# Rams Rout Packers in Offensive Show, 49 to 21

## GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(LOS ANGELES) - The Packers were pitifully defenseless against the Los Angeles Rams in the Coliseum before 45,209 tennis-necked fans Sunday afternoon. And the Rams weren't much better in this weird 1956 NFL finale that dropped the Green Bays into a Western Division cellar tie with the Rams - each with 4-8 records. Ye olde score was Rams 48, Packers 21 in a no-tackle special that produced such fantastic two team offensive totals as 70 points, 10 touchdowns, 1,010 gross yards, 52 first downs, 33 completions in 55 pass attempts, 535 yards rushing and 485 yards passing. As the pointage would indicate, the Packers were the worst of the two groups of tacklers and this blacker sin led to the manufacture of a new league rushing record for young Tom Wilson, the Rams' no-college rookie back

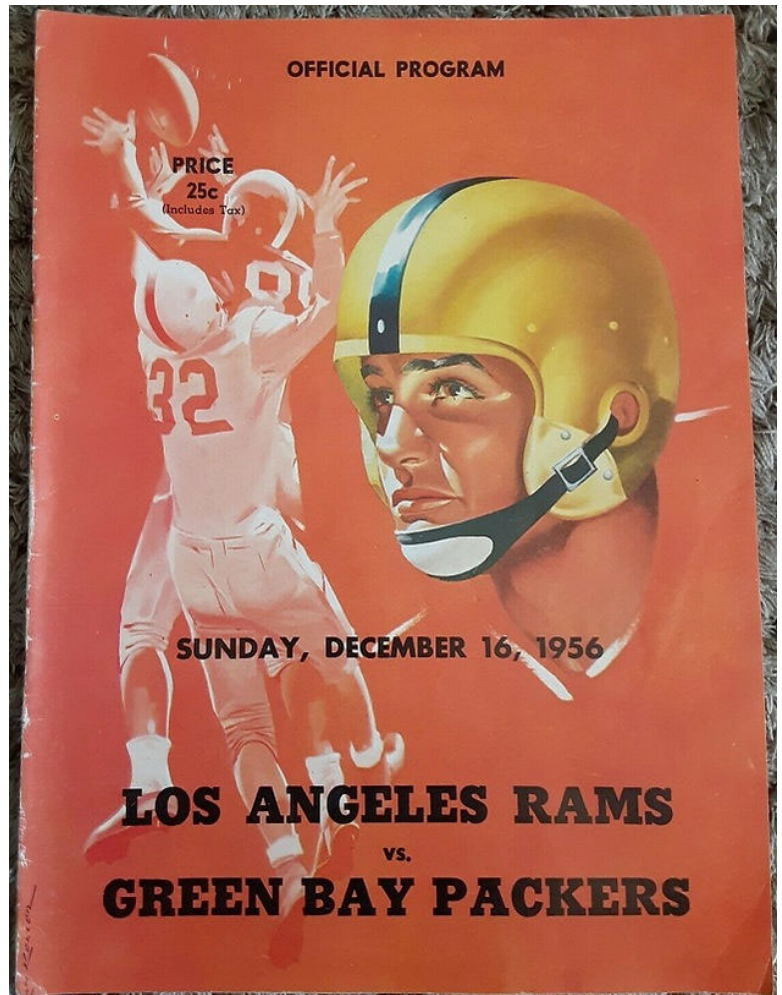
### **GAINS 223 YARDS**

Wilson, galloping through sometimes as many as four and five Packers at a clip, rolled up 223 yards in 23 attempts to break the record of 218 in 26 tries by Gene (Choo Choo) Roberts of the New York Giants against the Chicago Cardinals in 1950. Actually, this could have been worse for Green Bay, but the Rams apparently ran out of gas - smack in the middle of the white striped freeway, and concentrated on pushing Wilson into a record in the fourth quarter. The Rams led 14-7 at the end of the first quarter, 35 to 7 at the rest period during which former Ram star Tom Fears was given a station wagon, and 49 to 14 going into the last quarter when the Bays actually outscored the local heroes 7 to 0.

