Parilli Tosses 4 TD Passes As Packers Post 1st Victory

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(GREEN BAY) - The best thing that could have happened to the Packers happened at City stadium Sunday. They won! It wasn't easy - this first 1958 NFL victory and the second league triumph in the new stadium in six games. The Packers had a third-quarter, 38 to 14 lead on the Philadelphia Eagles and then relaxed and got conservative. That was near suicide because the Eagles, with Norm Van Brocklin threading a needle, scored three quick touchdowns in the last quarter to produce the final 38 to 35 count. It took recovery of an onside kickoff by Ray Nitschke in the last minute to preserve the win.

COLTS ARE NEXT

The Packers, now thoroughly convinced that they can score and win, take on the Colts in Baltimore next Sunday. It's a particularly juicy assignment since (1) the Colts are unbeaten and (2) the Bays lost a heart-breaker to this same outfit two weeks ago. The difference in Sunday's 73-point, 10-touchdown scorcher turned out to be a 30-yard field goal by Paul Hornung at the 10:47 mark of the first quarter. There was little indication then that each team would follow with five touchdowns. With Babe Parilli making his first start at quarterback this season and going the distance, the Packers ripped into a 17-14 halftime edge and then blasted out three touchdowns - all on Parilli passes - in the third period for the big 38-14 edge. That broke a 10-game third-quarter scoring drought for the Packers; the last time Green Bay scored in the third period of a league game was Don McIlhenny's 41-yard touchdown run of the New York game here last year. The Bays' point total was their highest in 24 league games,

the best previous mark being 42 in a triumph over Los Angeles in the fourth game of 1956. Parilli and Van Brocklin hooked up in a stirring touchdown-passing duel, the two of them hurling seven scoring passes - just three under the league record. The Babe had the edge with four - two to Max McGee and one each to Al Carmichael and Gary Knafelc. Van hit Tommy McDonald twice; Gene Mitcham once. Parilli completed six out of eight passes and three for touchdowns - 14 yards to Carmichael, 10 to Knafelc and 25 to McGee - in the Packers' 21-point third period. The Packers worked 22 plays in the big frame against the Eagles' 10. **COMPLETES 12**

The fourth quarter was an opposite "oucher". Van Brocklin attempted 17 passes and completed 12, setting up Billy Wells' 3-yard TD dash with five completions and pitching 15 yards to Gene Mitcham for the fourth touchdown and 20 yards to Tommy McDonald for the final TD with 54 seconds left in the game. The Eagles had 21 plays in the final period; the Packers 12. With the Eagles running wild in the final frame, the Packers could be credited with only three quarters of football. The Eagles got into Green Bay territory only twice in the first three quarters and they scored both times - the first on a 70-yard touchdown run by Billy Barnes in the second period to cut Green Bay's lead to 10-7, and the second on a 9-play, 69-yard touchdown drive just before the half. Van Brocklin hurled eight yards to McDonald for the final 8 and a 17-14 halftime lead. Thus, for three frames, the Packers' defense was extremely tough and the offense provided invaluable help with five touchdowns. But Van Brocklin gained 214 yards with 16 completions in 24 attempts in the second half, giving him 22 out of 39 and 293 for the day. Those figures are frightening. The Eagles added 118 yards rushing, making the total yardage 411.


14 COMPLETIONS

Parilli had 14 completions in 25 tries for 225 yards, including seven out of 15 for 107 in the first half, and the Packers added 127 yards rushing for a 326 total. The Packers were alert in those first three frames, recovering two fumbles - the first by Dave Hanner

to set up the Hornung field goal and the second by Tom Bettis to set up a touchdown in the third period. The Bays also grabbed two Van Brocklin passes in the first three periods. Bobby Dillon had both of the interceptions, one setting up at a touchdown in the third period. McGee had himself quite an afternoon, catching six passes for 100 yards, two for TDs, and averaging 48.2 on five punts. Billy Howton caught four and Knafelc and Carmichael two each. **SECOND LIFE**

Hornung got a second life in the first quarter. His attempt for a 3-pointer from the 35 was short and wide but on the Eagles' first play Hanner recovered Barnes' fumble on the Eagle 21. A light rain fell as Hornung connected on the "winning" field goal from the 30. The Packers got possession on their own 39, from where they scored in five plays in the second quarter. Parilli hit McGee straight down the middle for the touchdown from the Eagle 36. Hornung converted the first of five extra points. Three plays later it was 10-7 as Barnes broke out of two groups of Packer tacklers around his own left end and scrambled 70 yards to a touchdown. Bobby Walston hit the first of his five PATs. **MOVE 52 YARDS**

The Bays then moved 52 yards in 10 plays for a 17-7 lead. Ferguson crashed into the end zone from the two with 2:29 left in the half. Van Brocklin opened up with his passing and drove the Eagles 69 yards in nine plays for a touchdown, with McDonald catching the TD in the end zone from eight yards for 17-14. It was 24-14 early in the third stanza. Parilli completed three passes - to Carmichael for 13, Howton for seven and finally to Carmichael under the uprights on a rollout for 14 yards and the TD.



