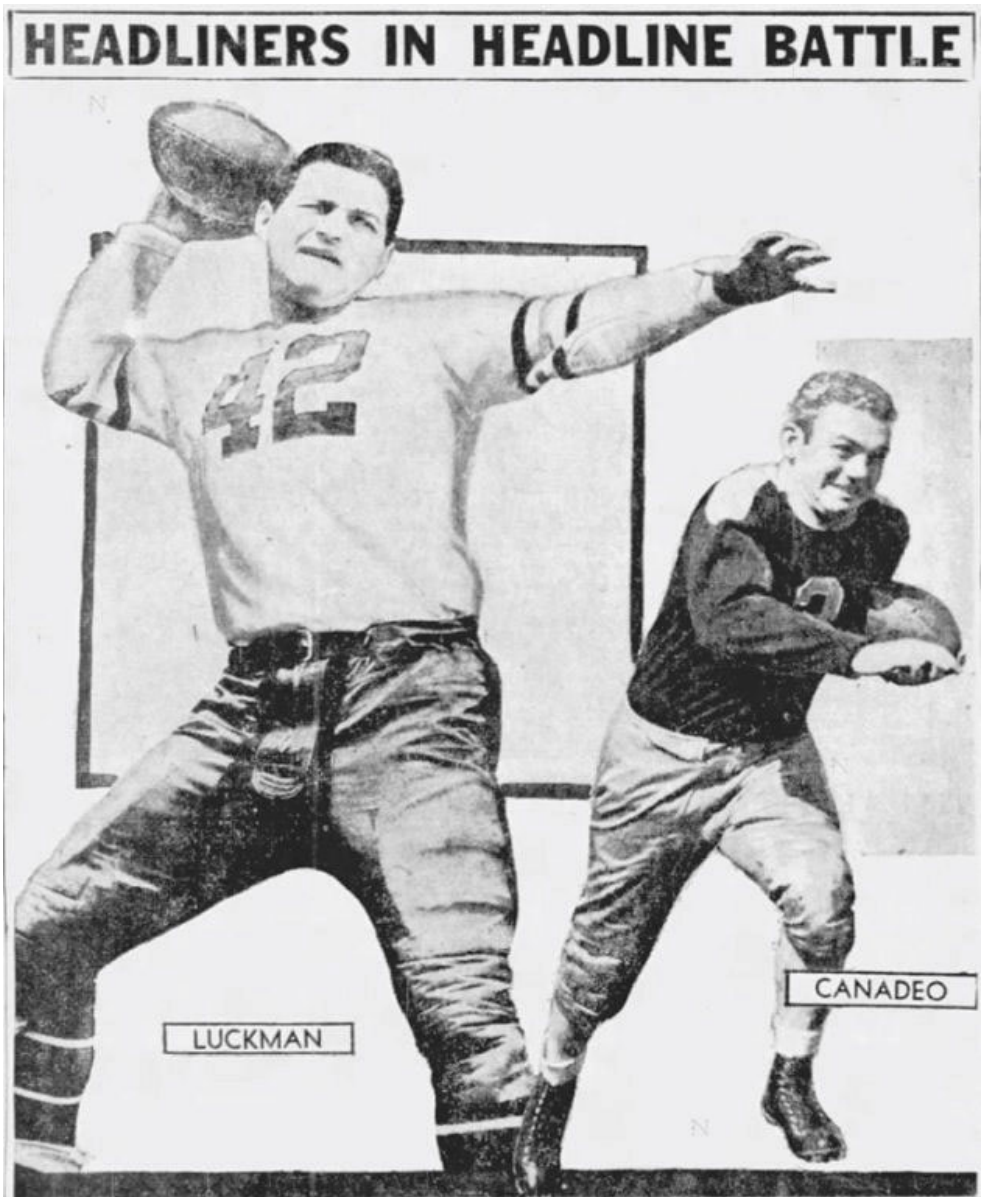
FILCHOCK PROVES PRO LEAGUE HAS NO INDISPENSABLE PASS FLINGERS

NOV 1 (Chicago) - Frank Filchock of the Washington Redskins is proving quite conclusively that the NFL has no indispensable forward passers. With a record of 58 completions in 93 attempts in four games, the newly found star of the Redskins is making league fans forget about such sharpshooters as Sammy Baugh, Sid Luckman, Davey O'Brien, Cecil Isbell and Arnie Herber. Filchock has turned the tables on Baugh, whom he understudied for two seasons before joining the

