LA Rams, Fired by Bears' Loss, Beat Packers, 51-14

Canadeo Still Short of Record

Tony Canadeo, just 27 yards short of Clarke Hinkle's all-time Packer ground gaining record of 3,860 yards before Sunday's Packer-Ram game, gained 11 yards in five tries in Los Angeles. He lost a chance for the mark when a penalty nullified a 20-yard gain. Tony needs 16 yards against San Francisco next Sunday to establish the mark.

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(LOS ANGELES) - The Green Bay Packer football team today headed for the quiet hill country of Northern California and a change of climate will be the most helpful for the Packers. The Packers experienced a disastrous visit to Los Angeles, and, as they boarded the streamlined Lark for Sonoma Mission, near San Francisco, they could be thankful of one thing. They are through tangling with the redhot Los Angeles Rams for 1950. The Green Bays were scuttled under a 51-14 count by the Rams and were unlucky to catch them on this given day yesterday. The Rams, you see, heard the news of the Chicago Bear loss to the Chicago Cardinals just before the kickoff against the Packers, and, if any fight talk was needed, the news provided it because the Bear loss simply gave a shot at the National conference title - if they beat the Packers. A crowd of 39,323 heard the news, too, and a might roar went up for the Rams when they trotted onto the field. And a general way of sympathy went out for the Packers. Actually, Green Bay put up a much better than the top heavy score indicates, but they simply couldn't hold back the tide of the greatest offensive team in pro football.

GREEN ROOKIES IMPROVING

Coach Joe Stydahar of the Rams, after the game, made a point of noting that the Packers would be a different story next season. Their green rookies, rounding out their first year in pro ball, are improving and Stydahar predicted the youngsters, along with the experienced hands at Green Bay, would be a highly developed opponent for National league rivals in 1951. Green Bay throttled the vaunted Rams completely in the first quarter, and threw a scare into their championship hopes by scoring the opening touchdown. Breaks and costly penalties turned the tide toward the Rams, however, and they moved into the front by a 16-7 lead at halftime - scarcely enough for comfort. Then their fireworks began to explode in the third quarter - for three touchdowns - and the outcome was evident from there on in. Tobin Rote steered to Green Bay to its first scoring opportunity. Starting from his own 38, he completed four out of five passes - to Larry Coutre for four and eight yards, to Steve Pritko for eight and to

Leon Manley for nine - to bring the Bays deep into Ram territory. But the thrust stalled with two missed throws and just as the second quarter began, Ted Fritsch stepped back from the 40 and tried a field goal. Big Bob Reinhard partially deflected the try and it feel short. The Rams put on a march after this but suffered the same fate. Bob Waterfield tried a field goal from the 40, and this one was wide.

REID GOES 57 YARDS

Then the Packers started on their scoring punch. Floyd Reid set it off with the longest gain of the day, a 57 yard run to the Ram 23. Reid literally stopped along the way to fight off Ram tackler. It appeared he was trapped at least three times. Rote then pitched to Pritko for five yards and Paul Christman, the old pro, came in. He hit Pritko for four more, sneaked up four yards for a first down on the Ram 14, and added two more on another plunge. Then, he shot a fast pass to Bob Mann, who was standing on the goal line when he caught it and fell, whirling over the goal. Fritsch converted and the Pack enjoyed a 7-0 lead. It didn't last long. Los Angeles took the kickoff and struck back 84 yards in seven plays, with Norm Van Brocklin completing five straight passes for 82 yards, the longest to Tom Fears for 36. Davis scored on a handoff from the four and Waterfield's conversion tied the score. The safety for the Rams came when Reinhard blocked a punt by Jug Girard and the ball bounced into the end zone. That put Los Angeles in front and the Rams stayed there.

TD HOTLY DISPUTED

The next Ram touchdown was hotly disputed. Van Brocklin threw to Hirsch, 35 yards away, and interference was called on the Packer three against Girard. Helmets were slammed on the ground and the Packers protested heatedly to no avail. A moment, later Van Brocklin passed to racing Davis in the end zone for the tally. Later in the game, interference was called on Bob Forte on the Packer 11, and this was costly, too, for the Rams quickly scored again. Midway in the final period, the Packers scored their other TD. They stopped a Ram march on their 20, and Rote steered his mates back 80 yards in 14 plays. Rote started off by running 29 yards. Coutre gained eight on a pass from Rote but was hurt. Rote picked up three and from the 10 he passed to Ted Cook for the touchdown. Clayton Tonnemaker, kicking for the injured Fritsch added the extra point. Green Bay never stopped battling and was still handing the Rams an argument at the finish despite the score.