HITS KNAFELC

Parilli hit Knafelc again from the 10 for a touchdown, Gary making a good catch under the uprights with Riley on his back. The Packers forced Van to punt and they started on their own 44, moving 56 yards in seven plays for the 38-14 count on the final play of the third period. From the 25 Parilli passed to McGee in the corner of the end zone for the touchdown. Now it was the Eagles' turn - as the fourth frame opened and the Packers sat back. The Eagles started off with a 68-yard march in 12 plays. Wells went over from the three.

MOVE 66 YARDS

Later the visitors moved 66 yards in four plays. From the Packer 15 Van hit Mitcham for the touchdown. It was no 38-28 and 3:30 left. McGee had a first down pass in his mitts but dropped it on a third down play so he had to punt with 1:53 left. Van Brocklin went to work and moved 51 yards in four plays for a touchdown. He fired to McDonald for the touchdown. The huge crowd sat stunned as Bielski prepared for an onside kick. His boot trailed off to his left and the Bays, seven playing up close, scrambled for the ball, with Nitschke recovering on the Packer 49. Parilli ran one quarterback sneak before the game ended.

PLAYED BETTER IN COLT GAME

OCT 26 (Green Bay) - Scooter McLean and his Packers were a quiet lot after their first victory of the season here Sunday. They were "thankful" for winning, but dissatisfied with their "conservative" play in the fourth quarter. "Sure, it feels good to finally win," McLean said in the Packer dressing room. "But it was by no means our best game. Why, we played three times as good against the Colts - defensively, I mean." The Packer boss, not too much in passing out praises, singled out the play of fullback Howie Ferguson and quarterback Babe Parilli. "Fergy ran real good...he fought for every yard," Scooter said. "And Parilli was passing well...but too many of his passes were dropped." Then explaining the Packers' conservative play in the fourth period when the Eagles rallied for three touchdowns. Mc Lean said, "We just got too lax and their passing game got hot...especially when Billy Kinard was injured." Scooter said "conservative play" by Parilli and the entire defense in the fourth quarter led to the downfall. "We played good ball for three quarters," McLean said, "but you see what happens when you ease up?" The Scotsman warned that "nothing but an all out performance" will give the Packers a chance against the unbeaten Colts in Baltimore next Sunday. "We can't have any foolishness out there," Scooter said, "or we'll get killed." Taking a cue from the Lions, McLean herded the Packers into a motel here Saturday night. The entire squad went to a movie and then was put to bed early at the Valley Motel, near the Stadium. The club has always stayed in their own Green

Bay dwellings on the eve of home games, but McLean apparently wanted them to have only one thing in mind Sunday...beat the Eagles...and they did.

PARILLI FINDS VICTORY IS A PLEASANT CHANGE

OCT 27 (Milwaukee Journal) - Vito Parilli was once again the Sweet Kentucky Babe here Sunday. "I was a little rusty at first," Parilli said after the Packers' 38-35 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles. "It's been so long since I started a game. It was a good feeling to win for a change." Parilli's four touchdown passes were the most in a game for him as a professional.

It was not a Green Bay record, however. Cecil Isbell completed five touchdown passes November 1, 1942 against the Cleveland Rams. "His play calling was good until the last period," Coach Ray (Scooter) McLean said. "Then he got conservative. The defense became conservative, too. We let down, no question about it. I was worried. We're not that good a ball club that we can let up. Any time you're playing Van Brocklin you can't let up." The Eagles' veteran quarterback, Norm Van Brocklin, completed 11 of 17 passes for 182 yards in the final quarter. Despite the victory, the Packers' dressing room was not a scene of jubilation. They were like a fighter who had won the decision but was hanging by the ropes at the final bell. McLean's only smile, strangely, came at the mention of next Sunday's game in Baltimore against the undefeated Colts. "That's going to be a rough one," he said, "a real tough one." McLean was asked if the triumph over the Eagles was the Packers' best game so far? "No," McLean said. "We played three times better against the Colts in Milwaukee. You mean defensively, don't you? Offensively, for three quarters today this was our best game." McLean had particular praise for Howie Ferguson's running. "He runs hard, that guy. I'll tell you something, too, another guy that runs hard out there. That McIlhenny. He fights for everything." Lawrence (Buck) Shaw, Eagles coach, was disappointed that his team hadn't pulled off the comeback of the season. He praised Van Brocklin. "He can throw the ball," he said, "and he's got a good head on his shoulders, too. He thinks all the time. Now if we just had your receivers," Shaw said wistfully. "With Van Brocklin throwing to Howton and Gary Knafelc and McGee...Then we could go. Our Walston is over the hill. He couldn't get away from anybody on his patterns today. Bielski's got good hands but he can't maneuver. He's a fullback. Retzlaff is all right. Mitcham looked good today but he got a bad shoulder on that last kickoff and now he may be out awhile. That hurts."