Navy for a two year hitch in 1942. Now Baugh gets in to pitch for the Redskins only when Filchock gets tired of blazing away. Frank has fired 10 touchdown passes in four games, and rolled up 821 yards in fashioning a top spot completion percentage of .624. After donning navy blue, Frank did a whale of a job for the Georgia Preflight team in 1942 and for the Memphis naval air station last season but was seldom in the spotlight. He was mustered out of service an ensign just before the current season began after contracting a stomach ailment in South America. Filchock, who still visits the hospital regularly for treatments, last Sunday hurled three payoff passes and eight completions in 15 attempts as the Redskins trounced the Card-Pitts. He has only had three passes intercepted in his 93 attempts. League statistics disclose that Frank Sinkwich of the Detroit Lions retained his ground gaining lead by adding 46 yards to this total against Green Bay Sunday. Sinkwich has carried the ball 96 times for a net of 384 yards, 30 more than second place Bill Paschal of New York. Failing to grab a touchdown pass against the Lions, Don Hutson of Green Bay saw his leadership in scoring and pass receiving whittled down by Jim Benton of the Cleveland Rams. Benton snared two payoff passes against the Chicago Bears Sunday to hike his scoring to 42 points, eight behind Hutson.

LAMBEAU CRACKS INFORMATION LINE IN BEARS-PACKERS QUIZ

NOV 1 (Chicago) - Later in the week the reading matter which follows would not be available from Curly Lambeau, because along about this time of the week preceding a football game with the Bears, the Green Bay head man scarcely speaks even to his mother, so deep is his concentration. Lambeau was reaching for the phone in his suburban Green Bay ranch house last night to call scout Eddie Kotal for the up-to-the-last-play information on the Bears when he got this call from Chicago. It was apparent that Curly would rather be talking to Kotal, who scouted the Bears Sunday when they beat the Rams, or continue sitting in his easy chair by the fireside and plan the strategy for Sunday's contest with the Chicagoans in Wrigley field...PAYS TRIBUTE TO LUCKMAN: But always gracious, he agreed to engage in a quiz contest, which went something like this: Q. - What is the difference in your preparation for the Bears than against other teams? LAMBEAU - I would say that we follow the same general pattern for all games - unless the Bears have Sid Luckman - whom, I understand, they will have for Sunday's game. Luckman is a great passer and a still greater field general and I'm telling you that we go awful tired up here waiting for Sid to leave for the service while reading about the McAfees, Standlees, Osmanskis, Artoes and Stydahars going off to war. This Luckman is the Bears' most valuable man and I'm including all those who have gone away in the last two or three years. With him in there it means we'll have to do a lot more planning than otherwise, even though I always say you must be at your physical and mental best to beat any Bear team, whether it's up or down in the race...RATES 1941 GAME TOPS IN SERIES: Q. - What do you think has been the greatest game in the series? LAMBEAU - Gosh, there have been so many! All of 'em have been pretty hot. I guess maybe the one that gave me the greatest thrill was that one in November, 1941, when we beat the greatest Bear team of all time, 16 to 14. We had everything that day. Q. - Do you recall

the first game played between the Bears and Packers back in 1921? LAMBEAU - Yeh, sure do. I played right half that day in Chicago and my old friend, George Halas, was at end for the Bears. As I remember it, they beat us, 20 to 0 (Right, Curly, the record book bears you out). They had lots more stuff than we did that day. Q. - What have your scouts told you about the Bears' Al Grygo, who gained almost 150 yards against the Rams? LAMBEAU - That was going to be my first question when I talked to Kotal. The young man must be pretty good and I suppose Ray McLean will be all rested up, too (Right again, Curly, the Bears are figuring on the Scooter much more than a little)...TRAFTON HAS NO SLOGAN: Q. - How is your line coach, George Trafton, behaving? Has he got a slogan for this game against his old team? LAMBEAU - Nope. George is like the rest of us. Got two workouts tomorrow. Then we'll have long single ones Thursday and Friday, loosen up Saturday morning, and come into Chicago that evening. Q. - How about Roy McKay, your hard luck rookie halfback from the University of Texas? LAMBEAU - It looks like maybe Roy will finally get a chance to play his first pro game Sunday. We'll make our final decision after watching him run tomorrow. If he's ready, he'll go on the active list, which means that Tony Canadeo may not play. If we used both McKay and Canadeo, we'd have to drop someone from the squad. And since Tony's furlough soon will be up, we can't afford to release any one who might help us clinch the western title and play in the league championship game against the eastern winner...SEEK FIRST SWEEP SINCE 1935: If the Packers win Sunday, it will be the first time they've swept a season series from the Bears since 1935. That year they won by scores of 7 to 0 and 17 to 14. Wrigley Field gates were locked yesterday and lookouts posted as the Bears started preparing for the game. Today Tipp Mooney will be fitted with a special pad to protect his injured shoulder. Its construction is such that the force of a blow on that spot is transferred to a lower region. Ray McLean still is a rubbing table case, with trainer Andy Lotshaw trying to run the soreness out of his left leg.

