# HUTSON'S 85 YARD TOUCHDOWN RUN PACES GREEN BAY VICTORY

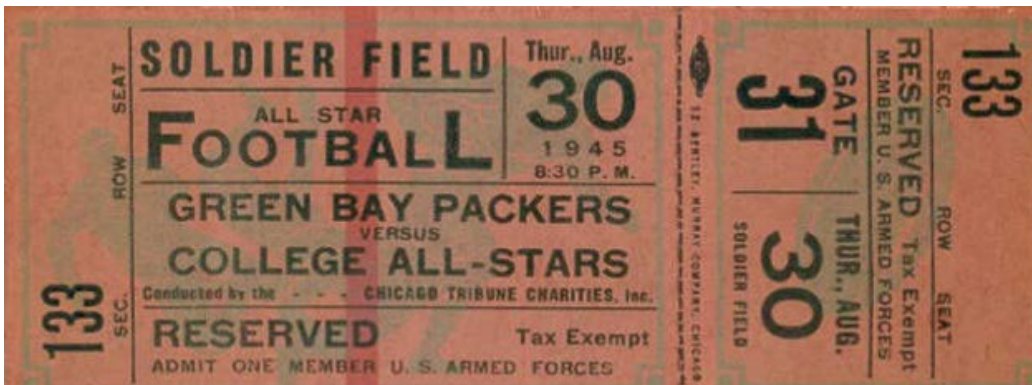
Packers Vanquish All-Stars Before Sellout Crowd in 12th Annual Grid Classic

Packers Triumph Over College All-Stars by 19-7

**92,753 SEE PACKERS BEAT ALL-STARS, 19-7**

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(CHICAGO) - If Don Hutson seriously means he is retiring from professional football as a player after 10 seasons, he could hardly have picked a better time to bow out than Thursday night before 92,753 fans in this hue lakefront stadium. Mr. Hutson, long the peer of ends in the NFL, scored an 85-yard touchdown, kicked a field goal and added two points after touchdown to lead the Packers to a 19-7 triumph over the mighty All-Stars. To be sure, he had plenty of help from his teammates, both linemen and backs. The Packers scored early and kept the advantage throughout with only sporadic periods of danger. The victory gave the Packers a two for three margin in the 12-year history of the annual classic. They lost in



1937, won by a 45-28 margin in 1941 and proved Thursday night that their 1944 world professional championship was not mistake. Hutson personally put the All-Stars, reputed to be the strongest team sponsors of the game could field, in a hole within four minutes of the opening kickoff. He booted a perfect placement from 20 yards out to make the score 3-0 before

the collegians even had their hands on the ball. An All-Star miscue provided the next two points. Early in the second quarter, fullback Bob Kennedy intercepted a pass in the end zone, ran out to about the three-yard line and then back of his own goal line where he was downed for a safety.

## NEW PASSING COMBINATION

A new passing combination, Herman Rohrig to Roy McKay, provided the Packers with the first of their two touchdowns. He covered 20 yards and was set up when tackle Baby Ray recovered an All-Star fumble on the 20-yard All-Star line. The All-Stars then began to fight back and scored shortly after on a pass play for 62 yards, Kennedy to end Nick Scollard of St. Joseph's of Indiana. Then Mr. Hutson provided a turning point in the game with a brilliant 85-yard run with an intercepted pass. Thirty-two years old and claiming he is all done with active duty, Hutson showed that he still has plenty of zip in those legs of his. He outran the younger collegians who tried to catch up and crossed by some defensive maneuvering by ends Clyde Goodnight and Nolan Luhn and McKay, who knocked down at least a trio of opposition. There was no question about it. The last quarter touchdown broke the All-Stars' hearts and from then on the Packers had things pretty much their own

way. The crowd sensed that the champions had proved themselves. This does not mean that they didn't make mistakes. They did, particularly early in the game, but at the end they had the situation wholly under control and it was the All-Stars who looked tired and not the "old" Packer team.

### **GOLDENBERG, PERKINS SHINE**

For at least two other Packers who are retiring from professional football, the games they turned in were fitting climaxes to their careers. They were guard Buckets Goldenberg and fullback Don Perkins. Goldenberg was a bulwark on defense and Perkins ran like a madman. But there were others too who played outstanding ball. Among them Capt. Charley Brock, Baby Ray, Chet Adams, all veterans, and rookie ends Clyde Goodnight and Nolan Luhn. In the backfield, McKay got his first big chance with the Packers and he turned in a worthwhile performance. Then there were those other handy gentlemen to help out - Fritsch, Lou Brock, Larry Craig, Rohrig and Joe Laws. Those are the names that come to mind most readily but to the others must go a full share of credit. The All-Stars had their extra stars too. Halfback Charley Trippi of Georgia is all he is said to be and the game honors should be split among him and tackle Bill Willis of Ohio State and guard Damon Tassos of Texas A. and M.

### **HARMON CROWD FAVORITE**

Tommy Harmon, the ex-Michigan ace, was a crowd favorite and he pulled off several neat runs that made Packer fans gasp just a little bit. Harmon, who joined the team only a week ago, did find the going rather rugged but he must be given credit for his part in the drama. It would be nice to say that the collegians posted a moral victory but that isn't so. The Packers won, fair and square, indicating they will be anything but a floor mat during the rapidly approaching league season. The Packers had the margin in points and also in some of the statistics. They got 15 first downs to the All-Stars' 12, 132 yards rushing to 68. But the collegians, throwing passes all over the place and with a good deal of threat to the Packers' well-being, outgained the team that has become recognized as the powerhouse in the air. The collegians, with Trippi doing most of the hurling, gained 162 yards passing to 95 for Green Bay. It should be noted, however, that the Stars passed 32 times and the Packers only 24.

### **FAREWELL FOR THREE**

All things considered, it is no more than fair to the Packers to say that they deserved the victory and to Mr. Huston, it that was his last professional game as a player, goes a large bouquet for bowing out exceptionally well. This also goes for Perkins and Goldenberg. The former is going into the high school teaching field and Buckets has to tend to his business interests. The game got underway promptly in a temperature that had dropped considerably from the afternoon heat aided by a northeast wind off the lake. The All-Stars won the toss and chose to defend the goal with the wind at their backs. This meant they would kick off to Green Bay. Don Greenwood of Illinois booted to Hutson on the 22 and Don took it back to the Packers' 43. A pass, Irv Comp to Lou Brock, was good for 24 yards and a first down on the collegians' 33. Comp then tossed

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to Fritsch on the 30 and plowed through left guard to the 27. Another Comp to Hutson aerial was good to the 19 for a first down. A pass failed and Comp ripped through to the 14. Hutson took the ball on an end around to the 12 and the stage was set for a fourth down field goal attempt. Eleven minutes remained in the first quarter as Hutson went back to the 20-yard line, accompanied by Lou Brock. With unerring accuracy, Hutson booted the ball through the middle for the first of 11 points he was to make that night. After an exchange of punts following the kickoff, the collegians moved to the Green Bay 44 to the 20, gaining two first downs in the process. A five-yard penalty put the ball on the 16 after a plunge lost a yard and a pass was knocked down by Hutson. Here Capt. Charley Brock lived up to his name as a ball hawk, when he snatched Trippi's pass on the Packer 8 and ran it back to the 24 to nullify the threat. The Packers were forced to punt and again the All-Stars began to move, this time from their own 33 to the Packers' 35, an attack featured by two passes by Perry Moss of Tulsa to Bob Huber of Notre Dame and Edmund Shedlosky of Tulsa. But again the wide-awake defense of the Packers proved effective, this time with Laws providing the heroics on an interception of Moss' pass on the 15 and return to the 27. It was now time for Green Bay to start offensive fireworks.

#### PERKINS, MCKAY ADVANCE

Perkins ran, McKay ran and passed to Harry Jacunski for a first down on the Packers' 45. Laws did one of his patented up-the-middle dashes for 17 yards to the collegians' 38 and then a repeat to the 35, from where Perkins made it another first down on the 20 on a left end skirt. Two passes were no good and a line play lost two yards and the Packers had to do something. Comp dropped back to pass and Kennedy intercepted the ball in the end zone. Kennedy seemed a little bewildered when he caught the ball. He stood still, walked to about the three-yard line and then dashed back into his own end zone where he was dropped for a safety. The two-pointer came just after the second quarter started and gave the Bays a 5-0 lead. The stage was soon set for Green Bay's first touchdown. Shortly after the kickoff, Mitchell intercepted Comp's pass on the 25 and returned to the 38. The Packers held and the collegians punted. Fritsch punched through twice from the Packer 26 to the 35 and then McKay shot a pass to Hutson on the 45 for 11 yards. Three plays advanced the ball to the All Stars 49 from where McKay punted into the end zone. On first down, Walter Schlinkman, All-Star fullback and No. 1 choice of the Packers in the last league draft, fumbled and Baby Ray recovered on the 20. On first down, Rohrig dropped back and threw a perfect pass to McKay, who caught it on the 5 and went into the end zone without being touched. Hutson kicked the point after with Laws holding. The Packers led, 12-0, and the All-Star fans felt the bottom has really dropped out. But they sighed too soon. Not more than two minutes later, the collegians clicked. Harmon started it off by returning the kickoff from his goal line to the 27. He then threaded through to the 31. Kennedy failed to gain, but Harmon picked up a first down to the 38, running nicely. Probably trying harder because of his boner just before, Kennedy wheeled back and hurled a pass to Scollard, who caught it on the Green Bay 35 and ambled all the way home. Harmon kicked the extra point to make it 13-0 just before the end of the half. Things started fast in the second half. The first break came when Jacunski recovered Trippi's fumble on the All-Star 26. A line buck gained two yards and then Tex Warrington intercepted Lou Brock's pass on

the 15 and then returned it to the 25. A triple-decker, Kennedy to Trippi to Foster, brought the ball to the 45. Trippi recovered his own fumble on the 44 but a 5 and 15-yard penalty on the All-Stars took it back to the 24. Trippi picked up 12 and then tossed to Greenwood on the 45. Trippi ran back to his 10 and then returned the ball to the 41 for no loss or gain. Trippi punted to the Packers' 12.

### TASSOS RECOVERS FUMBLE

Brock and Perkins combined to bring it to the 32 and, after a one yard loss, Tassos recovered Comp's fumble on the 24. Comp was hurt on the play but not as serious as at first believed. Three passes by Moss were no good and a fourth by Trippi was intercepted by Huston on the 10 and run back to the 18. Perkins and McKay combined on six plays for a pair of first downs to the midfield stripe. Then Trippi intercepted McKay's pass on the 5 and returned it to the 34. Two collegian plays put the ball on the 30 after an offside. Harmon, still capable of drawing applause, pulled off his best run of the night right then. Slipping between end and tackle, he dashed down to the Packer 19, where he was dumped hard by Charley Brock, who came up with the ball. The 46-yard run was nullified, causing fans some discontent. But it was evened up

almost immediately when Bell recovered Laws' fumble on the All-Star 31 as the third quarter ended. The All-Stars were trying desperately, Moss pitched to Bell for nine yards to the 22. On second down, Moss passed again but this time Hutson was waiting. Racing in from the defensive halfback spot, he grabbed the ball on the fly and lit out along the east sidelines like a zephyr. He seemed to literally zoom past All-Stars in his path. Charley Mitchell tried desperately to catch him but Goodnight kept him out of the way aided by Luhn. Hutson put the finishing touch on the 85-yard dash and the evening by kicking the point after to make it 19-7. It seemed as though the All-Stars flattened somewhat after that. The Packer ground game bit off sizeable chunks and defensively there were two bits of head-up play. The first was McKay's interception of Trippi's pas on the Packers 10 and the second was Lou Brock's recovery of Les Horvath's fumble on the All-Star's 25. The fumble occurred after the All-Stars punched just once more down to within breathing distance of the goal line. Trippi intercepted McKay's pass on the 35 and dashed back to the two, where he was knocked out of bounds by Laws. Trippi was hurt on the play and had to be taken out. An offside penalty on the All-Stars put the ball on the seven and then Lou spiked the attack when he pounced on Horvath's fumble. The Packers moved leisurely at the end from their own 23 to the All-Star 33, picking up two first downs en route.