BAYS NEED 60-MINUTE PERFORMANCE

OCT 27 (Green Bay) - For one-fourth of this pro football season the Packers have played 30 minute ball. Against the Eagles here Sunday, Green Bay went all out for 45 minutes. Scooter McLean is having a tough time convincing his club that they are getting paid for 60 minutes...nothing less. His Packers held a 38-14 lead over the Eagles going into the fourth quarter and then let down. That was all Norm Van Brocklin needed to uncork one of his famed comebacks. The former Ram general, who beat Green Bay last year in Milwaukee after the Bays had a 24-3 halftime lead over L.A., completed 11 out of 17 passes for 179 yards in the fourth quarter alone. "Van Brocklin just sat back in his rocking chair and fired away," McLean said Monday morning as he opened up shop in preparation for next Sunday's gigantic task at Baltimore. "We had done a pretty good job containing him for three quarters," McLean continued. "But then our defense started laying back, forgetting all about rushing him." Scooter didn't believe his boys panicked as the score drew

closer. He said it was "just a case of not going all out all the way." While Van Brocklin was tearing the Packer defense to shreds, Green Bay failed to make a single first down in the almost disastrous fourth quarter. In fact the Packers' further advancement was to their own 33. And while Van Brocklin put on a one-man show, the Eagles weren't in the same class with the Packers for 45 minutes of play. Bill Barnes scored Philadelphia's first touchdown on a 70 yard gallop, but if it had not been for shoddy tackling on the part of the Bays, Barnes would have never left the line of scrimmage. "Who had a shot at him," Scooter shot back at the questioner. "Who didn't?" he answered. McLean said he would stick with the same offensive backfield which started against the Eagles. This means quarterback Babe Parilli, fullback Howie Ferguson, halfback Al Carmichael and slotback Gary Knafelc will start against the Colts. Parilli's passing was really sharp. He completed 14 out of 25 for 199 yards and four touchdowns. However, his receivers dropped too many. Billy Howton bobbled the Babe's first pass of the game. If Howton would have hung on to it would have been a sure six points. Ferguson keeps punching with authority. It's too bad ever Packers doesn't have his hustle. Carmichael, operating as a swing man, caught two passes for 27 yards and one touchdown and picked up 14 yards in five carries. Don McIlhenny, who was benched after his fumbling performance at Washington, looked good the short time he played, picking up 26 yards in five trips. Mac fought for every inch. "If we only had your ends," Eagle Coach Buck Shaw said wishfully after the game. Parilli hit Max McGee six times for 100 yards and two touchdowns. Howton four for 47 yards and Knafelc two for 25 and one TD. McGee also put his best foot forwards on punts, averaging 48.2 yards on five boots. His second punt of the game sailed 61 yards

and the third went 57 and out of bounds on the Eagle 4. Scooter said his club came out of the scrap without any serious injuries, just the usual bumps and bruises. The Packer office staff was smiling for the first time on a Monday. Vice President Lee Joannes congratulated Scooter and laughingly ribbed: "If you boys had blown this one, I would have gone home to get my shotgun and cleaned house but good." But the Packers won. Whether it should have been 38-14 or 38-35 it goes down as a victory. Any kind of victory counts in this business.

TWO MOTIVES WILL SPUR BAYS SUNDAY

OCT 28 (Appleton Post-Crescent) - And, now the Colts! Pardon please, the undefeated Colts! The Packers will be spurred by two motives in Baltimore Sunday. No. 1 is handing the Colts their first loss and thus ending their winning streak at five. No. 2, and probably more important, is stepping back into the Western division race. What's more, it's about time the Packers kicked up their heels and knocked off one of these so-called hot clubs. The Bays were picked for the cellar in the Western sector and until last Sunday it looked as if the typewriter jockeys were right. In beating Philadelphia, 38-35, the Packers proved that they could score and hold the other guy down - at least in three quarters. The Bays are anxious to make it four frames Sunday...SCORING PUNCH: The Packers have two items going for them - a new-found scoring punch and the Packer-Colt game in Milwaukee three weeks ago. The Bays blitzed the Eagles with five touchdowns - four on Babe Parilli passes. That means the Packers, who have the best group of pass receiving ends in the business, are once again a powerful aerial threat. To go with Billy Howton, Max McGee and slotster Gary Knafelc, the Bays have a highly competitive rushing backfield - Howie Ferguson, Paul Hornung and Jim Taylor at fullback and Don McIlhenny, Al Carmichael and Jim Shanley at halfback...DIDN'T PLAY: Parilli never played against the Colts in Milwaukee. Bart Starr went the route and actually had a Packer record performance with 46 attempts and 26 completions for 320 yards, though the Colts won, 24-17. On the basis of that game and scouting reports on the Eagle game, the Colts could be wondering about Packer quarterbacking. The Packers put their best showing of the season in losing to the Colts and actually a quick whistle and two or three bad breaks kept the Packers from winning. At least, the Packers figure - on the strength of that battle - the Colts can be had...GOING THE ROUTE: They're talking about going all the way in Baltimore. Sample this paragraph from a Baltimore sheet: "Speaking of going all the way, the hosses should be able to get some advice in the matter from the front office. When the Chicago Bears went undefeated in 13 straight games in 1934 - the league record - their quarterback was Keith Molesworth, Colt director of personnel." Parilli now has pitched six touchdown passes - all in the last four quarters. He had two in the final periods vs. Washington - to MxGee and Taylor, and four vs. Philadelphia - two to McGee and one each to Knafelc and Carmichael. Since replacing the injured Start in the first quarter of the Washington game, Parilli attempted 45 passes and completed 23 for 496 yards and six touchdowns. And dropped passes robbed him of three or four more completions, not to mention one touchdown, in the Washington game.