Packers to Gun for Seventh Straight League Victory In Sunday's 52nd Tussle With Bears at Wrigley Field

PACKERS TO GUN FOR SEVENTH STRAIGHT LEAGUE VICTORY IN SUNDAY'S 52ND TUSSLE WITH BEARS AT WRIGLEY FIELD

NOV 2 (Green Bay) - Fifty-one times during the last 24 years, the Packers have faced the Chicago Bears in professional football struggles that have become marked as the most bitter and hotly contested in the NFL. During the course of those years, the Bruins have won 26 victories, the Bays 20 and the others were deadlocks. The Packers will attempt to narrow the six-game margin Sunday afternoon at Wrigley field in Chicago. They will also be seeking their first double win over the Bears in one season since 1935, when they won by 7-0 and 17-14. Also in the balance is their winning streak, now standing at six games...OTHER TILTS UNIMPORTANT: But regardless of all this, the Packers want to defeat the Chicago eleven because they are the Bears. So far as the rest of the National league games next Sunday are concerned, they might just as well not have been scheduled for all the attention they will receive from either ball club. That was apparent in the Packers' camp today, and reports from Chicago indicate the Bears feel the same way. The end of midweek sessions for the Bays showed they are in top form although Coach Curly Lambeau stressed that the offense needs further polishing to give it the high gleam needed to outscore the Bears. Consequently, today's drill and the last long one of the week Friday were to be concentrated on that department...PHYSICAL CONDITIONS GOOD: Unless injuries develop during the workouts - and this is not likely - the squad should be in top shape. Halfback Lou Brock, who injured his leg a week ago Sunday against Cleveland, has been drilling with the team and may see action against the Bears. The leg injury of tackle Baby Ray, sustained in the previous Bear game, has cleared up and the veteran lineman should be ready to start. In addition to practice sessions, the team has had several meetings devoted to going over a comprehensive scout report on the Bears' tussle with Cleveland last Sunday. They also were the audience at several showings of motion pictures of the September game at City stadium. In other words, nothing is being left undone to prepare them for Sunday....MAY SHOW TRICKS: Coach Curly Lambeau is still maintaining strict secrecy about the preparations although there were signs that he has a few tricks up his sleeves that haven't been exhibited in the other six league encounters, when the Bays were powerful enough to roll up 161 points to the opponents' 69. The Bears, on the other hand, have just edged their foes, 118 points to 110. One thing is sure. The Bears have not lost any of their ability to break the rules and they were particularly unlawful against the Rams last Sunday. Several letters to Coach Lambeau have warned against the tactics, used to such an extent against Cleveland that four of the Rams went to the hospital with injuries. Coach Buff Donelli, a mild-mannered fellow, described the Bears' infractions as "Awful!"...BEARS BREAK RULES: The Bears have averaged almost 10 penalties a game and have been set back 449 yards, an average of almost 10 yards an infraction for 48. This indicated that more than half of the penalties were for such things as clipping, holding and the like. Without them, the Bears would figure they hadn't even been in a ball game. League statistics on the defensive and offensive performances of the teams to date also show the Packers have an edge in both although any comparison must take into account that they have played half a dozen games while the Bears toiled in one

less. Summarizing they are:...FIGURES ON OFFENSE: First downs - Packers 100, Bears 68; Yards gained - Packers 1,977, Bears 1,630; Forward passes attempted - Packers 150, Bears 105; Passes completed - Packers 63, Bears 53; Percent completed - Packers .420, Bears .505; Fumbles - Packers 8, Bears 13; own fumbles recovered - Packers 2, Bears 5. Offensively, each eleven has caused opponents to fumble 14 times and each has recovered five of the miscues. Defensively, the figures show the Packers have allowed their opponents 75 first downs while the Bears have given up 58. Green Bay foes have gained 1,437 yards and those of the Bears 1,171. The Packers have allowed 60 completions out of 149 passes thrown against them and the Bears have allowed 31 out of 90. In addition, the Green Bay team has intercepted 15 aerials and returned them 235 yards while the Bears have hauled in nine for 99 yards...LATERAL PASS CLICKS: One of the Bears' favorite plays - the lateral pass - has been used effectively this season, the record shows. On nine attempted laterals - one of which went for a 50-yard touchdown against the Packers - the Bears have connected for seven. The lateral usually comes after a completed pass and is a dangerous weapon. Figuring in plays usually are quarterback Sid Luckman, end George Wilson, the Bears' field captain, and another back - Ray (Scooter) McLean, Al Grygo or Henry Magarita. It was the Luckman-Wilson-McLean combination that pilled a forward-lateral in the second 1943 game that snipped off 34 yards and led directly to the Bears' third touchdown early in the fourth quarter. The Packers are working on a few stunners of their own. But they're working behind closed doors. The plays will get an unveiling at Wrigley field and not before.