### **INJUSTICE TO DEFENSE**

To holler about the Rams being hot on offense would be an injustice to the Packers' defense, which just wasn't operating at all. The Rams had the ball 11 times. They scored on seven occasions, lost the ball twice on fumbles, lost it on downs once on the Packer 14, and lost it at midfield when somebody shot a gun ending the game. And, worse still, the Rams never had to punt all afternoon - a feat that might have made Dick Deschaine the league's punting champion. Ram Norm Van Brocklin had a slight lead on Dick and Deschaine averaged 46 yards; Van zero. Van Brocklin, almost lost in the quarterback shuffle out here until the fans took over and decided to run the Rams, engineered nine-tenths of the Rams' yards

and pitched three touchdowns. He received a standing ovation when he was removed with the ball on the 50 early in the last quarter. Third string QB Rudy Bukich (Bill Wade never played) took over and, horrors, couldn't score

## TIE IT UP QUICKLY

The Packers moved the ball pretty good — when they got their hands on it. They actually led 7-0 on Tobin Rote's one-yard sneak climaxing a 77-yard drive. The Rams tied it up quickly with a 70-yard drive but the Packers set sail again and almost took a 14-7 edge. Rote, with the help of a 12 yard completion by Bart Starr who went in while Tobin recovered from a mean swat, moved the Bays down to the Ram 11. Suddenly, the Rams had a 14-7 lead, Will Sherman intercepting a Rote pass on the five and returning 95 yards for a touchdown. Presto, the Rams scored again for a 21-7 edge and the Packers moved down in there again. This time Don Burroughs intercepted a tipped-up Rote pass on the Ram 3 and the Rams wheeled 97 yards for a 28-7 edge.

## BORDEN TOSSED OUT

Thee jig was about up, although the Packers moved 69 yards for a touchdown (Rote to Fred Cone for 13) at the start of the second half. The Packers paid for that bit of offense by giving up two quick seveners. The Packers went 58 yards for their last touchdown, with Starr moving 'em the last 35 and Cone scoring on a five-yard run. Many interesting little things happened. Packer defensive end Nate Borden, a peaceful gent, was thrown out for delivering the second blow on the Rams' fourth extra point kick. Duane Putnam was observed planting the first. Starr completed the first six passes he threw and missed fire on his seventh try. The sharp rookie QB hit Billy Howton for 12 in the first quarter, Gary Knafelc for 11 in the second and then completed four out of five in the last heat. Even Van Brocklin wasn't that hot, although the Dutchman had a "fair" afternoon with 17 completions in 22 attempts for 289 yards.

## ROTE PICKS UP 78

The Packers had many thorns sticking in their sides after the battle but the three that hurt the most were Wilson, whose feats were aforementioned: Leon Clarke, who caught eight passes for 97 yards and one touchdown; and Bob Boyd, who stretched his four catches to 146 yards and two touchdowns (each 56 yards). The Rams were not thorned although the offense, by keeping busy on three drives, helping the stars from running up a record score. Howie Ferguson was missed, of course, but Cone ran for 69 yards and Rote added 78, one on a fine 39-yard keeper. To show you how lousy the tackling was, the Packers averaged 6.47 on each of their 28 carries; the Rams 6.42 on 49. What's more, the Rams averaged 67 percent of their pass attempt; the Packers 54.

## MOVE 77 YARDS

Briefly, here's a rundown on the point-making: The Rams received the opening kickoff and quickly moved to the Packer 25 where Joe Marconi, who scored three

touchdowns, fumbled and John Martinkovic recovered. The Packers moved 77 yards in nine plays for a 7-0 lead, with Rote starting it off with a 39-yard keeper play and then hurling to Gary Knafelc for 18 yards. Rote smashed over from the one and Cone kicked the first of three extra points. The Rams belted back 70 yards in 10 plays, with Van completing three passes along the way - two to Elroy Hirsch - for 38 yards, and Marconin finally sneaking over from the one. Les Richter started his string of seven extra points. Rote started the next Packer push with a 37-yard throw to Al Carmichael but five plays later, Sherman took Rote's pitch aimed at Knafelc on the five and went 95 for a 14-7 edge.

## MARCONI JAMS OVER

Deschaine had to punt so the Rams moved 62 yards in seven plays to start the second frame. The big gainer was a 46-yard run by Wilson and Marconi finally jammed over from the three for 21-7. Knafelc caught two passes for 25 yards and two

for 28 in the Packers' next push before Burroughs intercepted a throw aimed at Knafelc and tipped by Whittendon on the three. The Rams went 97 yards in six plays, with Van pitching 56 to Boyd for the score, 28-7. Another Deschaine punt and the Rams counted again, this time going 86 yards in 11 plays, chiefly on three Van passes to Clarke for 15, Hirsch 12 and Boyd 21 before Marconi went over from the 2 for 35-7.