MCLEAN SAYS BAYS WERE LAX, CONSERVATIVE IN LAST QUARTER

OCT 28 (Appleton Post-Crescent) - Tuesday Quarterback No. 5: What's this letdown business? The Packers were supposed to be hungry for a victory; they're leading the Eagles, 38-14, and then almost gag with joy while the visitors are scoring 21. Why? Coach Ray McLean says "we got too conservative and we got lax." Maybe it's human nature to let up - the equivalent of a boxer easing off when the other guy is groggy...NINE FIRST DOWNS: The Redskins did the very same thing in Washington the previous Sunday. Remember? They were leading, 34-0, and the Bays whipped off 21 points in the last quarter. Washington's let-down wasn't quite as complete as the Packers because the Skins added three points. The Packers were badly in need of some offense - or a few good tackles - in that last quarter. They had the ball 12 times and wound up with eight rushes for 13 yards - an average of 1.6 per try - two passes for eight yards, and two punts. The Eagles rolled up nine first downs in the last quarter against the Packers' zero. The Eagles had 10 first downs in the first three frames; the Bays 19. What happened to the Packers' pass defense in the last quarter? The best explanation was that (1) Van Brocklin was extremely hot and (2) the letdown kept the Bays from putting much rush on him and made them weak tacklers. The Eagles aren't exactly blessed with good pass receivers - other than Pete Retzlaff, who seems to be a natural. "Their ends are good all right," said Bobby Dillon after the game, "but we'll be facing a lot better from now on."

AND THE PACKERS COULD HAVE HAD JIM BROWN

OCT 28 (Milwaukee Journal-Oliver Kuechle) - The Green Bay Packers for years have needed a good, strong, bruising halfback. So it must be with a wince each Monday that they look over the sports pages to see what Jim Brown, Cleveland's blockbuster from Syracuse, did the day before. (Sunday, Brown gaines 180 yards on 24 carries and scored four touchdowns. He now leads the league in scoring with 14 touchdowns and 815 yards in 118 carries). The Packers could have had Brown - had two cracks at him, in fact, before Cleveland got him. Green Bay had the bonus choice the year he went - 1957 - and the third choice in the regular draft. They took Paul Hornung of Notre Dame as their bonus man and Ron Kramer of Michigan as their regular choice. Brown went two picks later. Los Angeles and San Francisco, drafting ahead of Green Bay, picked Jon Arnett of Southern California and John Brodie of Stanford, respectively, and Pittsburgh, drafting immediately after Green Bay, took Len Dawson of Purdue. Actually, even Cleveland stumbled into Brown. Paul Brown, hunting for a quarterback after Otto Graham's retirement, originally has his sights on Dawson, wanted him badly, then settled for Brown only after Pittsburgh had beaten him to Dawson. There is little question that Brown, if he remains healthy, will rewrite the

pro record book on individual ground gaining and scoring completely before he is through. He needs only 331 yards in his seven remaining games, a bagatelle, to break Steve Van Buren's rushing record of 1,146 yards set in 1949 and only five touchdowns to crack Van Buren's record of 18 in a season set in 1945. Why the Packers didn't pick him, with two cracks at him, has always been an embarrassing question to Lisle Blackbourn, then Green Bay's coach, and Jack Vainisi, their chief player scout. "We picked Hornung because we thought he was a better all-around man. And we picked Kramer because we needed a slotman." That has been the public explanation. The private explanation? "We muffed one." Brown, in a backfield with Ferguson today, would look mighty sweet, indeed - "Sweet Syracuse Brown". Kramer? He is in the Air Force now. Hornung? He's in and out...SHOTGUN DEAL: A remark has been credited to Lee Joannes, vice-president of the Green Bay Packers and chairman of the powerful contract committee of the executive board, that was probably intended for a laugh but also contained more than a kernel of truth. "If you guys has blown this one," he is supposed to have laughingly said after the Packers beat Philadelphia Sunday for their

first victory of the season, "I would have gone home to get my shotgun and cleaned house but good." It was Joannes who first led the fight to clip Curly Lambeau's wings in the middle forties, Joannes who hired Gene Ronzani, Joannes who balked loudest about the hiring of Lisle Blackbourn, Joannes who led the fight to get rid of Blackbourn, while Blackbourn was out of the city on a scouting mission, and Joannes who hired Scooter McLean as head coach. Not since these events transpired have the Packers won more games in a season than they have lost. There could be a connection.