## *Play by Play Story of Pros' 19-7 Victory Over All-Stars*

### **PLAY BY PLAY STORY OF PROS' 19 TO 7 VICTORY OVER ALL-STARS**

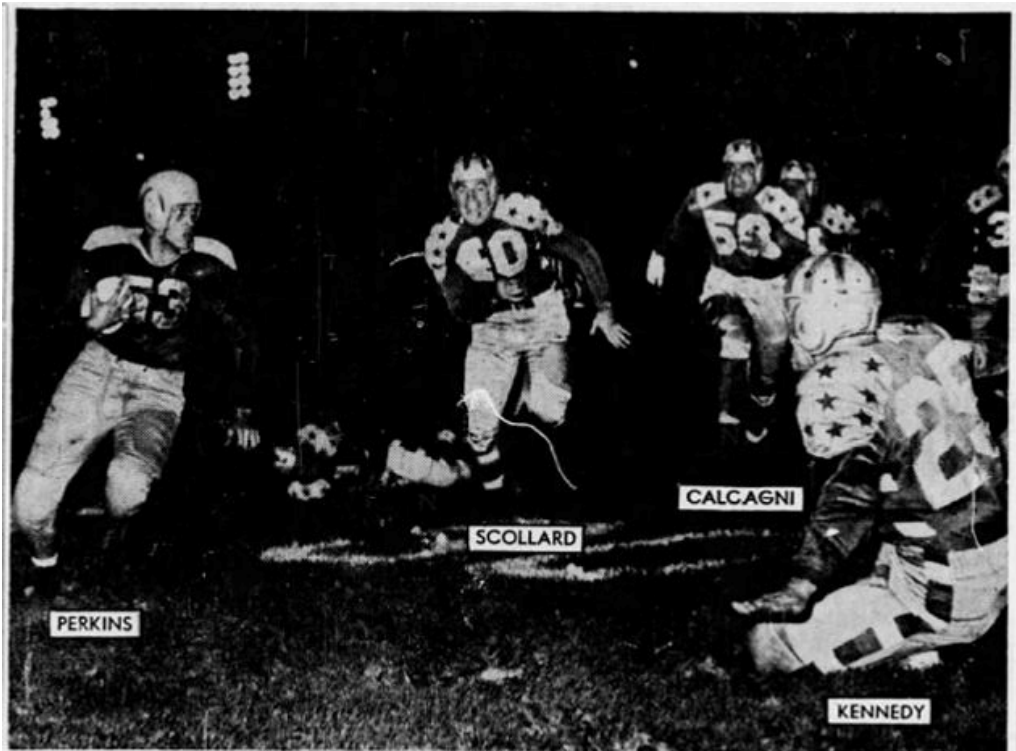
AUGUST 31 (Chicago) - Following is a play by play account of the 12th annual All-Star football game in Soldiers' field last night:

**FIRST QUARTER** - The All-Stars won the toss and chose the north goal. Don Greenwood kicked off to Don Hutson, who returned 21 yards to the Packers' 44. Comp passed wide to Lou Brock on the first play and the latter raced down the sidelines 24 yards to the Collegians' 32. Another pass, Comp to Fritsch, was good for 3 yards. After Comp made 3 at center he whipped a pass over the middle to Hutson on the 19 yard line. A pass was incomplete and Comp hit right tackle for 5. Hutson made 3 on an end around and on fourth down he kicked a field goal from 20 yard line. Score - Green Bay 3; All-Stars 0. Sorenson kicked off to Trippi who returned 12 yards to the All-Stars' 25. Trippi failed to gain and the collegians were offside. Kennedy made two yards on a buck and Trippi kicked 78 yards over the Packers' goal for a touchback, placing the ball on the 20 yard line. Three plays netter only two yards and Lou Brock kicked to Trippi who returned 5 yards to the Packers' 44. After Kennedy lost 3 on a buck, Trippi passed over the middle to Huber of Notre Dame for 16 yards on the Packers' 21. Greenwood made 5 on a reverse and Trippi picked up 5 more on a delayed buck for a first down on the 20. Trippi failed to gain at end, but the Packers were penalized 5 yards for offside. Trippi's pass on the goal line was intercepted by Charley Brock, who returned to the Packers' 27 yard line. The Packers couldn't gain in three plays and McKay punted out of bounds on the All-Stars' 33. Kennedy made 3 at right tackle and Moss passed to Huber for 15 yards, putting the ball on the Packers' 49. Another pass, Moss to Shedlosky, was good for 12 and another first down on Green Bay's 35. Kennedy made 3 at center. A pass to Huber was incomplete. A second pass was intercepted by Joe Laws, who returned 5 yards to the Packers' 27. Perkins swept left end for 3. McKay rifled a pass to Jacunski for 13 yards and Laws went inside right tackle for 16 to the All-Stars' 38. Laws went over tackle for 3 yards as the first quarter ended. Score - Green Bay 3; All-Stars 0

**SECOND QUARTER** - Tom Harmon entered the All-Star lineup at left half. Perkins of the Packers hit right tackle for 15 yards. Rohrig failed to gain on a buck. McKay hit the same spot for 3 but the Packers were penalized five yards for offside. Kennedy intercepted Comp's pass in the end zone and carried it out 2 yards and then retreated behind the goal line where he was tackled for a safety. Score - Green Bay 5; All-Stars 0. Hutson returned the Collegians' free kick to the All-Stars' 48. Two plays gained only 2 yards and Comp's long pass was intercepted by Mitchell who returned 15 yards to the All-Stars' 38. The Collegians couldn't gain and on fourth down Harmon punted to Comp on the Packers' 31. The Packers were penalized 5 yards for offside. On the next play Fritsch smacked center for 6 and then picked up 3 more at the same spot. McKay shot a pass down the center to Hutson for 11 yards and a first down on the Packers' 44. After two passes were incomplete, McKay punted over the goal line for a touchback, giving the All-Stars possession on their 20 yard line. Walter Schlinkman fumbled on the first play and Ray recovered for Green Bay on the Collegian's 20. Rohrig passed wide to McKay, who ran 10 yards for a touchdown. Hutson placekicked the extra point. Score - Green Bay 12; All-Stars 0. Harmon received the kickoff behind the goal line and returned 30 yards to the Collegian's 27. Harmon hit tackle for 4 and picked up 7 more on a lateral from Greenwood. Kennedy faked an end run and passed to Nick Scollard who raced 30 yards for a touchdown. Harmon kicked the extra point. Score - Green Bay 12; All-Stars 7. Bentz kicked off to Fritsch who returned 5 yards to the Packers' 34 yard line. Laws got three at center and Perkins went around his left end for 13 yards. Four pass plays were

incomplete and the All-Stars took possession on the Packers' 49. Trippi went around his left end for 15 yards as the second quarter ended. Score - Green Bay 12; All-Stars 7.

**THIRD QUARTER** - Sorenson kicked off for Green Bay over the goal line and the Collegians took the ball on their 20 yard line. Kennedy sliced through center for 13 and Trippi added three more at left tackle. Trippi fumbled, on the next play and Jacunski recovered for Green Bay on the All-Stars' 25 yard line. Perkins made a yard at center. On the next play Warrington intercepted Lou Brock's pass and returned 12 yards to the Collegians' 24. Kennedy passed over center to Trippi who ran 15 yards to the All-Stars' 45. The All-Stars were penalized 15 yards for holding but Trippi gained back 10 on a quick opening

play at center. Two plays gained 3 yards and Trippi kicked to the Packers' 12 yard line. After an incomplete pass, Perkins broke through right tackle for 10 yards, then hit the other side for 9. Comp fumbled on the next play and Tassos recovered for the All-Stars on the Packers' 34 yard line. Three consecutive passes were broken up by the Packers. Trippi's fourth down pass was intercepted by Hutson who returned 5 yards to the Packers' 18. McKay whipped a pass to Hutson for 12 yards. After two plays failed to gain, McKay passed over the middle to Luhn on the Packers' 49 yard line. Trippi intercepted McKay's long pass and returned 27 yards to the Collegians' 34. Horvath made a yard on a quick opening play but the All-Stars were penalized five yards for offside. On the next play Harmon raced around his right end for 46 yards. He fumbled when tackled and the ball was recovered by Charley Brock for Green Bay on its 24 yard line. Fritsch made 8 yards around his right end. Laws smacked center for three but fumbled when tackled and Bell recovered for the All Stars on the Packers' 35 yard line as the quarter ended. Score - Green Bay 12; All-Stars 7.

Two plays gained 5 yards and McKay's pass was intercepted by Trippi who returned 36 yards to the Packers' 2 yard line. He was injured on the play and replaced by Les Horvath. Allen made a yard at center but the Collegians were penalized five yards for offside. Horvath fumbled on the next play and Monaco recovered for Green Bay on the 20. Perkins went around left end for 44 yards before being caught from behind on the All-Stars' 41. The Packers made 9 yards in two plays but were penalized 15 for holding. Smiles Cover Lambeau's Face As He Praises  
Players for Excellent Work On Soldier Field