GRYGO, WHO CRASHED LEAGUE BY MAIL, EMERGES AS BEAR STAR

NOV 2 (Chicago) - Al Grygo, the National league's top rookie sensation, is playing professional football because an induction doctor kept him out of the service and a friend in Georgia made a chance remark. Lastly, the 175 pounds halfback is playing with the Chicago Bears because they are the team of his choice. He'll be a marked man Sunday in Wrigley field when the Green Bay Packers come to town looking for their seventh straight league victory. The Packers have read all about Grygo, who got his chance when Ray (Scooter) McLean fell victim to a succession of injuries. Al is the league's most effective ground gainer with an average of 9.1...ATTRACTS EYE OF SOUTH CAROLINA COACH WHILE AT ERIE



ACADEMY: After three years on the University of South Carolina varsity, Grygo went forth in pursuit of a coaching career. He had reached Columbia, seat of the university, by a circuitous route with Erie, Pa., and Toledo, O., important stopping routes. As a member of the Erie academy team, Grygo played against Waite High of Toledo, coached by Don McAllister. "I was just a mediocre player," is the way Al, which is short for Aloysius, tells it. "The star of our Erie team was Bob Thurbon, now with the Card-Pitts, the greatest football player in the academy's history. But McAllister, who left Waite to coach at South Carolina, invited me down and I became a permanent resident."...FRIEND SUGGESTS HE TRY PRO GAME AND AL PICKS BEARS: After he was rejected for army service because of high blood pressure, Al joined the coaching staff at Olympia High in Columbia in 1942. Last season he was assistant coach of the Albany, Ga., eleven which was unbeaten and united and recognized as the Georgia prep champion. Scouts flocked to Albany looking for prize freshmen. One of the talent detectives, J.B. Whitworth, Georgia line coach, after looking over prospects, suddenly asked Al why he never played professional football. He laughed when Grygo suggested he always thought he was too light. "And that's what brought it to my mind," says Al. He wrote letters to five National league elevens. The manpower shortage being what it is, Al received five answers. And: "I didn't have to do much thinking to decide. I always had wanted to learn the T formation for coaching purposes. I've always admired the Bears because of their great record."...PADDY DRISCOLL,

WHO SHOULD KNOW, PRAISES HIS RUNNING: At South Carolina Al was called Twinkletoes because he runs high on his toes, and does a lot of footwork when he has the ball. "He's fairly fast," is Paddy Driscoll's professional diagnosis. "He's the clever type of runner who shakes off tackles by faking and dodging." The Bears' coaches yesterday started their campaign to whip the squad into top mental shape for the Packers. Most of the mechanical work was taken up on the varied passing attack which springs from the T formation.

PACKERS FAVORITES

NOV 2 (Chicago) - For the first time in several seasons in this series, the Chicago Bears will go into Sunday's game with the Green Bay Packers in Wrigley field underdogs in the betting. According to bookmakers the Packers are favorites to win by seven points.

PACKERS TO HOLD LAST TOUGH WORKOUT FOR BEAR TEST

NOV 3 (Green Bay) - The Packers do not ordinarily don protective padding for a Friday workout before a contest. but they did this morning for the first time in some years. The reason is simple. Sunday's contest against the Bears at Wrigley field in Chicago is not an ordinary game in the Green Bay book and every means of preparation is being used to obtain top form. Coach Curly Lambeau ordered the rough stuff because he felt that just one more session would put the team in its best pregame shape of the season. Asked whether injuries might occur if the boys forgot they were drilling against their own men and not against the Bruins, the coach replied that "we'll have to take that chance because we need the contact work." ...PACKERS SHOW ZIP: If the Packers continue to show the zip against the Bears that they have been displaying in drills, somebody (the Chicagoans) is in for a rough afternoon. Prying the lid just a little off the secrecy surrounding preparations, the coach indicated that the forward wall will be in the best shape it has all season. This means that position by position, the Packers will be two deep all along the line and three deep in some spots. The backfield is still somewhat off top efficiency but should be ready by Sunday. "Our timing on running plays is spotty and our blocking lacks split-second precision," the coach said. The Bays will get their final chance to run through all their maneuvers in a warmup session Saturday...BROCK WON'T PLAY: Offsetting the rosy side of the picture was the announcement that halfback Lou Brock would not be able to play against the Bears because of a leg injury. The injury has healed sufficiently to allow the veteran right half to work out but not enough to warrant taking a chance on losing Brock's services for subsequent games should he get bumped by the Bears. He did not see action against Detroit last week. To bolster the right half spot, where the veteran Joe Laws performed with 60 minutes against the Lions, Lambeau has shifted Tony Canadeo over from left half and Bob Kahler from blocking back. Both have been working on the new assignments this week. Roy D. McKay, former Texas player, will not be used against the Bears but will be ready, along with Brock, for the Cleveland tussle Nov. 12...HAVE PROPER ATTITUDE: Mentally, the Packers are reaching a high state of perfection for the 52nd contest against the Chicago eleven in the 24-year old series dating back to 1921. They want