CARE FOR SELVES - BELL SAYS PROS DON'T NEED FAN PROTECTION

OCT 28 (Milwaukee Journal) - One belligerent spectator bent on punching a football coach does not call for any special protective action by the NFL, Commissioner Bert Bell said Monday. "We can't do anything because one guy gets out of line," Bell said, referring to the incident in San Francisco Sunday in which a fan took a swing at Chicago Bears coach George Halas. "He gets waffled and is tossed in jail, but everybody gets excited. He's probably lucky the players didn't get to him." William Dunn, the fan in question, tried another trick Monday. It also backfired. When Dunn's case was called in court a man arose, identified himself as Jack Slathy, attorney, and said: "I want to plead my client not guilty and ask for a jury trial." The judge agreed, and continued the matter, to set a trial date. of Washington is third with an even 9.00. Parilli replaced Starr early in the Washington game a week ago Sunday and finished with nine completions in 20 attempts for 292 yards and two touchdowns. He went the distance against the Eagles here Sunday and completed 14 of 25 attempts for 199 yards and four touchdowns. There was only one interception in the two games, but it was hardly Parilli's fault; his pass bounced out of Steve Meilinger's hands and into Joe Scudero's mitts. Parilli said he changed his way of drifting back from center after he got of service, which was his first year (1956) with the Cleveland Browns and his third year of pro ball! He was traded back to the Bays in 1957. There's a good reason for backpedaling straight back from the center on a pass. "We can see the red dogs (shooting linebackers) better," Babe said, adding: "When there's a red dog we can throw to the spot where the red dog was. No, we couldn't see that red dog very well if we were in a crouch."...ALMOST STUMBLED: Parilli backs straight up and one time Sunday he almost stumbled, but he allowed that "it's not awkward for me. Paul Hornung jumped into third place in scoring with a field goal and five extra points, giving him 43 on two touchdowns, 13 PATs and six field goals. Max McGee, who once said that Dick Deschaine "gives me a complex with his punting," is now third in league punting with his 43.4 average. Maxie averaged over 48 yards Sunday. Former Packer punt specialist Deschaine, traded to the Browns before the season started, is seventh with 41.7. The Packers worked lightly after a chalk session Tuesday afternoon. And, Coach Ray McLean was pleased to not that trainer Bud Jorgenson's injury report showed only three names - all minor injuries. That means the Bays will be good physical condition for the Colts.





Why do you single him out Raymond, because you have to face him this Sunday at the Stadium? "No, that's the reason at all. You asked me to name the top defensive back and Dillon is the man...SO FAST IT HURTS: "He is so fast it hurts. You may cut a perfect pattern but if the pass is slightly off line, Dillon, with all his speed, will have recovered and be in the way. There is no one in this league, including Willie Galimore, who can run away from Dillon. That is one of the reasons I practice so hard when I have him guarding him the following week...PATTERNS MUST BE PERFECT: "The only way you can beat him is to have your pass patterns down. Even then he keeps you from going all the way. He has good position on you at all times and his speed enables him to get places in a hurry," explained Berry. Berry was asked if it wasn't possible to take advantage of Dillon's blindness in one eye. "Not to my knowledge," smiled Berry. "I have read he has only one eye, but sometimes I think he must have eyes in the back of his head." Dillon, who has been an All-Pro selection four of his seven years in pro ball, demonstrated his blazing speed in the last meeting between the Green Bay Packers and the Colts...MUTSCHELLER HAILED: In the third quarter with the Colts trailing 17-7, Johnny Unitas connected with Jim Mutscheller on a 46 yard scoring pass. Mutscheller caught the ball between Packer defenders and left them him in his dust, but from way over on other side of the field came the streaking Dillon. Running much farther than Mutscheller, who is no slow Joe himself, Bobby nailed Jim on the goal line, but the Colt end fell into the end zone for the score. It was that kind of pass defense accentuated by Dillon that gave Unitas his poorest completion record of the season. Johnny hit on only 17 of 36 passes that day when the Colts had to come from behind for a 24-17 victory in Milwaukee...The Colts haven't turned up a kicker to replace Dick Horn, who was waivered the other day. But from the amount of footballs in the air yesterday one would think all the Colts were kickers. And they were. Even big linemen were trying to show Coach Weeb Ewbank how they could punt and several looked good, particularly Bill Pellington. Raymond Brown, who probably will do the kicking against the Packers, had an answer: "With our offense we don't need a long kicker, I can kick far enough and high enough."