## SMILES COVER LAMBEAU'S FACE AS HE PRAISES PLAYERS FOR EXCELLENT WORK ON SOLDIER FIELD

AUG 31 (Chicago) - Coach Lambeau had a big smile on his face this Thursday night and he walked from one end of the Soldier Field dressing room to the other, slapping this Packers on the back, offering a word of encouragement to that one, and generally showing that he was pleased with the way matters stood. He had just come off the stadium sidelines and the figures 19 and 7 were etched in his mind. There was good reason for the coach to say, "I'm certainly happy that the team won the ball game. Sure, we made some mistakes but we took advantage of the breaks as they came. I said before that I would be disappointed if we didn't win, so now I'm happy that we did win." It was something of a personal triumph for the Green Bay coach because it marked the second time in three starts against the Collegians that his Packers had come through. There were those who chortled when the team lost the first time, 6-0. But they had to eat their

words in 1941, when the Green Bay team romped to a 45-28 victory that broke all scoring records for the annual classic...THIS IS CLINCHER: Now this year's victory would seem to be even more convincing proof that a good professional team can beat a hand-picked squad of collegians. The series record bears this out - the pros have won seven, lost three and two games ended in ties, the first in 1934 and the second in 1936. Line Coach Walt Kiesling was happy, too. His line bore up well under the All-Star thrusts and since this was Walt's first time out as line coach, he had reason to be proud. Johnny Blood, who spent the pregame period as the squad's Morale Builder, was smiling all over the place, his only regret probably being that he didn't get into the ball game. Instead, he handled the field end of the telephone while Kiesling spotted from above in the press box...HUTSON STILL MASTER: Asst. Coach Don Hutson is still the master. He received a tremendous cheer from the 92,000 fans after his 85-yard touchdown run, and he deserved it. Lambeau put it very well when he said, "He hasn't lost any of his speed and deception. That's one of the outstanding things I remember about the game." Hutson's 11 points raised his all-time total to 739 points. Hutson deprecated his part in the victory and turned his attention to the ability of Capt. Charley Brock, calling him "the best center in the league for the last couple years but he never got credit." Between times, Buckets Goldenberg was proclaiming to one and all that "I have made my last stand. Enough is enough." This brought chuckles from some of the players, including Hutson, who reminded him to be on time for practice next Tuesday morning. Hutson said he would turn his attention to coaching from now on. This also brought some smiles...The 92,753 people who crammed the field for the game paid \$221,550 for tickets. Net receipts will be distributed by Chicago Tribune Charities, Inc., to worthy causes...BACK IN A BOMBER: Capt. Herman Rohrig, who spent a leave practicing with the Packers and who pitched the first touchdown pass to Roy McKay, will ride back to Texas in a B-17 bomber. Fifteen members of the Fort Worth Army Air field came up for the game in the ship. In the group was Major Doug Fessendon, the field football coach on leave from Montana. Sgt. Bob Adkins, who returned immediately to DeShong General hospital in Pennsylvania, hopes to get a discharge soon. He spent 27 months in Australia. He does physical rehabilitation work at DeShong...VICTORY CEREMONY: The between-halves ceremony, as usual, was excellent. The 126-piece band under the direction of Ray Dvorak of Wisconsin started the program by forming a huge bomber in the dark stadium. Each musician had two lights on his or her cap, lighted by small batteries. The band formed the letters V-J and V-E. The climax came when the musicians, divided into three groups, signified the return of soldiers from overseas by forming

Incidentally, two of Frnka's boys (Clyde Goodnight and Nolan Luhn) played with the Packers and eight with the All-Stars...**FAMILY REUNIONS:** Among relatives of players at the game were Capt. Raymond Hutson, brother of Don, who recently returned from flying "The Hump" in China and who is now with the Military Air transport, and Forest Ray, brother of Baby and almost as big. Quite a few people lost good hats when they threw them up in the air when Don Hutson unraveled his 85-yard touchdown run. The Packers had new gold pants and blue jerseys with gold numerals for the game. The All-Stars were dressed in the traditional silver and blue. Bob Conrad, Packer scout, spotted for Harry Wismer, who did the broadcast for Mutual and overseas stations. Jack Brickhouse was on the field microphone...Roy McKay had a reunion with Billy Andrews, erstwhile manager of the All-Stars. Andrews and McKay attended Texas university at the same time and are close friends. Andrews won fame at Texas as the extra-point-kicking waterboy. He won a latter for his accuracy, too...

Chet Adams, who played a lot of tackle, was hurt when an All-Star player caught his knee from the sideline late in the game. Adams had difficulty walking and apparently was the most seriously injured player. Irv Comp, who was carried out on a stretcher, had the wind knocked out of him and later returned to the game. #### **HUTSON HAS KIND WORD FOR BLOCKERS**

AUG 31 (Chicago) - The man who ran 85 yards for the game breaking play in the Packers' 19 to 7 victory over the college All-Stars was puffing when he threw himself wearily on the grass in front of the pro champions' bench. "Hutson, get in



shape," said Don Hutson out loud. Trainer Bud Jorgenson almost reverently gave Don's face a bath with his wet sponge. "That was Clyde Goodnight and Charley Brock who blocked for me," said the Packers' great 32 year old end who had climaxed his fourth appearance in the College All-Star series with the run that wrapped up the game for the Packers. The fourth quarter was less than a minute old when Hutson intercepted Perry Moss' pass on the Green Bay 15 yard line. The play had started 31 yards away and the All-Stars were going after the touchdown which could wipe out Green Bay's 12 to 7 lead. Hutson took care of that with his run and the extra point he kicked, giving him 11 of the winners' points on a touchdown, a field goal and two extra point kicks...**THAT MAKES DON'S ALL-STAR SCORING TOTAL 30 POINTS:** This gave Hutson a total of 30 points in his last two All-Star game with the Packers, more points than any other individual has scored in the series. "How many yards did you say I ran?" he asked. "I thought it was somewhere between 300 and 350. The All-Stars had tried that play before - a pass in the flat to the left end. It had caught me by surprise, but I was ready for that next one." This may have been Hutson's last competitive appearance, just as it was for Buckets Goldenberg, the Packer guard. "I think it was my last game," said Hutson. Coach Curly Lambeau, mildly nervous in his victory moment, said he and Hutson will talk over Don's playing future soon. Hutson has been threatening to retire for three years. There was just one big outburst by the Packers as they clumped into the dressing room. Then followed a series of quiet personal congratulations as the players leisurely peeled off their soggy garments. Lambeau made the rounds, affectionately slapping the perspiring warriors...**A SOLDIER NAMED TURNER CALLS ON PACKER COACH:** A burly soldier advanced on Lambeau and said, "Curly, meet Maj. Ed Walker, my athletic officer." Lambeau, showing no recognition of the GI, shook hands with the major. "My name's Turner," grinned the big fellow, "the Bulldog of the Bears." "I can't see so well without my glasses," confessed Curly. Then they started playfully wrestling. Turner will play for the Second Air Force team this fall. "I don't know just what to say," said Lambeau when asked to sum up his reactions to the game. "I will say this, the All-Stars had a strong defense for us. They were alert, well drilled, and kept rushing our passers all night long. I was kind of happy about our defense, but was somewhat disappointed in our offense. I thought we made a nice start, then bogged down, but came back later in the game."

## Packers Resume Drills Tuesday For Three Non-League Contests

### **PACKERS RESUME DRILLS TUESDAY FOR THREE NON-LEAGUE CONTESTS**

SEPT 1 (Green Bay) - Over their first hurdle, the Packers rested today but were preparing to begin practice Tuesday morning for a trio of non-league contests in the east against Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Washington. The first exhibition will be against the Eagles in Philadelphia's huge Municipal stadium Sept. 13. The second is set for Hershey, Pa., against the Steelers Sept. 19 and the finale against the Redskins in the capital Sept. 23. After the All-Star game, won by the Packers, 19-7, Coach Curly Lambeau indicated that long workouts will be held here from next Tuesday until a week from Monday. The team will leave for the east on the morning of Sept. 11 and will not return to the city until Sept. 24. Six days later the league season will be opened at City stadium against the Chicago Bears...**VETERAN LEAVE SQUAD:** Lambeau, although expressing delight that the Packers defeated the All-Stars, knows that the team is not yet entirely ready for the championship defense and there are other complications that will have to be eased before the prospect is bright. The services of several veterans will be lacking and this provides Lambeau with his biggest problem. Among those who definitely will not be around are end Harry Jacunski, who will resume his coaching job at Notre Dame, Capt. Herman Rohrig and Sgt. Bob Adkins, backs, and Lt. Chet Adams, tackle, who must return to their camps; fullback Don Perkins, one of the stars in Thursday's game, who is taking a high school coaching job; guard Buckets Goldenberg, who has retired after 12 seasons; and halfback Paul Duhart, who will join the Pittsburgh team next week...**WILL HUTSON PLAY?:** The big question among Packer fans is, of course, whether Asst. Coach and end Don Hutson will play this year. There can be little question about the fact that Hutson's services as a player are needed for the championship defense. His value was proved again against the All-Stars when he scored 11 of the team's 19 points, including an 85-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter that put the finishing touches on the All-Star hopes for a victory. Hutson showed that he can still put on tremendous speed when the occasion arises. When he intercepted an All-Star pass on the Green Bay 15-yard line, he moved along easily at first and then began to stretch out as several teammates formed a defense for him. The run showed Hutson capable of turning on the speed that has been the despair of opponents for 10 seasons...**MAY CHANGE MIND:** Hutson said after the Chicago contest that he would turn his attention to coaching only. It is probable that he intends to do that but the season is still a month away and when the first

game approaches, he may change his mind. Only time will tell. The squad should be in good physical condition for the eastern exhibitions. No one was seriously hurt and the four-day layoff will give bumps and bruises a chance to heal.

### 1 DEAD, 15 HURT IN FREAK CRASH

SEPT 1 (Green Bay) - Pablo Martinez, 50, Mexican beet weeder, was killed, his son was reported injured fatally, and 15 passengers on the North Western's crack "400" from Chicago to Ishpeming was cut, bruised and shaken up in a freak accident south of Fond du Lac about 6 o'clock Friday evening. Carrying 1,452 Labor Day passengers, more than 100 of them from Green Bay, including several members of the Packer squad and fans returning from the All-Star game, the streamliner was speeding north at an estimated 85 miles an hour. At the County Trunk E crossing near Eden, about five miles south of Fond du Lac, Martinez approached from the west, driving a heavy sedan converted into a truck, in which he was carrying a goat. The truck struck the tap car of the streamliner, directly behind the Diesel power unit, and was thrown up the bank of a cut. Again and again, it rolled down into the train, smashing windows and ripping off hand-rails...WINDOWS ARE SHATTERED: Most of the casualties were in two old-style coaches not equipped with shatter-

proof glass, although the impact was so violent that even some of the shatter-proof windows were pierced. Mrs. George Calhoun, 34, Blumberg, Pa., en route to Marquette, Mich., suffered bruises and a cut over her eye. She was taken off the train here and brought to St. Vincent hospital, where his condition is not regarded as serious. Dr. H.S. Atkinson, Packer physician, was on the train with his first-aid equipment, and treated several of the injured. Dr. W.C. Jones, Menominee eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, also aided the victims, as did an unidentified Navy hospital corpsman, and several student nurses. Martinez was fatally crushed under the motor of the truck, torn out when the auto was thrown up the bank. His companion, said to have been his son, is reported to have died, but this has not been confirmed. The goat was so badly injured that it had to be destroyed. The truck was "rolled up like ball", according to H.J. Bero, Green Bay police inspector, who was one of the passengers...TWO SAVED FROM DEATH: A soldier and a sailor were saved from death by the warning of a porter, according to Urban Jannsen, 912 Harrison street, who witnessed the incident. The