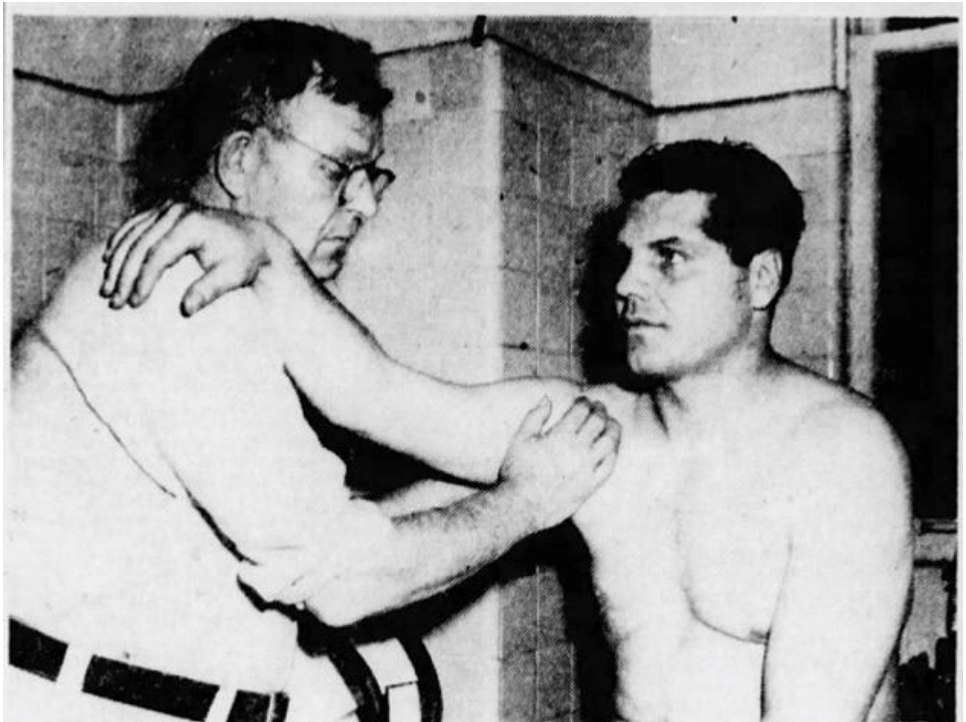
to keep their season record clear, rack up their seventh straight victory, and trounce the Bears for the second time this season - something they have not done since 1935. Coach Lambeau described the attitude of the team perfectly. He said, "We have a healthy respect for the Bears but we fear nobody, including that team. We have defeated them before and we can do it again." The players feel this way and they make no bones about it. It's a feeling of confidence but not overconfidence...BEARS WORKED UP: The Bays know that the Bears likewise will be high for this game. They began to work up to a pitch last week already and got into a proper frame of mind by all but committing mayhem on the Cleveland Rams, winning in the last quarter 28-21 on a 66-yard touchdown. The Bears were helped no end by Sid Luckman and he'll be around next Sunday. The two other backfielders liable to give the Packers most trouble are Al Grygo, who is toting a nine yards per attempt ground gaining average, and Ray (Scooter) McLean. The latter hasn't been used much the last three weeks but will be in top form Sunday following complete recover from a rib injury. Some 2,500 fans from northeastern Wisconsin will be on hand for the game. They will be in addition to 42,500 others to form a sellout crowd of 45,000. The Packers will leave at 4:15 Saturday on the North Western road. They will stay at the Knickerbocker hotel. Return to Green Bay will be at 6:20 Sunday with arrival on the Milwaukee road at 10:40.

SOME HOSPITALITY

NOV 3 (Green Bay) - When the Chicago Bear management asked for a telephone in the press box here, they got it without argument. But the Bears apparently don't believe in turn about being fair play. Coach Curly Lambeau asked for a telephone to be used during next Sunday's game at Wrigley field. He got the connection but he'll be sitting behind the goal posts in the 40-cent seats. "Typical Bear hospitality," the Packer coach growled.

BEARS HAVE OTHER LARGE PROBLEM BESIDES PACKERS

NOV 3 (Chicago) - Gary Famiglietti will start at fullback and Al Barbatsky at right tackle for the Bears Sunday against the Green Bay Packers in Wrigley field. This is going to be good, or bad, depending on the mood of these two giant fellows. Alternately during Gary's seven year career on the north side the coaches have cussed and praised him. They've been on the verge of giving up on him a dozen times. Perhaps the large Latin can detect this, because that is when he does an about face and then there isn't a better fullback in the NFL...OR FOUR LEAF CLOVERS?: During practice, Gary, head down, paces the football field much like a father-to-be in a hospital