EWBANK ABOUT SET TO ADD NEW KICKER

OCT 31 (Baltimore Evening Sun) - The Colts are on the verge of signing a new punter to replace Dick Horn. Identity of Horn's successor remains a mystery because Coach Weeb Ewbank is still mulling over several possibilities. He may not come up with the answer until just before Sunday's game at Memorial Stadium with Green Bay...COACH HOLDS OFF: One thing, however, is certain: The Colts are not going to meet the Packers shorthanded. There has been a roster vacancy since Horn was put on waivers last Tuesday, but Ewbank's quest for a suitable kicker hasn't gone on just since then. The Colt mentor has been on the prowl for somebody like the Packers' Max McGee or his predecessor, Dick Deschaine, who went to Cleveland, for some time. Weeb's holding off on signing the newcomer is not based so much on his desire to confuse Green Bay as it is to make sure in his own mind he is obtaining the best man available...PACKERS SOLID CLUB: Of course, if the Colts flash the kind of offense and defense than have become standard commodities with them this season, there may be very little punting for the newcomer or Ray Brown to do. Conversely, the Packers are quite capable of forcing the host eleven to go all out to maintain its undefeated record. They are a rough, tough, solid team which feels it was victimized by a quirk of fate in the clubs' earlier meeting in Milwaukee, just after the close of the World Series, and is anxious to make up for it...PARILLI TO START: For Sunday's tilt Bart Starr, who set Green Bay passing attempts and completion records in the first clash, has been relieved of the starting quarterback role in favor of more experienced but vacillating Babe Parilli. The latter, however, is on a hot streak that has carried him to the top of the NFL ranking. Two weeks ago against Washington, he averaged 33 yards on nine completions in a losing cause to snatch the starting nod from Starr. Last Sunday, in Green Bay, Babe hurled four touchdown aerials as the Packers outlasted Philadelphia for their initial victory of the season...SHUFFLES BACK: In addition to opening with Parilli, Coach Scooter McLean has shuffled his pack of fine receivers to get more punch into the backfield with him. When the Colts played Green Bay three weeks ago, Steve Meilinger was the slotback and was only one of several pass-catchers who gave the Ewbankmen fits. Sunday, McLean plans to use Gary Knafelc, also listed originally as an end and considered a better receiver than Meilinger. Meilinger, 203-point husky who came from the Redskins in a trade, is more of a short pass threat. Knafelc, 2 inches taller at 6 feet 4 inches and faster with his 217 pounds, is more of a long-distance menace.

COLTS' KEY: PROTECT PASSER


OCT 31 (Milwaukee Sentinel) - They're talking about going all the way in Baltimore this fall. Such wishful thinking stems from the fact the Colts are undefeated in five games and looking better in each appearance. If by some miracle the Colts can turn the trick, it will be the first time since 1942 that a NFL team will win a divisional crown with a perfect record. The 1942 Bears rolled over 11 foes only to lose the championship to the Redskins, 14-6. There's little doubt Baltimore has the horses to beat any opposition. But good enough for an undefeated season? They hardly come that way anymore. The improving Packers gave the Colts their toughest game this season. Baltimore had to rally from a 17-0 deficit to squeak through, 24-17, thanks to a referee's fast whistle. In other games, the Steeds overwhelmed the Lions twice, 28-14 and 40-14; the Bears, 51-38; and the Redskins, 35-10. Green Bay is confident of pulling the biggest upset of the year even though the battle will be fought in the NFL's wildest backyard. Upwards of 57,000 the biggest crowd ever to see a pro game in

Baltimore, will give their heroes a boisterous backing. The secret to Baltimore's success is buried down in a long list of cold statistics - Yards lost attempting to pass. Johnny Unitas, the cocky Colt passer, walked off the field last Sunday with a spotless uniform. Not once did the Redskins get a piece of his anatomy or even give him reason to hurry a throw. In five games Unitas has lost a scant 35 yards while opposing passers have been clobbered for 154 yards by the Colts' famed defense. The Packers spilled Unitas twice in Milwaukee. Center Buzz Nutter (George Preston Marshall's old buddy), guards Art Spinney and Alex Sandusky and tackles George Preas and Jim Parker are setting up a blocking cup around Unitas that hardly ever breaks down. Preas was injured in the second quarter against Washington. That brought about a switch of Parker from left tackle to the right side to handle Gene Brito. Sherman Plunkett was installed in Parker's customary location. It's little wonder Unitas leads the league in yards gained passing (907) and in touchdown passes (eight) with that kind of protection.

IMPROVED PACKERS TAKE AIM AT COLTS STREAK

NOV 1 (Baltimore Evening Sun) - The second half of Baltimore's biggest grid weekend of the year comes up tomorrow (2:05 o'clock) at Memorial Stadium as the Colts seek to roll on their merry way in the Western Division of the NFL at Green Bay's expense. An even greater sellout crowd than the 54,403 persons who saw them beat Washington for their fifth straight victory without defeat last week, is expected to watch the home forces in their rematch with the Packers...TOP PRO TURNOUT: The Colts can't quite match the 57,773 seat capacity for today's Notre Dame-Navy fray, but believe every one

of 57,571 available seats will be occupied at kickoff time. Thus, the Colts, a 12-point choice, will be performing before the largest professional grid throng in the city's history...CLUB ADDS PUNTER: Meanwhile, the Colts were brought up to the 35-player limit today by the signing of punter Avatus Stone, a 27-year old, 6-foot 1-inch Washington Negro who played in the Canadian League. Coach Weeb Ewbank also plans to groom Stone, who in 1951 was the leading eastern college punter with a 41.5-yard average, to double as a defensive back. A 1953 Syracuse University graduate, Stone was considered the best college safety man in his junior year. He was drafted ninth by the Chicago Cardinals, but went instead to Canada. In 1956, the Cards put him on waivers. He will be in uniform and ready for duty tomorrow...INVADERS IMPROVED: In trying to maintain or better a one-game edge over the runnerup Chicago Bears, who play in Los Angeles tomorrow, Baltimore faces a team regarded as the most improved in the circuit, and one that is operating with all hands healthy. That wasn't so three weeks ago, in Milwaukee, when the Ewbankmen spotted Green Bay seventeen points,