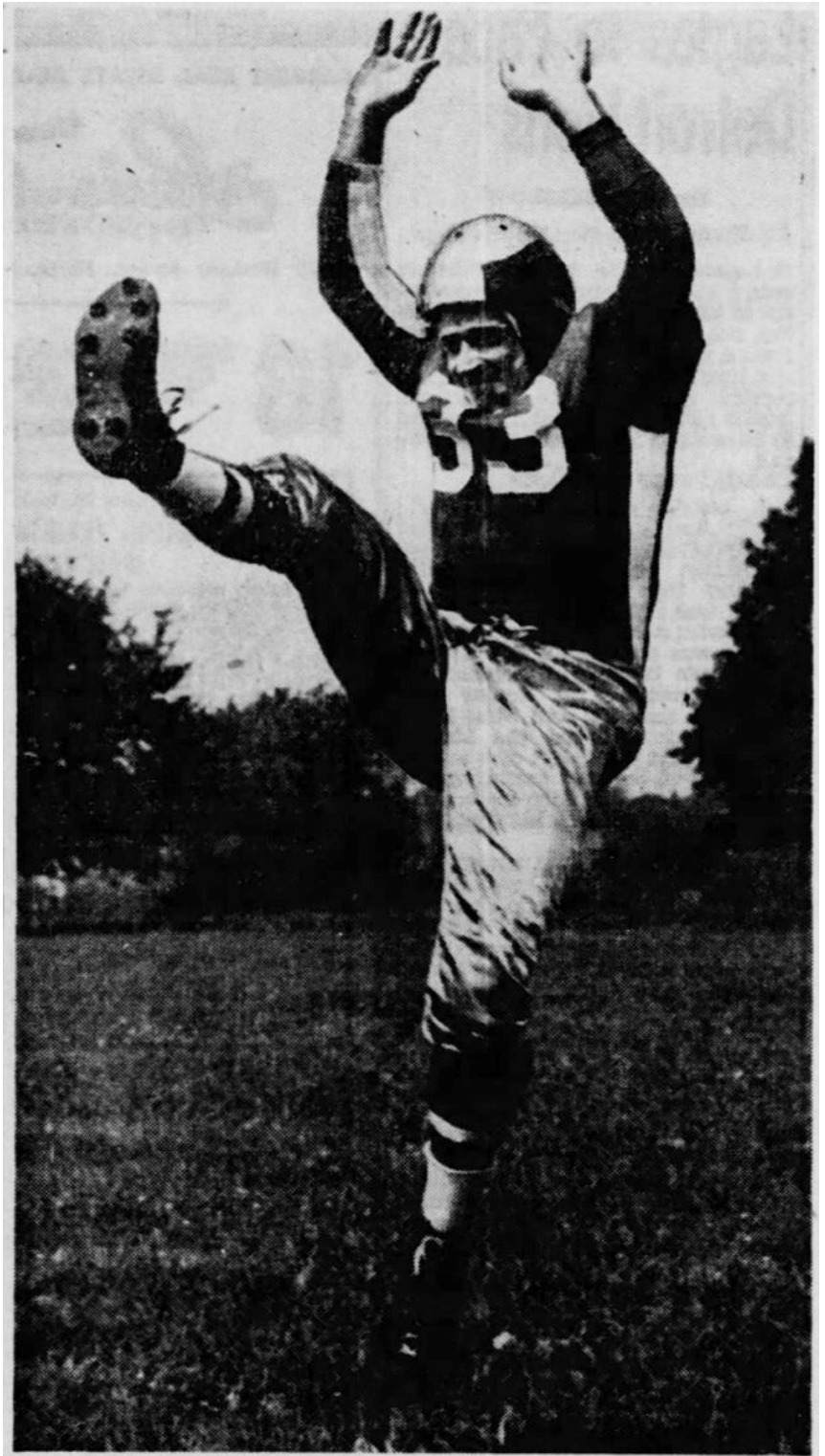
servicemen were leaning out a vestibule window, after opening the upper half of the door. "Better not do that, boys," the porter warned. An instant later the truck hit the vestibule, damaging both sides of the opening out of which the men had been leaning. Car department employees from Green Bay and Escanaba were summoned by wire, and worked all night replacing broken windows. When the train arrived this noon on the return trip all but one coach had been restored to serviceable condition...LITTLE MECHANICAL DAMAGE: The only mechanical damage was to the tap car generator, which was ripped from its mounting. However, current could be fed to the tap car from the other coaches, officials said. Sides of the cars were badly scratched and dented, and were punctured in several places. It will be necessary to dismantle the interior to make permanent repairs, according to C.A. Gustafson, general car foreman here. However, the coaches are so badly needed that these repairs probably will be postponed for some time. So crowded was the train, with the aisles packed with standees, that getting aid to the injured, or securing information, proved difficult. The streamliner arrived in Green Bay more than two hours late.

## **CROWLEY DECLARES OPEN WAR ON NATIONAL GRID LOOP**

SEPT 1 (Chicago) - Elmer Layden and "Sleepy Jim" Crowley, backfield pals on Notre Dame's famous "Four Horsemen" team of 1924, today were bitterly opposing one another as commissioner of rival professional football leagues. Layden, commissioner of the established NFL, was the string-bean fullback of the scampering "Horsemen" while Crowley, commissioner of the newly-created All-America football conference, was the sleepy-eyed, fast-moving left halfback. They were workhorses on Knute Rockne's great team of more than two decades ago, both of them close college friends. But that is all past because today Crowley declared war on Layden's National league. Closing out a two-day meeting here, the All-America conference here laid definite plans for making its debut in 1946 and also announced it planned to continue to raid the NFL of its players. "We originally resolved not to tamper with the National league players," Crowley said, "but since the NFL snubbed us we see no reason why we can't hire their players." Crowley, former Fordham coach, reported that the seven All-America clubs already have hired more than 150 players, including four former National leaguers. The directors are expected to accept an eighth club today, bring their franchises to full proportions. Crowley announced Friday that the members had been divided into North and South divisions, and that a championship game would be played annually between the two divisional winners, just as in the National league. The North division will include Chicago, Cleveland, New York and Buffalo, while the South will be composed of Los Angeles, San Francisco, Miami and the new member, probably Baltimore. Each team will play 14 leagues games on a home-and-home basis. The four National leaguers will have signed All-America contracts are Hampton Pool, formerly of the Chicago Bears, and Jim Poole, ex-New York Giant star, both with Miami, and Lou Rymkus, Washington Redskin tackle, and Bob Steuber, another Chicago Bear player, both with Cleveland. At the All-America's meeting here last April, when the A-A approached the NFL with a "peace" offer, Layden told the new league to "get a football and play a game first." In referring to that snub, Crowley remarked that "Mr. Layden knows by now, no doubt, that we have a football."

### **NEW PRO LEAGUE TO PLAY IN NORTH-SOUTH DIVISIONS**

SEPT 1 (Chicago) - Girding for a knockdown, dragout battle with the NFL for postwar patronage, the new All-American conference Saturday announced its eight clubs will play in north-south divisions in 1946. Commissioner James Crowley, left halfback of Notre Dame's famed four horsemen backfield, presiding at the opening session of a two day organizational

meeting, said the All-America would line up as follows for sectional competitions: North Section - Chicago, Cleveland, New York and Buffalo. South Section - Los Angeles, Miami, San Francisco and a fourth city to be selected at the current meeting. All teams will face each other on a home and home basis, playing 14 games each during the regular season. The sectional champions will meet at the winning south city at Christmas time, Crowley said. The National league operated on an east-west sectional basis. Asserting that the league has contracted the services of more than 150 players and has booked playing sites for every member, Crowley declared: "The All-America league has a football now and it's blown up." The jibe was in retort to a comment made last winter by Commissioner Elmer Layden of the NFL after the All-America had tossed a peace feeler. The National league, Layden asserted, could not talk cooperation with a rival that "doesn't even own a football yet." "We'll tend to our knitting and let the chips fall where they may," Crowley asserts, adding that he would open a league office in the Empire State building at New York around September 10. He emphasized that since Layden threw down the gauntlet, the All-America has stepped on the National league's toes by signing away such players as Bob Steuber of the Chicago Bears and Lou Rymkus of the Washington Redskins. "We previously agreed to stay away from National league contracted players, but now it has to be every man for himself," Crowley said.

### **CURLY LAMBEAU DID A GREAT JOB; NOW HE'S FACING TOUGHER TASK**

SEPT 2 (Milwaukee Journal) - One name above all others stands out in the 19-7 victory of the Green Bay Packers over the College All-Stars Thursday night, and it wasn't mentioned much in any of the stories of the game. It is Curly Lambeau's name. The big Belgian, who organized the Packers in 1919 and who has been "a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night" to them ever since, did one of the finest all-around coaching jobs of his career in preparation for the game.

Certainly, in any analysis, he did a better job than Bernie Bierman. He had no better material, except perhaps for Hutson, no more of it, if as much, and no more time in which to get ready. Yet he had a sharper team mentally, as well conditioned a team physically, despite the fact that he dealt with many older men, and a better prepared team mechanically. There may be an inclination to ascribe Green Bay's superiority in the mechanics of play to coordination carried over from the year before. To an extent this is true, but only to an extent. There have been other All-Star teams which have not

only been as sharp or sharper mentally than the pros, but just as sharp or sharper mechanically. Harry Stuhldreher's team two years ago was one...**A HEALTH SITUATION:** In only one thing, beside the presence of a man like Hutson, did Lambeau probably have a potential coaching advantage. There were things written about the Packers before the game which cast doubt over their chances. There were other things written about the All-Stars which cast further doubt. Lambeau squeezed both of them dry - to Green Bay's advantage. At no time did he let his players forget what some people thought of them. He worked in an ideal psychological situation. The further truth is that Lambeau, regardless of what the "I told you so boys" now say, was honestly worried. He himself was in a healthy coaching mood. He refused to kid himself. He knew the shortcomings of his own material and the strengths of the All-Stars and he had an honest doubt about the outcome - at one time almost a fear. "We'll have to be at our best to win," he said the day before the game, and he meant it. And who thought the Packers - those "old" men - could really be at their best in three week's time? If they weren't, they were still close enough to it to win...**MISTAKES COSTLY:** The breaks went to the Packers, which isn't strange, however, for they generally go to a team prepared as the Packers were. The team not so well prepared will miss little opportunities and will make little mistakes, and the All-Stars did both. The opportunities they missed were many. Their consolation touchdown developed on a play begun on their own 38 yard line. On their real scoring opportunities, of which there were seven, they were consistently stopped, and not always by Green Bay. Their own mistakes were costly. Harmon, for instance, fumbled on Green Bay's 23 yard line. Horvath fumbled on Green Bay's six. Kennedy gave the Packers an outright gift of two points on his inexplicable safety. Perry Moss, on one series of downs inside Green Bay's 35, threw four of the worst passes of the

They had position seven times and this is what happened to them: With the ball on Green Bay's 16 yard line, Lou Brock intercepted a pass; with the ball on the 34, Laws intercepted a pass; with the ball on the 35 and about 15 seconds of the first half left, they failed to lineup in time to get off another play; with the ball on the 34, Moss threw four wild passes (and he had just relieved one of the great backs of the night, Chuck Trippi); with the ball on the 29, McKay intercepted a pass, and, with the ball on the six, Horvath fumbled. The Packers had good position only five times, but see what they did! They reached the 12 yard line and Hutson booted a field goal; they reached the 20 yard line, then got two points on Kennedy's interception; they got position on the 20 again on Schlinkman's fumble and scored on one play, Rohrig to McKay; they recovered Trippi's fumble on the 25 yard line, then lost the ball when Warrington intercepted a pass, and they reached the 32 yard line, then lost their chance because of a 15 yard penalty...**HEAVY LOSSES NOW:** Whether Hutson, who has said that this would be his last fame, will have a change of mind and continue through the season appears to be one of the burning questions in Packer circles. Certainly Hutson himself must have found encouragement in his showing Thursday night to continue. It is entirely up to him, though. Even Lambeau, after the game, referred everything back to Don. "Ask him," he said. And Don said, "I don't think so." What the Packers will do without him certainly casts doubt about their future, regardless of how relatively good they looked Thursday night. In addition to Hutson, they must now get along without eight others who played in the All-Star game. Dr. Berezney will go back to the practice of medicine. Herman Rohrig, Bob Adkins and Chet Adams will return to the service. Paul Duhart will go to the Pittsburgh Steelers, to whom he belongs. Buckets Goldenberg will resume his restaurant business here. Harry Jacunski will return to Notre Dame, where he will coach the ends. Don Perkins will go to Platteville State Teachers as head coach. You can't laugh off losses like these. Lambeau, though, remains, and that is the big hope. He did one grand job getting ready for the All-Stars. Maybe, even though the odds are bigger against him now, he can do it for the season, too.