maternity ward. In dirty gray sweatpants and a once cream colored sweatshirt that reaches halfway to his knees, he is quite a sight. Some one once asked Assistant Coach Carl Brumbaugh about Gary's strange meanderings. "I've got it all figured out," answered Carl, "the buy's looking for quarters!" Famiglietti wasn't looking for quarters last Sunday when he went berserk against the Cleveland Rams for 92 yards in 18 punches. It was this performance which earned him a starting job against the Packers. But the coaches will have their fingers crossed until Gary runs for the first time. If he takes a good yardage bite on that first thrust it will be a good sign that Gary will keep on running the rest of the game. Babartsky has been the problem child of the Bears' line. Last year the Chicago Cardinals all but chased the 230 pounder out of camp. The Bears, hearing that Al was in Coach Phil Handler's doghouse, and being very short in the tackle department, made a rapid deal. The Bears' coaches practically smirked after getting possession of Al, whose chief claim to gridiron fame stems from being one of Fordham's Seven Blocks of Granite, which is what the Rams' line of several seasons ago was called...LOSES JOB, THEN REGAINS IT: Changing uniforms had little effect on Al, for whom football seemed just to much work. On top of it, he was moody. At the Indiana training camp this fall, a great change was noted in his personality. He was friendly and became so popular that he was elected captain of the fat men's table. He started the season in his best physical shape as a pro. In the early National league games Al gradually lost the ground he had gained and lost his battle with Al Hoptowit for the No. 1 right tackle job. He woke up in the 21 to 21 battle with the Lions and was even better Sunday against the Rams.

PACKERS TO TANGLE WITH BEARS 52ND TIME SUNDAY

NOV 4 (Green Bay) - PACKERS VS. BEARS!

In those three short words is wrapped up the bitterest rivalry in the NFL - an enmity that will get its 52nd airing in 24 years at Wrigley field in Chicago before a crowd of upwards of 45,000 fans on Sunday afternoon. The kickoff is scheduled for 2 o'clock and on the outcome hinges the Packers' hopes for the Western division pennant. Just incidentally, there are four other contests scheduled in the league as it moves into the second half of the championship race. Green Bay or Chicago fans care little but the record shows that Cleveland will be at Washington, Philadelphia plays at Brooklyn, Detroit will meet the Card-Pitt combine at Pittsburgh and Boston plays at New York...PACKERS AFTER NO. 7: Green Bay will be seeking their seventh straight victory this season and the second this fall in the series with the Bears, a feat they have not been able to accomplish since 1935. But this is the year the club feels it can turn the trick. If they ever entered an opponents' territory to win a ball game, they're doing just that for this one. The Bays can accomplish two things by walloping Chicago. They can eliminate the last mathematical chance the Bears have for the Western half pennant and they can also immeasurably improve their position to capture the flag and with it the chance to play the eastern division winner in the championship game. With these incentives in mind, they should repeat their previous 42-28

victory...LAWS PULLS MUSCLE: Some ill luck has dogged the Packers' footsteps all season although the percentage column doesn't show it. The latest bit of woe concerns halfback Joe Laws, who pulled a muscle in practice. Fortunately, the injury is not too serious and he will be able to play against the Bears although he won't start as originally planned. The team's other right halfback and signal caller, Lou Brock, won't see action. Loss of Brock and reduction in the effectiveness of Laws puts the backfield corps in anything but its most powerful shape but this is not hurting the spirit of the ball club. Each player is convinced that the Bears are in for one of the roughest afternoons they have ever experienced. As Coach Curly Lambeau put it, "We're going down to win this ball game. That's our sole purpose in making the trip. Everything else is incidental."...CANADEO TO START: With Brock on the sidelines and Laws hurt, Tony Canadeo will start at right half and probably will see action at the other halfback post before the fracas is over. Others in the starting backfield will be fullback Ted Fritsch, Irv Comp at left half and Larry Craig at blocking back. The wall has been showing a ferociousness all week in workouts that bodes no good for the Bears' offense. The line, a bulwark all season, rose to defensive heights in blocking the Detroit Lions' attempts to score last Sunday. Continued efforts in that direction against the Bears will do much to decide the outcome...STARTING LINE NAMED: The starting line probably will consist of Don Hutson and Harry Jacunski at ends, Baby Ray or Tiny Croft and Paul Berezney at tackles, Bill Kuusisto or Glen Sorenson and Pete Tinsley at guards, and Charley Brock at center. Sorenson, whose towering kickoffs have been a feature of games this season, will start if the Packers boot to open the game. Otherwise, Kuusisto will open up. The Bears will be pinning their offensive hopes on the arm and signal calling of Ens. Sid Luckman along with the running of a quartet of backs including Al Grygo, the Pennsylvania Pole with the southern accent, Henry Margarita, Ray (Scooter) McLean and Gary Famiglietti. Grygo has been getting a lot of ink this week for his work against Cleveland last Sunday but all the Bear ball carriers are dangerous...LUCKMAN RUSH PLANNED: Luckman will have the benefit of his play against the Rams, first time he appeared in a Bear uniform since the game here. The Packers have a lot of respect for Luckman, whose passing apparently

has lost little of the sharpness that marked it a season ago. However, the Bay line feels that if Luckman doesn't have time to pass, his aim will be considerably mussed up. Their plan is to give him little time. In the line, the Bears have two top offensive ends in George Wilson and Connie Mack Berry. In the other positions, they are fortified with veterans although Green Bay has the edge there. It is likely that the Bears will start Dom Sigillo and Al Hoptowit at tackles, Al Zorich and Pete Gadauskas, guards, and Bulldog Turner at center.