**GET 14 BACK**

The Packers moved 69 yards in six plays for their second TD. Cone led off with 21 yards, Rote popped 24 on a draw, Johnson romped 11 and finally Rote pitched to Carmichael for a touch and it was 35-14. The Rams got 14 points back in the next five minutes Van pitched nine yards to Clarke for a touchdown climaxing a 64-yard, five-play push. After Deschaine punted, Van hurled 56 yards to Boyd who worked behind Walker to register the Rams' last TD, ending a 76-yard, eight-play campaign. Just before the end of the third period, Wilson ran 17 and fumbled, with Deral Teteak recovering on the Packer 42. Cone picked off 21 yards in two tries and Starr completed two passes in the 58-yard, nine-play drive, with Cone running five yards for the score. In the last 12 minutes and seven seconds, the Rams ran 23 plays against the Packer six. The Rams didn't score but Wilson got his record as Bukich fed him the ball on seven of the last nine plays

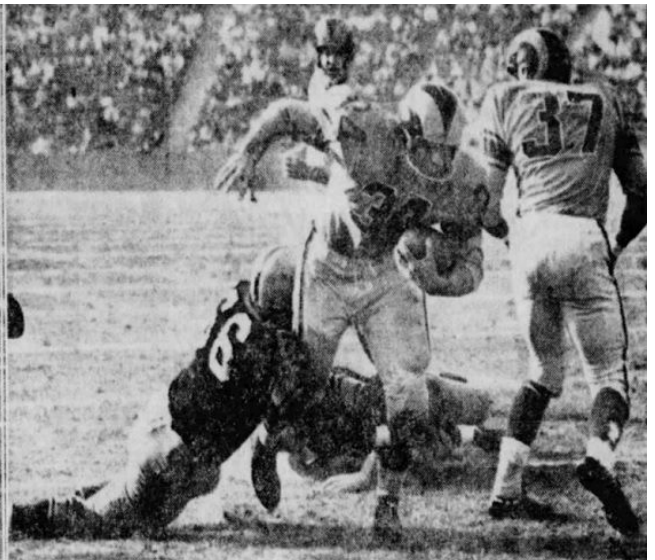

# Name Buck, Pack Hero, To State Hall of Fame

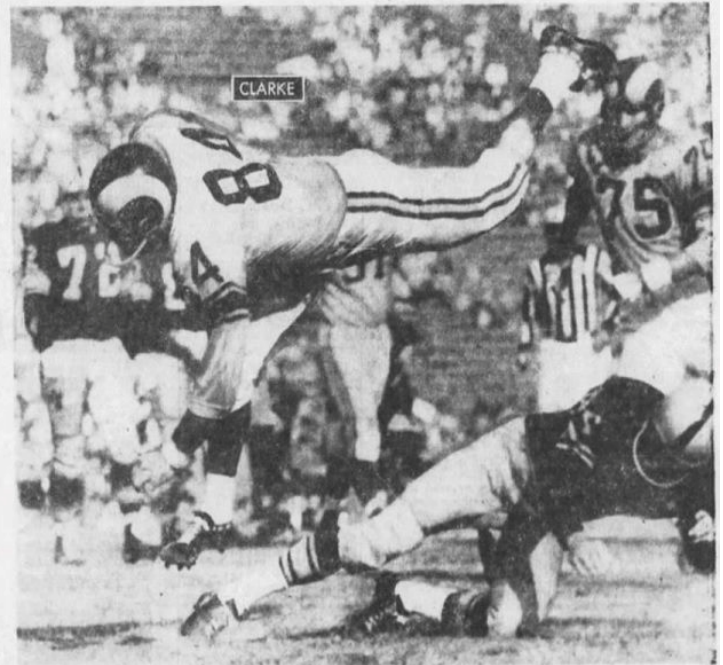
## **NAME BUCK, PACK HERO TO STATE HALL OF FAME**

DEC 17 (Green Bay) - A Packer stalwart of the "old" mold has been chosen to join other Wisconsin sports immortals in the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, it was announced Saturday by Joseph J. Krueger, Milwaukee, chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee. Latest Badger and Packer star to be honored is Howard (Cub) Buck, who anchored the middle of the Green Bay line in the early years of the club's membership in the NFL - from 1921 through 1925. Cub's selection was unanimous. Even without his outstanding record with the Packers, Buck would probably have made the honor roll anyway as one of the greatest tackles who ever wore the Cardinal of the University of Wisconsin. He played for the Badgers in 1913, 1914 and 1915; captained the team in his senior year, and was All Western all through his college career. The failure of Walter Camp to name him on his 1915 All America first team drew a howl of protest from the entire middle west. Called "Cub" because of his bear-like rushing and tenacious line play, Buck played in every game of his three-year college career and was seldom injured. His senior performance was his most outstanding observers stating that he made a good 50 percent of all his team tackles that season. Although he graduated in 1917, Buck didn't start playing pro ball until 1920, when he joined the Canton Bulldogs. It was only with difficulty that he was persuaded to sign a Packer contract in 1921, but once in the fold he was a tower of strength for five seasons. Not only was he one of the outstanding field goal kickers in the early years of the league - his 24 conversions and 12 field goals during his career puts him well up on the list of Packer scorers - but his defensive ability was universally recognized. Cub was one of the keenest diagnosticians of enemy plays the Packers ever had. Now 63, the Cub is down to a trim 225 pounds from his old playing weight of about 265 and operator of the Buck Buick Co., in Rock Island, Ill. For several years after leaving the Packers, Buck was a football coach and athletic director, being the first grid mentor at what is now a Southeastern powerhouse - Miami University of Florida. Buck's plaque