#### PACKER NOTES

SEPT 4 (Milwaukee Journal) - Could it be that Carl Schlinkman, Green Bay's No. 1 man in the last draft, lost his appetite for professional football

on the one play on which he carried the ball for the College All-Stars last Thursday night - and fumbled? Schlinkman, a fullback built along the lines of Clarke Hinkle, had led Curly Lambeau to believe that he would join the Packers immediately after Thursday's game, yet Friday morning changed his mind. Under relaxed eligibility rules Schlinkman chose to return to his alma mater, Texas Tech, for another season of college ball and resisted all of Lambeau's persuasions to change his mind again. He remains the property of the Packers, however, and will report to them a year hence. Incidentally, Schlinkman, one of the highly touted backs, hardly got a fair chance in Thursday's game. On the very first play on which he was in the lineup he fumbled (Ray recovering for Green Bay on the All-Stars' 20 yard line) and was withdrawn at once...The Packers reassembled over the weekend and started work for three exhibition games on the road which will precede their league debut against the Chicago Bears at Green Bay September 30. They will work out for a week on their home grounds, then head east to meet the Eagles at Philadelphia the night of September 13, play Pittsburgh at Hershey, Pa., the night of September 19, and meet the Redskins at Washington September 23. The Packers do not play any of these opponents in the regular season. The Washington game has been sold out for three weeks. It won't be long, either, before the Bear game is sold out...Curly Lambeau himself credited Green Bay's success largely to the team's defensive line play, handing a bouquet to his line coach, Walt Kiesling...Good as the Packers looked defensively, alert as they were against everything the All-Stars tried, and as well as this augurs for the regular season, there still remains some doubt over the team's offensive power.

#### **PACKERS RETURN TO PRACTICE FOR TRIO OF NON-CHAMPIONSHIP TILTS**

SEPT 4 (Green Bay) - School children were not the only ones who marked a return to work today after a vacation. The Packer squad, depleted by the departure of at least six players who were with the team for the All-Star game, took up where they left off last Wednesday at the practice held here this morning to point for three non-league tests in the east. Rested up after a four-day vacation, the Packers will work out here for a week and leave for Philadelphia next Tuesday morning. In that city's huge Municipal stadium they will meet the strong Philadelphia Eagles in a night charity game on Sept. 13. The other two contests will be against the Pittsburgh Steelers on Sept. 19 at Hershey, Pa., and against the Washington Redskins at the capital on Sept. 23. The Hershey game will also be at night...**BEAR GAME SEPT. 30:** The non-league tests will give Coach Curly Lambeau a chance to weld a combination that must be of top efficiency for the first championship defense, the annual struggle here against the Chicago Bears, on Sept. 30. Lambeau is faced with plugging gaps left by the departure of veterans. He figures the non-league contests should help to determine how this can be best done. Those who won't be around for the title defense include linemen Buckets Goldenberg, Chet Adams and possibly Dr. Paul Berezney and backs Herman Rohrig, Don Perkins, Bob Adkins and Paul Duhart. All except Duhart, who failed to see action in the All-Star game, helped to give the Packer strength in their 19-7 triumph over the collegians and their services will be missed. It is probable that more than a considerable amount of work will be expended by the coaches on recruits. Ten of them have yet to taste professional competition and two others - linemen Ray Monaco and Don Clark - have had a smattering of it. The youngsters in the fold include linemen Clyde Goodnight and Nolan Luhn, a pair of ends from Tulsa who displayed know-how against the All-Stars, Paul Lipscomb, Ed Neal, Bob Cope, Lamar Dingler, Paul Rabalis and Francis Terrance and backs Ken Keuper and Sid Tinsley. The eastern exhibitions will give the rookies their first major opportunity to make good. The squad this year is expected to be increased to the prewar limit of 33 players now that victory over Japan has been proclaimed. The 26-player limit, in effect since 1942, should be declared off soon by Commissioner Elmer Layden of the NFL. This will, in effect, give some of the rookies more of a chance to stay with the team that they would have under the former limit.

SEPT 4 (Green Bay) - The annual rumor about a sellout for the Packer-Bear game here Sept. 30 has begun, bringing an announcement today by Ticket Director Ralph C. The office will be open from now on daily from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., including the noon hour and on Friday evening until 9 o'clock. No drive on season tickets will be held this year, Smith said, urging those who wish to purchase ducats for the three games at City stadium to do so immediately.

## **Carl Mulleneaux Rejoins Packer Team; Will Bolster End Position**

#### **CARL MULLENEAUX REJOINS PACKER TEAM; WILL BOLSTER END POSITION**

SEPT 5 (Green Bay) - Carl (Moose) Mulleneaux, regular right end for the Packers for four years before he entered the Navy, is on his way to Green Bay from California to join the team, Coach E.L. (Curly) Lambeau announced today. Mulleneaux's addition to the team has worked out Tuesday afternoon over the telephone and he departed immediately from his home in Huntington Park, Calif. Return of the big end was the first major development in the Packer camp since the All-Star game last Thursday. The former Utah State star is coming here at a time when the right end post is left without a veteran following the retirement of Harry Jacunski to enter college coaching and the induction of Ray Wheba into the Army. Mulleneaux is 6 feet 4 inches tall and weighs 215 pounds. He is rugged, tall and fast and can snatch passes. During four seasons with the Packers he made 13 touchdowns for 78 points, which places him high on the team's all-time scoring list. He is 28 years old and a brother of Lee (Brute) Mulleneaux, who formerly played with the Green Bay eleven...**TO SEE ACTION IN EAST:** Recently discharged from the Navy, Mulleneaux probably will be in good enough shape to see action in the Packers' three non-league tilts out east. The first will be next Wednesday against the Philadelphia Eagles. The other two are scheduled for

Sept. 19 against the Pittsburgh Steelers at Hershey, Pa., and for Sept. 27 against the Washington Redskins in the capital. Lambeau also announced today that the squad will be split for the trip east. Assistant Coach Don Hutson will leave with about 10 players Monday and the remainder of the squad, headed by Lambeau, will leave Tuesday. The Bay coach said single daily drills will be held in preparation for the eastern exhibitions. Mistakes made in the All-Star game and concentration on developing recruits will be the principal fate of the squad...PRAISES ASSISTANT COACHES: Having had sufficient time to consider all aspects of the All-Star game, Lambeau today praised the work done by Line Coach Walt Kiesling in readying the squad for the spectacle and he praised the alertness and keen judgment of Hutson, who scored 11 of the team's 19 points against the collegians. The Bay coach also expressed appreciation for the aid given by Eddie Kotal, who handled the backs, and Johnny Blood, who was designated as the morale builder. "Kiesling deserves a lot of credit for preparing the line for the All-Star game," Lambeau said, adding that Walt had also offered a great deal of help during the game. The work of the line was spotlighted by the fact that the collegians gained only 68 yards from rushing, including one 46-yard dash by Tommy Harmon. "Hutson's alertness and quick thinking from the time of the first kickoff and all through the game was outstanding," Curly said. This was reflected first on the kickoff when the All-Stars, refusing to use a one-inch tee allowed by the rules, figured they could catch the Packers flat-footed with a low, bouncing kick off the ground with a good chance they could recover. Hutson, seeing this, changed position and took the kickoff back 21 yards from the 22 to the 43. Eight plays later he drilled a field goal through the sticks to put the All-Stars in a hole...ANTICIPATED SAME PLAY: This alertness continued throughout the game and was emphasized nowhere better than in the 85-yard touchdown run that the veteran left end, then playing defensive halfback, uncorked on the second play of the fourth period. On the preceding play, the All-Stars had passed for nine yards to the Green Bay 22. Hutson figured they would try the same maneuver and he was waiting. Perry Moss, the Tulsa mite, did flip an aerial in exactly the same spot on second down and Hutson was waiting. He picked the oval off on the 15 and went the distance to sink the All-Star's hopes.

#### **HALFBACK BRYAN BROCK IS SIGNED BY PACKERS**

SEPT 6 (Green Bay) - Coach Curly Lambeau announced today that halfback Bryan Brock, a brother of veteran Lou, had joined the Packer team, giving the club its second brother combination. The other brother pair consists of guard Pete Tinsley and halfback Sid Tinsley. A former Purdue and Wichita university player, the younger Brock was recently discharged from the Army after having served overseas. During his first workout, Brock showed natural ability as a passer and punter, Lambeau said, adding that "we are encouraged even though he had only one practice with the team." The newcomer is 23 years old, weighs 190 pounds and is 6 feet 1 inch tall. The addition of Brock caused several shifts in the Packers' backfield assignments. Sid Tinsley, who had been at left half, was shifted to right half and Ken Keuper, a rookie from Georgia, will be used at the blocking back position. Veteran Ben Starrett, who got two flings at fullbacking last fall, will be shifted there permanently, Lambeau said...KEUPER

GOOD PUNTER: Keuper will call signals and do some punting, a department in which he has shown tremendous ability during practices. Lambeau describes Keuper's booting as "about the best we've had." Shifting of the Waukesha

griddler from fullback to blocking back gave Starrett the opportunity to go to a ball carrying spot. Further bolstering of the blocking back spot for the three exhibition games out east next week is expected when the team arrives in Philadelphia for its first contest next Thursday night against the Eagles. Veteran Bob Adkins, who played with the squad in the All-Star game, will join the team while on furlough from DeShong General hospital. He will also play in the Pittsburgh Steeler contest at Hershey on Sept. 19 and in the Washington Redskins contest Sept. 23...TEAM SHOWS IMPROVEMENT: Lambeau expressed satisfaction with the improvement being show in all departments during practice this week although he admitted the backfield could stand more power at fullback and blocking back. In the former position, only veterans Ted Fritsch and Starrett are available and as blockers veteran Larry Craig and Keuper. Since Starrett can double as a blocking back, Lambeau is particularly interested in finding another fullback to replace Don Perkins, who has retired. The tackle department has been depleted with the decision of Dr. Paul Berezney to begin the practice of medicine at St. Petersburg, Fla., and the release of rookie Francis Terrance. Berezney, regular right tackle last season, had wavered between practicing medicine or playing another season and finally chose the former course in midweek. The vacancy caused by Berezney's departure probably will be filled by shifting Tiny Croft over from the left side of the line.