BEARS RECALL 1935 AND GET HUTSON JITTERS

NOV 4 (Chicago) - The Green Bay Packers, who hope to sweep a season series from the Bears by winning tomorrow before 45,000 in Wrigley field, last did this in 1935. The main man in that double defeat will be present tomorrow and before any one starts a guessing game - he's Don Hutson. That was Don's freshman year and this first game in Green Bay, against the Bears, was the professional football debut for the skinny kid from Arkansas. Coach Curly Lambeau thought he had fashioned a secret pass play with Arnie Herber throwing and Hutson catching. But by game time the secret was out and everyone was waiting to see what happened. Green Bay fans had little hope that the secret play would be devastating enough to break the Bears' string of seven straight victories over the Packers...DON GALLOPS TO SCORE: The Packers received the game opening kickoff and carried it back to their 17 yard line. On the first play Herber faded back and Hutson went down the field rapidly. He whizzed past Beattie Feathers, the Chicago safety man. Now Herber, well protected, had retreated to his goal line. Finally he wound up and fired a high pass which Hutson took in stride on the Bears' 35 yard line. There was no one near him and he galloped over. The Packers kicked the goal and that was the game - 7 to 0. More spectacular was the second game played in Wrigley field. It was on such a day as yesterday - rainy and dark. Now, with 3 minutes to go, the stands, which were packed at the beginning, were half empty. Chicago was in front, 14 to 3. Even the diehard Packer fans were leaving...IT'S HERBER TO HUTSON AGAIN: Then Herber hit Hutson with a 53 yard touchdown pass and the Packers kicked goal to move up to a 14 to 10 score. Lambeau had taken out many of his regulars in the line, but Buckets Goldenberg (he'll be in a Packer suit tomorrow, too) pleaded to be sent back into the game. In he went with a few other first flight linemen. Bernie Masterson of the Bears caught the ball on the kickoff. There was a crash when Goldenberg bounced into Masterson and Bernie fumbled. Green Bay recovered inside the Chicago 20 and in no time at all Herber had pitched a pass to Hutson in the end zone. This one ended 17 to 14. Since then, the Bears have had what is known as Hutson jitters.

NEW PASSING PUNCH GIVES THE BEARS CONFIDENCE FOR SUNDAY'S PACKER TILT

NOV 4 (Chicago) - There was an air of victory confidence in the Chicago Bears' clubhouse Friday. A new one-two passing punch and newly discovered backfield speed has returned the jubilation as last year's champions await Sunday's game with unbeaten Green Bay. Sid Luckman will be back and will team with Gene Ronzani to provide the one-two punch in the overhead attack. Aloysius Grygo, who has gained 245 yards this season, will be in the backfield to spark the running attack. Grygo's added punch to the running attack became apparent last week when he took over Ray McLean's spot and ran his ground gaining average to 9.1 yards per try. He ran 66 yards for the winning touchdown. Ronzani first got into Bear lineup this game as a replacement for Luckman, an ensign in the maritime service. He had not played with the Bears for five years, and last year was a Bear scout. Since taking over Luckman's job he has completed 19 of 39 passes for 363 yards, including five for touchdowns. Against Detroit he completed nine of 11 tosses, including three for touchdowns. Whether Ronzani will be in the backfield at the same time with Luckman, Coach Heartley (Hunk) Anderson would not say, but he did hint there would be some surprises in the Bears' overhead attack with two passers available. The Packers will be in top form for this meeting of the league's bitterest rivals, but they face their toughest game of the year, despite their earlier 42-28 victory at Green Bay. Wrigley field's 45,000 seats have been sold out for the game for several days.

GREEN BAY PACKERS ARE SLIGHT FAVORITES

NOV 5 (Chicago) - The Green Bay Packers, winner of six straight games in the western division of the National pro football league, tugged at their tethers here Saturday night to get at the Bears at Wrigley field Sunday afternoon and the chance to sew up, for all practical purposes, the championship in this end of the league. A victory over the Bears Sunday, which would be their second of the season over the Halas men and their first sweep of both game in the annual home and home series since 1935, would leave the men of Lambeau U in the enviable position of having at least a two game edge on every other rival in the western end, with only three games left, and possibly a three game edge depending upon the outcome of Washington-Cleveland game at Washington. A defeat, however, would whittle Green Bay's advantage to one game, and with tough games with Cleveland and New York still left, the Packers again would have a stretch fight on their hands. The Packers were primed for their effort Sunday. Having taken last week's game with the Detroit Lions more or less in stride, they were in excellent physical shape and high spirits except for Lou Brock, veteran right halfback, who was injured in the Cleveland game two weeks ago, who did not even make the trip to Detroit last week, and who may not get into the game Sunday. Without him, the starting burden, and a lot more, will again rest on the veteran Joe Laws who, despite his 33 years and 11 years of service with Green Bay, played the full 60 minutes at right half against the Detroit Lions last Sunday. Except for Brock, though, the cripples of recent weeks have all recovered: Baby Ray, Irv Comp, Paul Berezney, Pete Tinsley. The whole team has fired up all week and appeared ready Saturday night for one of its best efforts of the season. In the first game at Green Bay six weeks ago, the Packers won, 42-28, breaking a 28-28 tie with two touchdowns in the last five