then fought back to snatch a last-minute 24-17 decision on Andy Nelson's 52-yard touchdown run with an intercepted pass. On that occasion the Packers had to get along without such standbys as Tom Bettis and Babe Parilli, who were out with injuries. Gary Knafelc played but briefly, and Bart Starr functioned at quarterback with a bad ankle...PARILLI NO. 1 PASSER: Hurt or not, Starr set two club records that day by completing 26 passes in 46 attempts. The Colts haven't forgotten how his short aerial game almost wrecked them and will be out to circumvent it. However, this time they'll have to contend more with Parilli than Starr. The long-throwing Babe not only has won the starting role from Bart, but ranks as the No. 1 pitcher of the NFL. Two weeks ago against the Redskins, he averaged 33 yards on nine tosses. Last Sunday, in his initial start of the season, he flipped four touchdown passes in a 38-35 conquest of Philadelphia, the Packers' first triumph of the campaign...TOPNOTCH RECEIVERS: When one considers he has such fine receivers as Knafelc, Bill Howton, Max McGee, Steve Meilinger, Howie Ferguson and Don McIlhenny to throw to, it's easy to see why the hosts won't underrate the dangerous invaders. The Colts are glad to see Parilli the field general's chair because they have a score to settle with the Kentucky Babe. They haven't forgotten last year's test here when Babe's aerial to Howton in the final minute of play became the 75-yard scoring junket that whipped them...UNITAS EYES MARK: In their desire to get even, the Ewbankmen are prepared to flash the best offense in the loop and a defense that ranks well up with the circuit's elite. John Unitas remains at the helm as he continues to zero in on the league record of 23 consecutive games in which scoring passes were thrown. The

mark is held by Cecil Isbell, first coach of the Colts, when he was with - of all teams, Green Bay - in 1941 and '42. Unitas has connected in twenty straight. The nice thing about the Baltimore attack is its balance. Unitas has almost as many good receivers to throw to as Parilli and Starr and in Raymond Berry, he has the NFL's best...MOORE BIG THREAT: On the ground Lenny Moore is the Colt leader, but Alan Ameche and Louis Dupre are piling up yardage with consistency, and freshman Leonard Lyles always is around as a one shot long distance threat like Moore. Green Bay's best overland men are Howie Ferguson, its workhorse who is a constant menace to Baltimore, and McIlhenny.

PACKERS USE QUICK START

NOV 1 (Baltimore Sun) - Watch for a fast start from the Green Bay Packers tomorrow when they face the Colts in a rematch NFL game in the Stadium. Coach Scooter McLean's charges have typed themselves as quick starters, but poor finishers, in their five league games to date. In the first quarter surge the Packers have scored 30 points to their opponents' 17, but the wear and tear apparently catches up wit the Green Bay team thereafter. He is Green Bay's quarter-by-quarter scoring against five opponents:

The Colts, until this year, experienced the same kind of letdown. Heretofore, they started out with a bang, but were unable to hang onto leads in the face of last-half assaults by the oppositions. There are several things that can be blamed for such letdowns, but probably the biggest reason is lack of reserves. Man-for-man, the Packers have as good material in their 22 starters as the next team, but in pro ball even the good players need rests...INJURIES COSTLY: Injuries, of course, have caused some of the letdowns for the Packers. This time the Green Bay team is expected to be at full strength without even a suggestion of an injury to weaken either its offense or defense. A hail team plus the Packers' usually fast start will make the Colts' job tougher than the first meeting, when a couple of breaks allowed the Colts to score ten points in the last five minutes to down the stubborn Packers, 24-17, in Milwaukee. Again, as has been the case in the Colts' five straight victories, success will depend on the Baltimore defense and the accuracy of quarterback John Unitas...DEFENSE TELLS: Against the Packers in Milwaukee, the Colt defense came to the rescue. Unitas was far off form, completing only 17 of 36 passes. An interception by Andy Nelson, which he retuned 52 yards for a touchdown, was Baltimore's margin of victory in the first meeting. Bart Starr, Packer quarterback, who set a record of 26 completions in 46 attempts against the Colts, isn't

even listed to start tomorrow. His job has been taken over by Babe Parilli, whose performance in Green Bay's only victory last week against the Philadelphia Eagles was outstanding. Where Starr hurt the Colts was on roll out passes. If Parilli or Starr can be kept in their pass protection pocket, the big Colt linemen will put enough pressure on them to hurry their throws. But, if the Packer passers can swing out of the pocket and force the Colt secondary to commit itself, then Baltimore is in trouble.