The services of Kuusisto, now in his fifth year with the club, will be missed in the three exhibition games coming up in the east and probably also in the opener against the Chicago Bears at City stadium on Sept. 30. His absence leaves the left guard post to be manned by Glen Sorenson and Charley Tollefson, both veterans. Meanwhile, the wartime player limit of 28 has been revoked by the NFL, and Coach Curly Lambeau is considering the makeup of his squad for the defense of the world championship against the Bears...**MUST FIND TACKLES:** Looking over the squad as it is constituted now, Lambeau feels that the end, guard, center and halfback positions are adequately filled. The problem is to find a right tackle to fill a hole left by the retirement of Dr. Paul Berezney, last season's regular, and Ade Schwammel, the doctor's understudy and also a vet. The Bay coach is also in the market for a fullback. There is just the shade of possibility that Don Perkins, who played one of the best games of his career against the All-Stars, will be with the club during the season. If Perkins can find a substitute for his Platteville coaching job, he will rejoin the team, giving it three fullbacks. The other two are veterans Ted Fritsch and Ben Starrett, shifted earlier in the week from the blocking back...**MIGHT MAKE DEAL:** The Green Bay coach hinted that he might be able to make a deal for a tackle and fullback while in Chicago next Tuesday to attend a non-championship battle between the Chicago Bears and the Washington Redskins. The game will be played Tuesday night in Soldier field and the Packer coach will have an opportunity to scout the Redskins, whom the Bays will play in an exhibition in the capital Sept. 23. Of course, he'll also be looking the Bears over. With the player limit upped to 33, Lambeau said he would carry three centers, six each of tackles, guard and ends and 12 backs on the squad. As it stands now, the team is full at center and tackle although weak on the right side and has an overage of one at guard and end. The backfield department must be increased by two to bring it up to an even dozen. Carl Mulleneaux, a gridder with four years experience at end with the Packers, reported for practice Thursday and was in good shape. The team will hold daily sessions through Monday, when the first contingent of 10 players headed by Assistant Coach Don Hutson will leave for Philadelphia and an exhibition against the Eagles on Thursday. The second batch leaves Tuesday under Lambeau's direction...**HAVE SAME TEAM:** The Eagles have practically the same team they had a year ago including a backfield of such stars as Leroy Zimmerman, Steve Van Buren, Jack Hinkle and Ernie Steele. The team is being recognized as the top contender for the Eastern division title this year. Their power, it may be recalled, was sufficient to give Green Bay a 38-13 lacing in an exhibition at Nashville last October. The Packers spent some time this week looking over motion pictures of that game and they should know what to expect. They will spend considerable time between now and next Wednesday pondering a defense to be used against the T-formation employed by Coach Earle (Greasy) Neale.

## Johnny Blood to Play Halfback With Packers in Eastern Games

### **JOHNNY BLOOD TO PLAY HALFBACK WITH PACKERS IN EASTERN GAMES**

SEPT 8 (Green Bay) - Startling news came out of Coach Curly Lambeau's office today. The Packer coach announced that Johnny Blood, a veteran of 15 years service in the NFL, has been added to the squad as a right halfback for the three exhibition games the Bays will play in the east next week. This means that Johnny will have another year on his league service record, best in the circuit. Added to the Packer staff as a morale builder for the All-Star contest, Blood worked out with the squad and, although 41 years old, showed that he can still step along in a manner reminiscent of the years during which he scored 37 touchdowns and a pair of points after touchdown for 224 points and fourth largest total on the Green Bay all-time scoring list. In putting Johnny to the active player list, Lambeau said he had been pleased with his training and that Blood proved he could still step "the 100 yards in top speed. In fact, there are few backs on the squad who can beat him in the 100." The Packer coach said Blood would call signals from the right halfback spot along with veterans Lou Brock and Joe Laws. The other right half on the squad is newcomer Sid Tinsley...**28 MONTHS OVERSEAS:** Blood will leave the squad after the Sept. 23 game with the Washington Redskins. Recently returned from 28 months service in the China-India-Burma theater, he must report in New York on Sept. 25. Whether he will receive a discharge from the air force under a new War Department ruling allowing those in his age bracket to enter civilian life is unknown. Johnny, however, recently indicated that he had requested a discharge. Possibility that former tackle, Ernie Pannell, now a lieutenant in the Navy in the Pacific, would return to the team in the near future was also announced by Lambeau today, following receipt of a letter from the ex-Texas A. and M. star. Pannell, who joined the team for the 1941 season and then entered service, told Lambeau



he will soon be discharged and will come here immediately after...**PLAYED LEFT TACKLE:** The Packer coach described Pannell as "one of the best left tackles we have had", adding that he hoped Ernie would be out of service in time to join the team for the Chicago Bear game in City stadium Sept. 30. **GUARD RAY FRANKOWSKI OF WASHINGTON JOINS PACKERS TO BOLSTER FORWARD WALL DEPLETED BY VETERAN LOSS**

SEPT 10 (Green Bay) - Ray Frankowski, former All-America guard at the University of Washington, has signed a contract with the Packers and will be available for the team's three exhibition games in the east, Coach Curly Lambeau announced today. While this was the big news in the Packer camp, two other items indicated further bolstering of the Bay forward wall by the addition of another end and a former center on the team. The ex-Washington guard arrived in town late last week and came to terms rapidly enough to work out with the squad Sunday in the last full dress practice prior to next Thursday's exhibition against the powerful Eagles in Philadelphia. Ten members of the team left this morning for Philadelphia and the others will depart Tuesday morning, arriving there in time for a drill the following day. Frankowski, named to practically every All-America team in 1941, has been in the Navy and recently received an honorable discharge. He played left guard while in college but may be used either there or at right guard here, Lambeau explained. He is 26 years old, weighs 235 pounds, and is 6 feet 2 inches tall. He is married and his home is Hammond, Ind..

**PLAYED IN ALL-STAR GAME:** After finishing his brilliant career at Washington, Frankowski joined the West team for the annual East-West tilt held in New Orleans Jan. 1, 1942, where he attracted the attention of the Packer coach by his defensive and offensive work. He subsequently was a member of the College All-Star squad that played the Chicago Bears in 1942. He then entered the Navy. The addition of Frankowski to the squad helps to ease off heavy depletion of the line through the retirement of veterans. Further developments along the line included the possibility that Ed Frutig, ex-Michigan All-American, and former Packer center, Tom Greenfield, may join the squad. He scheduled a long drill on defense this morning because the Eagles showed they have tremendous power that must be stopped...EAGLES ARE "RED HOT": "The Eagles are red hot," said Lambeau, "and Sunday's game proves it. The Lions have everybody back but Frankie Sinkwich and yet the Eagles gave them a pretty fair licking." But the game will give the Packers a chance to test their strength against a pro eleven and along with the games against Pittsburgh in Hershey on Sept. 19 and Washington on Sept. 23 will give recruits a chance to show their worth. Lambeau also announced today that end Alex Urban has returned to the squad, following an absence of a week, during which he went to his home in Toledo, O. Urban left after the All-Star game in Chicago.

## Recruits to Get Heavy Play in Packers' Non-League Contests

### RECRUITS TO GET HEAVY PLAY IN PACKERS' NON-LEAGUE CONTESTS

SEPT 11 (Green Bay) - Replacements in the Packers' three non-championship games in the east will come thick and fast and recruits will probably see the bulk of the action, Coach Curly Lambeau emphasized today, adding that every member of the 37-man squad will participate in tilts against Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Washington prior to returning here for the league opener against the Chicago Bears Sept. 30. "Although we're going into the east to win these games, still we must give all of our recruits a chance to play against league teams," said Lambeau. "We know what the veterans can do - and we'll use them naturally - but the brunt of the burden will be on the rookies." Considering the caliber of the opposition, especially the Eagles and Redskins, the rookies are in for a rather rough baptism...TWO REMAIN HOME: Two players will not make the trip, the coach said. Carl Mulleneaux, who joined the team last week, pulled a leg muscle in practice and will be out for a couple of weeks. He is a veteran end. The other casualty, guard Bill Kuusisto, is still at St. Vincent hospital, where he submitted to an appendectomy last Thursday. Otherwise, the squad was in fairly good physical condition with the exception of Larry Craig, who sustained a foot injury against the All-Stars. This side of the picture was relieved by the return to the squad of fullback Don Perkins, who had earlier announced his retirement to take a high school coaching job at Platteville. Perkins managed to obtain a substitute for the position, allowing him to remain for the entire schedule. He will strengthen the fullback department considerably although the Packers could use another player in that spot...MAY COMPLETE DEAL: Lambeau had announced earlier that he may make a deal for a fullback and right tackle in Chicago, where he will scout the Chicago Bear-Washington non-league game at Soldier field tonight. If he picks up a fullback, Ben Starrett will go back to blocking back fulltime. He had been shifted to full when Perkins' return was indefinite. Meanwhile, Ben will have to do double duty at full and blocking back, where he will start against Philadelphia. Two other starters against the Eagles will be guard Mike Bucchanieri and tackle Paul Lipscomb, a newcomer from Tennessee. Both Bucchanieri and Lipscomb have shown tremendous improvement during the last week, Lambeau said, making them sure choices for starting posts. Ken Keuper, the coach added, would see heavy action at blocking back...FIVE SEEK APARTMENTS: At least five members of the squad left today with misgivings about the housing situation for the remainder of the season. They have been residing in hotels and the worry about finding apartments had made it difficult for them to put forth their best efforts, Lambeau said. Those seeking places are Keuper, Perkins, Kussisto, Bryan Brock and Ray Frankowski. The major portion of the squad left this morning at 7 o'clock under the head coach and Line Coach Walt Kiesling. They were accompanied by Edwin Crim, Milwaukee road passenger agent. Ten members left Monday with Assistant Coach Don Hutson. The Packers will work out Wednesday morning in Philadelphia. They will leave for Hershey on Friday morning for the Sept. 19 contest against the Steelers. The odds in Philadelphia were reported heavily favoring the Eagles who trampled on a potent Detroit team last Sunday, 35-7. The victory wasn't a fluke either, according to the scout report made by Eddie Kotal to Lambeau today.