will be unveiled in the lobby of the Milwaukee Arena sometime in 1957. He will join such other Badger and Packer immortals as Pat O'Dea, Dave Schreiner, Don Hutson and Clarke Hinkle, who were charter nominees in 1951.



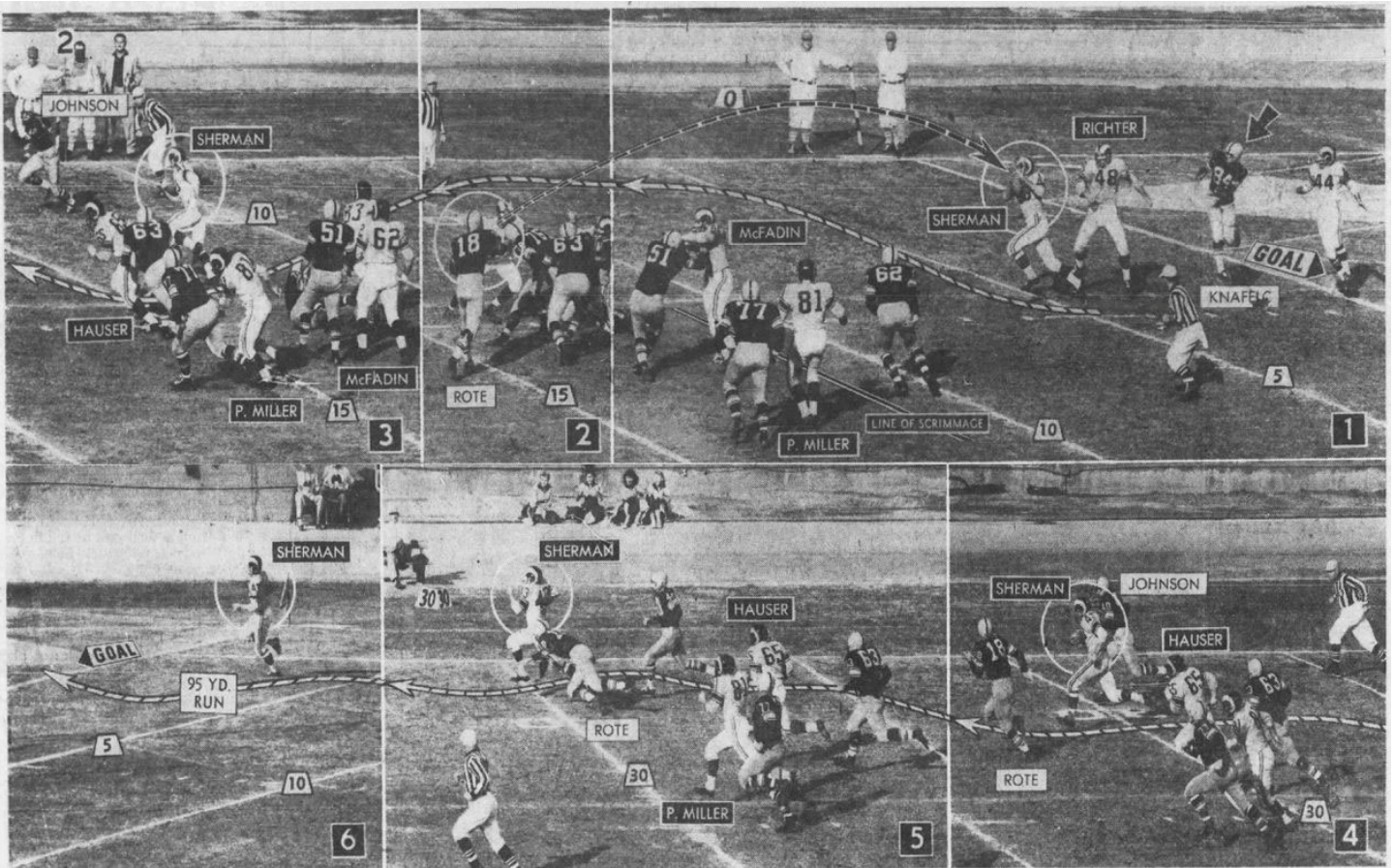