BALTIMORE HEAVILY FAVORED TO DEFEAT GREEN BAY AGAIN

NOV 1 (Baltimore) - Scooter McLean's Green Bay Packers will be decided underdogs when they meet the undefeated Baltimore Colts here Sunday. The Colts are undefeated leaders of the NFL's Western Division. The Packers share the cellar with Detroit. Baltimore will be playing at home, before more than 50,000 of the loudest, orneriest fans ever assembled for a football game. The Colts beat the Packers in their first meeting at Milwaukee three weeks ago, 24-17. Even though the Packers held a 17-0 lead and the Colts needed a few right bounced to come back, that game can hardly be used as a yardstick. This time they will play in Baltimore, not in Green Bay's backyard. One can make all sorts of comparison of scores against common opponents. The Colts beat the Chicago Bears, 51-38. The Bears beat the Packers, 34-20. That represents a

difference of 27 points. The Colts beat the Detroit Lions twice, 28-15 and 40-14. The Packers barely hung onto a 13-13 tie with Detroit. The difference is either 13 or 26 points. The Colts beat the Washington Redskins, 35-10. The Redskins beat the Packers, 37-21. The difference is 41 points. Even so, McLean and his men showed up here Saturday afternoon. They will be in Memorial Stadium for the kickoff, in their best physical condition of the season. None of the 35 players on Green Bay's roster will miss the game because of injuries. "We'll be in there battling," McLean said. "We've got a good chance to win as long as we can play four good quarters." The Packers, McLean said, are in good spirits. Last Sunday's 38-35 victory over Philadelphia "pepped them up." He planned the same starting lineup as last Sunday, which mans Babe Parilli at quarterback, Howie Ferguson and Al Carmichael at running backs and Gary Knafelc, Max McGee and Bill Howton at the pass catching. "The Colts will probably be a little bit tougher for this one," McLean said. "They'll be going for that sixth win in a row and if they get it, they'll have a pretty good cushion with the season half over." The Baltimore fans boo the opponents unmercifully, from the time the teams take the field for practice, through the introductions and the game itself. Would this bother the Packers? "Oh," McLean said, "it's going to be a madhouse. It may cause trouble in trving to call signals. But it shouldn't upset our boys. No, not at all." Green Bay's defense again will be hard pressed by the quarterbacking, passing and running of Johnny Unitas, the running of Lenny Moore, L.G. Dupre and Alan Ameche and the pass catching of Raymond Berry, Jim Mutscheller and Moore. The Packers gave Parilli fine protection against Philadelphia last Sunday, but the Eagles' rush on the passer was nothing compared to Baltimore's. The Colt ends, Gino Marchetti and Don Joyce, and the linebackers, Don Shinnick, Bill Pellington and Leo Sanford, generally exert great pressure, both on opposing passers and runners. Green Bay's interior line of center Jim Ringo, guards Hank Bullough and Jerry Kramer and tackles Forrest Gregg and Oliver Spencer will get a thorough test. All eyes will be on Parilli. He passed for four touchdowns against Philadelphia. The NFL's ranking system puts him first among passers. Can he keep going, especially against Baltimore's rugged defense? Or will he turn to his former erratic ways? The Packers have one thing going for them. Last year, the Colts smeared them in Milwaukee, 45-17. In the return game, the Packers won on a 75 yard pass in the last minute, 24-21. Parilli threw it. Howton caught it.



louder. The officials aren't likely to penalize this gathering. One of the reasons for Starr's record success (26 out of 46 passes for 320 yards) in Milwaukee was switching signals (automatics) on the line of scrimmage. Excessive noise will make it impossible for the ends - not to mention wide flankers, to hear the calls. Although Starr picked the Colts apart in Sudsville, Parilli will get the starting shot on the basis of six touchdown passes and a string of sharp quarters vs. Washington and Philadelphia. Babe, in the process of regaining his confidence, stepped to the head of the league's pass pitchers with a 9.35 average. The Packers are likely to come up with a surprise or two Sunday to combat the Colts' rugged defense and offset

The Bay pass defense, all but ripped apart in the fourth quarter last Sunday by Norm Van

Brocklin, should be exerted to extreme pressure from Unitas and his top three receivers - Berry, Jim Mutscheller and Moore. Both squads are in excellent physical condition - a treat for the Bays who were damaged in the first four games, the Colts have yet to suffer an injury hardly worth mentioning.

DESCHAINE, BEST PUNTER EVER - IN PRACTICE - IS TRAILING MCGEE

NOV 2 (Milwaukee Journal) - Max McGee of the Packers leads Dick Deschaine of the Cleveland Browns in punting, 43.4 yards a kick to 41.7, NFL statistics show. That is at turn, for Deschaine used to intimidate McGee and other punters in Green Bay's practices before the Packers traded him to Cleveland for a future draft choice before the season started. Deschaine is perhaps the greatest punter of all time - in practice. His high spirals, with plenty of time to take his steps and get the kick away, embarrassed not only McGee, who punted for the Packers in 1954 before he went into service, but Babe Parilli, Green Bay's punter in 1953, and any other aspirants for the job. But Deschaine could do nothing but punt and when cutdown time came, the former Menominee (Mich.) sandlot player was sent away. McGee was given the job and with Deschaine no longer around, McGee has been progressing not only as a pass catching end but as a punter.