### PACKERS MEET EAGLES IN NON-LEAGUE GAME

SEPT 12 (Philadelphia) - The Green Bay Packers moved into town today for their non-championship test against the Philadelphia Eagles in huge Municipal stadium Thursday night and indications were that a crowd of close to 80,000 would

be on hand for the annual charity game conducted by one of the city's daily newspaper. The Packers will play three non-league games in the east. After the first against the Eagles Thursday night, they meet the Pittsburgh Steelers in Hershey, Pa., Sept. 19, and the Washington Redskins in Griffith stadium in the capital Sept. 23. They will then return to Green Bay for five days of practice for their league opener against the Chicago Bears on Sept. 30. The vanguard of Packers arrived Tuesday and moved around to get their pictures taken. Much interest was shown in one of the oldtimers, Johnny Blood, who will attempt a big league comeback this season after a retirement of seven years. Blood, now 41, stood the trip east very well, probably because he is used to traveling, having gone to the CBI theater and back...AWAIT LATER ARRIVALS: The early group sat around awaiting the arrival this morning of the remainder of the squad in tow of Line Coach Walt Kiesling in the absence of Coach Curly Lambeau, who spent last evening looking over the Washington Redskins and Chicago Bears in their exhibition in Chicago. A light workout today will end the Bay's preparations for Thursday's starlight contest. The Packers seemed to be in good spirits and anxious to get revenge for the 38-13 pasting they absorbed from the Philadelphia eleven in a Nashville, Tenn., exhibition last October. The Eagles have the same team they had that day and with the added knowledge that Lambeau plans to use his recruits exclusively, they feel that they will ring up another exhibition margin...STARTERS NAMED THURSDAY: Lambeau is expected to name his starting lineup Thursday morning. Three starters are certain - guard Mike Bucchanieri, tackle Paul Lipscomb and blocking back Ben Starrett. Lipscomb is a rookie from Tennessee who has shown considerable promise during drills in Green Bay, making him Lambeau's choice for the opening assignment on the right side of the line. The Eagles' lineup will be the same as that which swamped the Detroit Lions in last Sunday's exhibition in Buffalo, 35-7. This includes a backfield composed of quarterback Roy Zimmerman, halfbacks Steve Van Buren and Jack Hinkle and fullback Ben Kish, all veterans who raised the Eagles to within a breath of the Eastern division championship last year...VETERAN LINE READY: The line will have such stalwarts as ends Larry Cabrelli and Don McDonald or Tom Miller, tackles Vic Sears and Al Wistert, guard Eddie Michaels and Jack Sanders and Vic Lindskog. The Philadelphia team also has ample replacements, including 14 recruits. It well could be that the game will be a battle of newcomers since each squad has a full team of players position by position.

#### **PACKER ACES ARRIVE FOR CLASSIC HERE**

SEPT 12 (Philadelphia) - As on so many occasions in the past, Green Bay sent the incomparable Don Hutson fanning out with the idea of completing a pass that might defeat the Philadelphia Eagles in the Football Classic at the Municipal Stadium tomorrow night. Hutson, all-time all-star end who is assistant coach of the world champions, led a part of 10 that arrived at the B. & O. Station for the eighth annual city inaugural sponsored by the Philadelphia Inquirer Charities, Inc. Captain Charley Brock, colorful Johnny Blood, passer Irv Comp, plunger Ted Fritsch, veteran Joe Laws, ex-Marine Charley Tollefson and immense Buford (Baby) Ray accompanied Hutson into two along with Bob Conrad, Head Coach Curly Lambeau's administrative assistant. Lambeau, Line Coach Walt Kiesling and the other players are due at 12:07 p.m. today. They'll join the others at Green Bay's pregame headquarters, the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, and all will go through a drill tonight on the scene of tomorrow's battle, the Municipal Stadium...IN SHAPE FOR CLASSIC: All of the Packers, Hutson reported, are in shape for the Eagles, including sub center Ralph D. (Hambone) Hammond, who played as a freshman with Paul Christman at the University of Missouri before transferring to Pitt, running 100 yards in 10.6 seconds, joining the Army Air Force, receiving a discharge of rheumatism and finally setting himself up in the insurance business in Pittsburgh. Insurance work is only a stopgap for Hambone, however. He wants to be a radio announcer and is forever exercising his baritone for the benefit of teammates. Hammond, a 6 ft., 203 pounds and 25 years old, was unable to play in the Packers' game with the College All-Stars at Chicago Aug. 30 because of injuries suffered in practice. Green Bay beat the All-Stars, 19-7...STINGING REMARKS: "They were laying for is in that one," Hutson admitted, "and they had the squad to do it. 'This game has reached the point where we're not only playing the pick of the college players and the best to be had from service,' I told them in Chicago, 'but now we're playing the College All-Stars alumni besides!' I don't think they liked what I said." If they did not like what Hutson said, the All-Stars liked what the Packers did to them in the game far less. With three exceptions - at left end, right guard and right tackle - the Packers will field the same team against the Eagles as the one which lined up against the College-Service-Alumni Stars...GOODNIGHT TO START: It looks like Clyde Goodnight, Tulsa's All-American, at left end; Ray at left tackle; Glenn Sorenson, left guard; Charley Brock, center; Pete Tinsley, right guard; Paul (Lippy) Lipscomb, Tennessee's 230-pounder, at right tackle; Joel Mason, right end; Larry Craig, quarterback; Comp, left half; Lou Brock (Charley's cousin), right half; and Fritsch, fullback. And where is Hutson? "Hutson's retired," Hutson said. And what do the good people of Green Bay think about that? "Nobody believes it," Don sighed...KNACK WITH PLAYERS: Rivals no doubt would like to believe it, but after three annual retirements, they are afraid to place too much stock in Hutson's fourth. "Green Bay," remarked Bert Bell, co-owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Hutson's host at lunch in the Racquet Club, "has the knack of taking players who apparently are all finished and getting some great ball out of them. Look at 'Aimee' McPherson: he was all apparently washed up seven or eight years ago when he was playing end for us in Philadelphia. Now Green Bay is getting a good game out of him at tackle." Bert might have pointed also to the irrepressible Blood. "He is marvelous," Hutson smiled. "He's weighing the same now as he did 15 years ago, and still as enthusiastic as he ever was."...SAME OLD JOHNNY: He looks like the Johnny of old - the McNally who, starting a pro

athletic career out in the Midwest back in the 20's, insisted on being listed as Johnny Blood because he didn't want his parents to know he was playing - the same halfback who, with the great Green Bay teams in the 30's, would snatch a pass from the very arms of alien defenders and start running with the yell: "You can't catch Johnny Blood!" Johnny, not long back in the U.S. after two years as an Air Force master sergeant in the China-Burma-India theater, left his mates on arrival here to visit Fort Dix yesterday afternoon. The others lolled around the hotel, ate and went to the movies. The Eagles, meantime, ran through a lengthy if light session amid such secrecy that even their whereabouts could not be disclosed. Coaches Greasy Neale and Honest John Kellison were perfecting the timing of their attack and outlining the 10 or 15 defensive deployments they plan using against the Packers' fearsome aerial bombardments...EAGLES FAVORED: Fresh from their 35-7 conquest of the Detroit Lions at Buffalo Sunday, the Eagles found themselves on the favorites' end of 2-1 odds for tomorrow's game, and the coaches, though non-committal, looked pained at the thought. Like most coaches, they would probably prefer having their team in the underdog's role against a team of equal strength. The 92,000 who saw Green Bay beat the All-Stars would wonder that anyone could go against the Packers. Big Buck Kilroy, the 250-pound former Temple University tackle just back from a trip to France as a lieutenant (jg.) in the Maritime Service, participated in the workout, but two others - halfbacks Mel Bleeker and Ernie Steele - were instructed to take it easy. However, the team physicians, Drs. Harrison Flippin and Fred Beale, pronounced the squad in top fettle for the Packers. But that is a question only tomorrow's development at the Municipal Stadium can fully answer.

**NO FLIES ON PACKERS; PHILLY TO USE DDT**

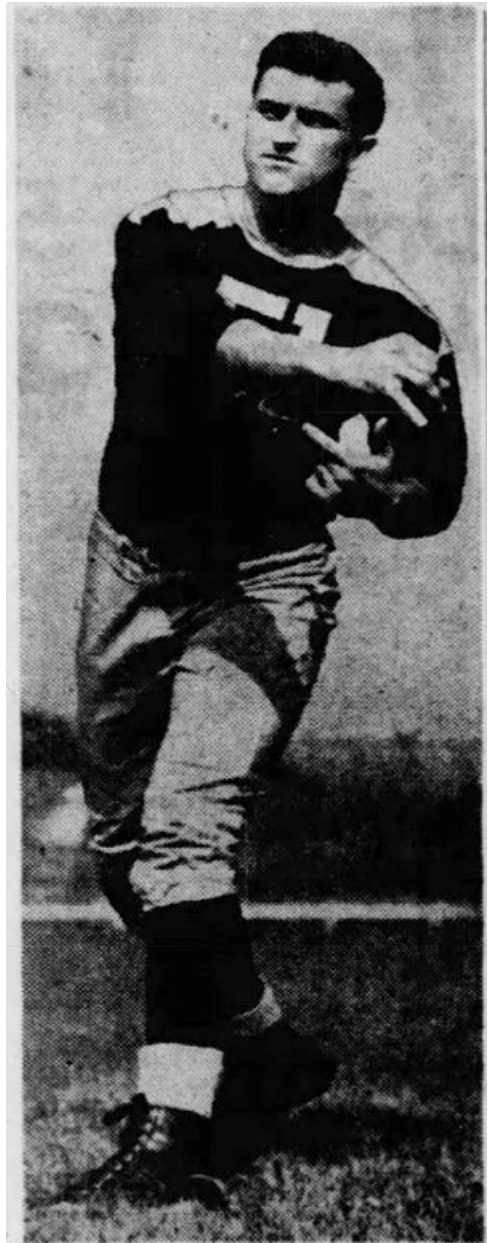

Permission to play the game in Milwaukee was granted by the league and by the Green Bay Packers, who hold territorial rights in Wisconsin, after the Chicago White Sox requested the game be moved from Comiskey park where it was originally scheduled. The Sox have several games to play on their home field the week after the football date, and in view of the close American league race, decided it was better not to take a chance on having the diamond cut up. The Lions, despite a defeat at Philadelphia's hands in an exhibition Sunday, rate as one of the strongest teams in the western end of the league. Last year's lineup is intact except for Frankie Sinkwich. The Cardinals, who have been working out at Waukesha, have little this season.

**HERBER - HE'S TOPS IN LAMBEAU'S BOOK FOR HIS ACCURACY AS LONG PASSER**

SEPT 12 (Milwaukee Journal) - The talk was of great forward passers. You know how those things go. Somebody mentions Sammy Baugh and then somebody else comes up with Sid Luckman or Cecil Isbell and before you know it you're over to a lot of others who could or still can squeeze a football through a keyhole at 20 yards. It was only natural, of course, that the talk should finally get around to Arnie Herber - the rubber armed Herber who did some 10 years of passing for Green Bay and now does it for New York. "Now there, gentlemen," Curly Lambeau began, "was a passer. There probably have been better at 10 or 20 or 30 yards, but at 40 or 50 or more - Herber was tops. In my book, for real distance and accuracy both, there was never another like him. Why, do you know what he did one time?" And then Lambeau told his tale...CURLY TELLS WHY: "We were making a sport short in Hollywood about 10 years ago, that is the Packers were, and we had a director who had a Hollywood idea of football. For instance, on the first day of shooting, it was his idea to have Hinkle stand in midfield and punt the ball out of bounds on the one yard line. Just like that. I guess the guy thought that because we were champs, we could finish the whole short in a day. Well, the director let Hink warm up a bit, then called for action

and started the cameras. Hink kicked. He kicked some more. He kicked for an hour or more while the camera ground and ground. And not once did he even come close to the one. The director was fit to be tied, but what could he do? Hink just kept on kicking and the cameras just kept on grinding away. I guess we must have wasted a couple of thousand feet before Hink finally got the ball out on the one."...HERBER FOOLED DIRECTOR: "Well the director called it a day after this. I guess he couldn't stand any more. But on this next we started again, going over to passing and to Herber. And again we had a Hollywood idea. The director told Herber to stand on the 50 yard line and toss a forward pass through a pane of glass two feet square suspended from the crossbar of the goal posts. A 50 yard pass - and it had to be just right. And after his experience with Hinkle for hours the day before, I suppose the director did the natural thing when he didn't start the camera at one. I guess he figured that it had taken Hink hours to get the ball out on the one kicking, it would take Herber hours to throw the ball 50 yards through a pane of glass. Anyway he didn't start the cameras at once. And then the director almost jumped out of his skin. Herber's first pass went smack through the pane of glass. No cameras. The guy couldn't do this twice in a row, the director figured and so he didn't have the cameras grinding as Herber passed again. And again Herber broke the pane of glass. Well, that was enough for the director, and on Herber's third pass, he started the cameras. And smack - for the third straight time Herber broke the pane of glass. That's why, gentlemen, in my book, Herber is the all-time tops as a long passer. There may have been better at shorter distances, but at 50 yards or up - never. He was the best."