minutes. The Packers ruled only slight favorites Saturday night however. The Bears, after a shaky start in which they lost to both the Packers and Cleveland rams, have righted themselves and last Sunday, in a return game, obtained revenge on the Rams with their best game of the fall. With Sid Luckman back in the lineup, they, too, were primed Saturday night to square the season's account with Green bay. In addition to Luckman, the Bears will have Scooter McLean back Sunday. McLean was held out of the game with the Rams a week ago because of a chest injury. The bitter rivalry between the teams has assured a sellout crowd of 45,000. The park, except for bleacher seats which will go on sale Sunday morning, was sold out more than a week ago. Sunday's game will be one of a full schedule of five. In others, Washington ruled a slight favorite over the crippled Rams at Washington. New York a two touchdown favorite over the Boston Yankees at New York, Philadelphia a three touchdown favorite over the Brooklyn Tigers at Brooklyn, and the Detroit Lions a two touchdown favorite over the Card-Pitts at Detroit. The Brooklyn Tigers will be making their first start under Co-Coaches Ed Kubale and Frank Bridges, who took over upon the resignation of Pete Cawthon early in the week.

44,000 TO SEE BEARS BATTLE PACKERS TODAY

NOV 5 (Chicago) - Champions to be, the Green Bay Packers come to town today hoping to keep their spotless NFL record intact, but a mite fearful this may be the day where they'll get their lumps from the Chicago Bears. It's a strange setup for the 44,000 fans who will jam Wrigley field in wet or dry weather. Usually when Curly Lambeau brings his warriors to Chicago for the annual November date with the Bears they are in a desperate position, needing a victory to get back in the running...DIFFERENT TALE TODAY: It's so different today that even a Bear victory, which is not improbable, will do little more than ruffle the pride of the Packers. They've won their first six league games and, with four to go, even a loss will only delay the clinching of their first Western championship since 1939. The Bears are all but mathematically out of the running with two victories, two defeats and a tie. Green Bay could lose today, drop one of its other three games, and still win as far as the Bears are concerned. Though the championship angle's lacking, it won't lessen the tempo of the game. Almost everything the Bears have proudly protected during their big years has been smashed this season, but they still have one item in their protective custody - an unbeaten record in Wrigley field since they lost to Green Bay in November, 1941. Since then they've won 16 league games and two league championship contests in 19 games. The other one, two weeks ago, was a 21 to 21 deadlock with the Detroit Lions...PACKERS BIGGEST HURDLE: This, then, is about all the one time masters of professional football are defending today, unless it is what they consider an inalienable right to smack down the Packers on sight. This they didn't do in Green Bay last September and the Bears never recovered from that 42 to 28 blow, their most humiliating whipping in 52 games in the series which started in 1921. Today's hurdle is the biggest one left for the Packers, who are heading for their first unbeaten campaign. After the Bears, Green Bay meets Cleveland, New York and the Card-Pitts. The Card-Pitt game, last on the Packers' schedule, will be played in Chicago on Nov. 26...SID OUTSHADOWS OTHERS: It's revenge day for Sid Luckman, who was in the Bears' lineup when they lost in Green Bay last September. He saw the Packers take a 28 to 0 lead and then drove the Chicagoans back into a 28 to 28 tie. The Bears might have won but for a penalty at a crucial point late in the game. Luckman will be passing against Irv Comp, Lou Brock, and, perhaps, Tony Canadeo. None of the three can compare with Sid in this department, but each of the three is a running threat from the tailback spot. Mixed in with Luckman's pitches will be power driving by Gary Famiglietti and Jim Fordham, and slicing runs and sweeps by freshmen Al Grygo, Bob Margarita and Tipp Mooney. Ray McLean may be used as a spot player, but a pinched nerve in his leg still is bothering him...INSTRUCTIONS FOR FANS: Because there is little maneuvering space for fans in front of the Wrigley field gates, suggestions have been advanced to expedite the movement through the turnstiles. There are three gates, No. 1 at Addison st. and Sheffield Ave.; No. 2 at Addison and Clark sts., and No. 3 at Waveland av. Gate numbers are marked on each ticket. It also has been suggested that holders of season tickets tear out the Green Bay ticket and have it ready to present to the gate man. Andy Frain, head of the usher corps, said this little item would save several minutes in handling the crowd. The gates will be opened at 11:30 a.m. Sale of 5,000 bleacher tickets will start at 11 a.m. on a first come, first served basis. Notice something strange about this story? No mention of Don Hutson? Right. Mr. Hutson will play left end for the Packers.