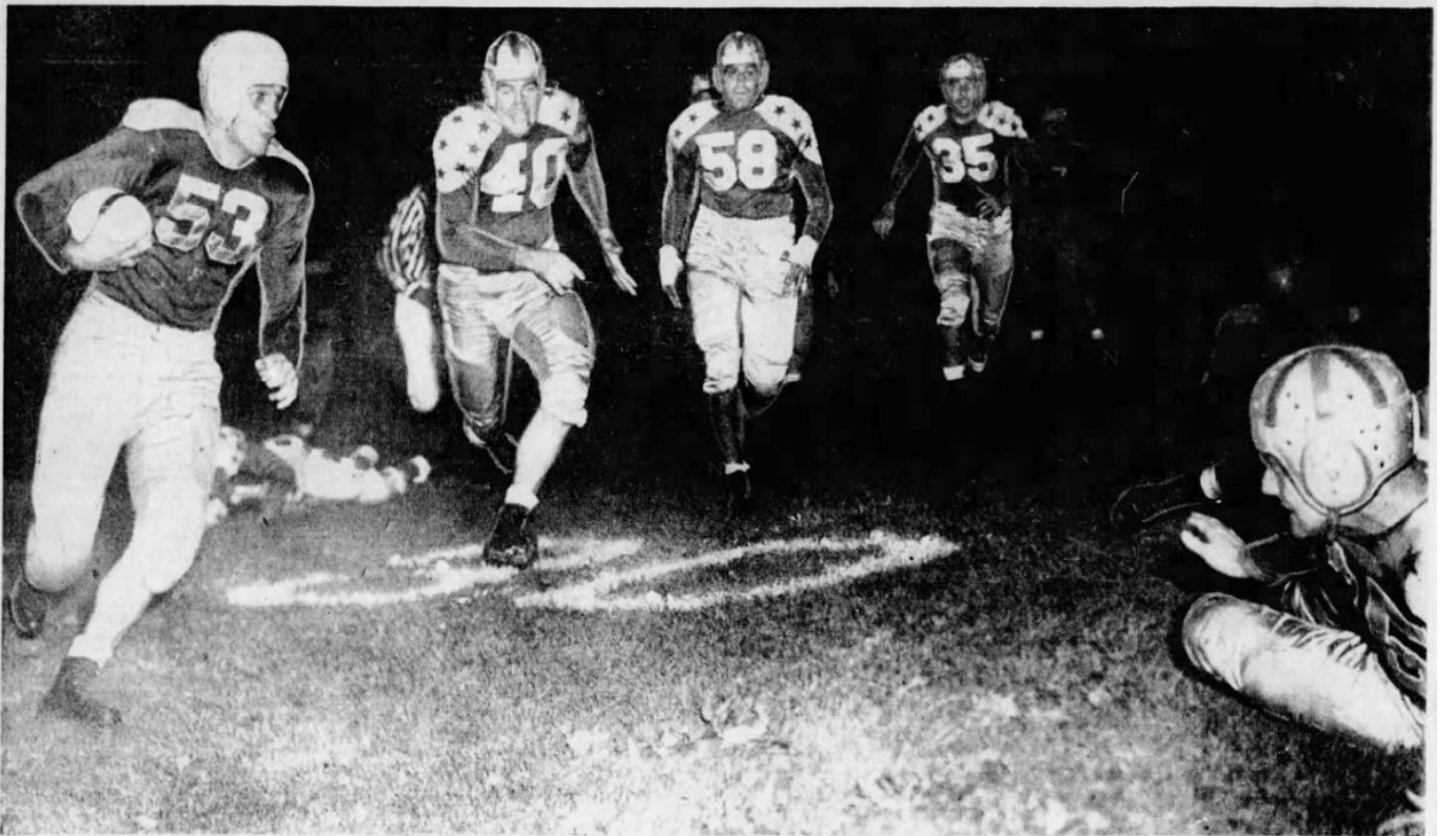

**75,000 to See National League Foes Battle In Charity Game at Philadelphia; Lambeau to Start Two Rookies, Nine Veterans in Contest**

## **EAGLES FAVORED OVER PACKER TEAM TONIGHT**

SEPT 13 (Philadelphia - Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Green Bay Packers and Philadelphia Eagles of the NFL were primed today to battle in a non-championship encounter in this city's huge Municipal stadium tonight. Both teams will be seeking their second non-league victories in a row this season and the odds are that the Eagles will triumph a second consecutive time over the Bays in an exhibition. Never able to beat Coach Curly Lambeau's team in a league contest in a series dating back to 1933, the Eagles trounced the Packer eleven roundly in a Nashville, Tenn., exhibition last fall. That game took the place of a regular league meeting and this exhibition, sponsored by the Philadelphia Inquirer in the interests of charity, will also have the same function. The teams do not meet in the 1945 league play...TO GET DDT: Municipal stadium will get a pregame DDT once-over to assure the estimated 75,000 fans that there will be few, if any, mosquitoes and insects around to distract their attention. To more than 21,500 servicemen, many of them amputee cases, the gridiron clash promises to server as a moral builder. They'll be on hand to watch Jack Sanders, who lost part of his left arm while serving as a Marine lieutenant on Iwo Jima, start at left guard for the Eagles. He'll play with a specially constructed steel brace covering the lower part of his arm. While the Packers want to win, just as they always do and did in their engagement against the College All-Stars two weeks ago, they will find in the game what Lambeau calls an "excellent chance to try out

recruits and to give them experience they will need in rapidly approaching championship defense contests." He probably was thinking about the Packer-Chicago Bear game in Green Bay Sept. 30, and he hardly could have picked a better example...**TWO ROOKIES TO START:** While the Packers will open with a team composed of nine veterans and two rookies, tackle Paul Lipscomb out of Tennessee and end Nolan Luhn out of Tulsa, the Eagles will have eleven veterans in the lineup at the opening whistle. This group will be paced by the ace backfield that trampled on the Detroit Lions last week, 35-7, and did it with apparent ease. The Packers will have veterans Lou Brock at right half, Roy McKay at left half, Ben Starrett at blocking back, and Don Perkins, who missed about a week of practice while finding a substitute for his high school coaching job, at fullback. Other starting sports in the line will go to Alex Urban at end, Tiny Croft at right tackle, Mike Bucchanieri and Charley Tollefson, both second year men, at guard, and Bob Flowers at center. This lineup probably will be shifted around early in the game and keep changing as the minutes tick away. At least that is the plan Lambeau explained on his arrival here Wednesday shortly before the Bays took to the field for their final rehearsal. He will also employ the same tactics in the two other exhibitions against Pittsburgh at Hershey Sept. 19 and the Washington Redskins in the capital Sept. 23...**NO FALSE SECURITY:** The Eagles are not being lulled into a sense of false security by such promises from the Green Bay head man. Coach Greasy Neale has worked his boys hard since the triumph over the Lions to sharpen up the T-attack that marked up five touchdowns in that exhibition. The Eagles are loaded with talent and will use it unsparingly, Neale said. The Eagle coach is standing pat on his opening lineup. The backfield which pulled the Philadelphia squad to within a shade of winning the Eastern division championship last year (the difference between a tie and the second place they had was one tie) is back intact and has reserve strength. Handling the ball from the quarterback spot will be Roy Zimmerman, who is an accomplished passer and kicker. He was named last fall as the Most Valuable Pro player by the Touchdown club of Washington. The halfback posts will be taken by Steve Van Buren, the former Louisiana State rambler, and Jack Hinkle, both of whom have speed and power. Ben Kish, a seasoned veteran, will be at fullback...**ALL-VETERAN LINEUP:** Operating in front of this quartet will be Larry Cabrelli and Jack Ferrante at end, Vic Sears and Al Wistert at tackle, Duke Maronic and Sanders or Bob Suffridge at guard, and Vic Lindskog at center. All have plenty of experience. The Packers will remain in Philadelphia tonight and go to Hershey on Friday morning. Drills will be held there until next Wednesday's game. Preparation for the tilt with the Redskins will be taken in the capital. Then the Packers will return to Dairyland and five days of secret practice for the Bears' encounter.

#### **90,000 MAY WATCH INQUIRER CLASSIC TONIGHT**

SEPT 13 (Philadelphia) - The largest crowd ever to see two professional football teams clash anywhere will turn out at the Municipal Stadium tonight for the eight annual City inaugural game sponsored by the Philadelphia Inquirer Charities, Inc.

On the basis of heavy sales last night when ticket outlets were open until 9:30 o'clock, it is now estimated that upwards of 90,000 may see the champion Green Bay Packers oppose the Philadelphia Eagles in the classic which starts at 8:30 o'clock. A total of 26 ticket windows will be opened at 6 p.m. at the Stadium to accommodate last minute fans. Twenty minutes before the kickoff the official 80-piece U.S. Navy Band, under the direction of Lieutenant Charles Brendler, U.S.N., and Chief Warrant Officer Richard E. Townsend will swing onto the field, coming especially from Washington, D.C. They will play while marching and from their place in the East stands. Hundreds of wounded Army veterans - Jimmy Wilson, the boy who lost part of all four limbs in an airplane crash, and his pals from Atlantic City's England General Hospital; 22 bus loads from Valley Forge; Maj. Hy Chartock and 200 from New Cumberland, Pa.; War I and II soldiers from Coatesville - will be seated around Elliot Lawrence's 20-piece band on the west side of the field. But the east side belongs to the Navy, with patients from the nearby Naval Hospital, their annex at Swarthmore and Bainbridge, Md., clustered around the Navy band. Many of the wounded war heroes, unable to climb into the stands, will view the contest from wheelchairs rolled onto the cinder track surrounding the gridiron. More than 1,000 are coming from the Naval Hospital alone - "we are practically evacuating," one doctor laughed yesterday - and the amputee cases among them will have a special interest in the proceedings...SANDERS WILL START: For head coach Earle (Greasy) Neale announced yesterday that one of the Naval Hospital's own boys - First Lieutenant Jack Sanders, the Marine who lost part of his left arm at Iwo Jima - will start at left guard for the Eagles. The Eagles' right guard, incidentally, will be a lieutenant discharged only last week after three and a half years in the Navy, Bob Suffridge. The Army, too, will be well represented by veterans, not only with ex-soldiers in both lineups but with Staff Sergeant Johnny Blood and Sergeant Bob Adkins actually carrying the khaki onto the field for Green Bay. The colorful Blood but recently returned from the China-Burma-India theater, where he spent two years. Adkins, who, like Blood, is a back, has secured leave to play from the Newcastle (Del.) Air Base.