THREE TD PASSES

Van Brocklin threw three touchdown passes; his replacement, Bob Waterfield, rang up two more, and another pair came on the ground. Van Brocklin started the third period by pitching two touchdowns to end Tom Fears. Then Waterfield came in and tossed to Vitamin Smith to make it 37-7. In the final quarter, Fears made his second tally on a pass from Waterfield and Tank Younger plunged over from the three. The Rams ended their regular season Sunday with a host of new league records. - 0 7 0 7 - 14



Playoffs Loom in Both Conferences Of NFL; Neale Helped Browns Win



PLAYOFFS LOOM IN BOTH CONFERENCES OF NFL; HEALE HELPED BROWNS WIN

DEC 4 (New York) - Playoff games shaped up today in both conferences of the NFL and Coach Paul Brown said Coach Greasy Neale of Philadelphia helped Cleveland stay in thick of the race by "shooting off his bazooka." Neale, whose Eagles won the NFL title for the last two seasons, said last week he hoped "anyone but the Browns" win this year. Cleveland beat Philadelphia, 35-10, in its first NFL game last September and yesterday the Browns ruined Neale's slim 1950 title hopes by whipping his team, 13-7, in gooey going at Cleveland. The victory kept Cleveland in a first place American conference tie with the New York Giants, who crushed the New York Yanks, 51-7. Each plays its regular season final this Sunday. The Los Angeles Rams took a half-game lead over the Chicago Bears in the National conference by walloping the Green Bay Packers, 51-14, while the Chicago Cardinals were upsetting the Bears, 20-10. Los Angeles has finished its season, but the Bears were expected to beat the Detroit Lions Sunday and force a playoff for the division crown..."NUTS TO YOU, NEALE": Rainsoaked Cleveland fans hoisted a sign reading: "Nuts to you, Neale!" as the Eagles dragged off the field. Halfback Warren Lahr intercepted one of Tommy Thompson's passes on the third play of the game and ran it 30 yards for a touchdown, and Lou (The Toe) Groza kicked two field goal to give Cleveland its points. Giant Coach Steve Owen used the T-formation to beat the Eagles last week. He used the A-formation all the way

against the Yanks yesterday. Chuck Conerly, his A-formation passer who didn't play against the Eagles, led the Giants' seven-touchdown splurge. That was expected but rookie quarterback Travis Tidwell, who has been running the Giant T-attack, directed A-formation plays in the last quarter against the Yanks. In other games yesterday, the Redskins beat




Pittsburgh, 24-7, and Detroit beat Baltimore, 45-21. Quarterback Jim Hardy threw a 35-yard touchdown pass to Don Paul and scored once himself to lead the Cardinals to their upset triumph over the Bears. Ends Tom Wham, Bob Dove and Jerry Hennessey and the other Card linesmen kept the Bears off balance all the way.

PACKERS TO 'FRISCO FOR FINAL

DEC 5 (Boys Springs, CA) - The Green Bay Packers, smarting under the turn of events in Los Angeles on Sunday, launched practice here today for their 1950 NFL finale against the Forty Niners in San Francisco's Kezar stadium next Sunday afternoon. The Packers will be going after their fourth victory against eight defeats. The Forty Niners will be seeking their third win. A victory for the Packers Sunday would better their record in 1948 when they won three and lost nine. By besting the Forty Niners, 25 to 21, in Green

Bay two weeks ago, the Bays eclipsed their 1949 mark of 2-10. But the road will be rocky Sunday. The Forty Niners were extremely unhappy with the loss administered by the Packers in the last few minutes on a 44-yard pass from Paul Christman to Floyd (Breezy) Reid...TWO WEEKS TO PREPARE: The Forty Niners had two weeks to prepare for the finale since last Sunday was an open date for Coach Buck Shaw's team. However, all of the Forty Niner coaches and several of the key players were in LA scouting the Packer-Ram game. Norm Standlee, the former Chicago Bear fullback, will be honored during Standlee Day ceremonies in 'Frisco Sunday. Standlee has been backing up the Forty Niner line for the last two years and is one of the most popular players on the 'Frisco team. The Packers aren't relishing the thought of another "day". The last such occasion was to Bob Nowaskey of the Baltimore Colts, and the Colts celebrated the event by whipping the Bays. The Packers resumed practice with a sharp session on defense. Of greatest concern to Coach Gene Ronzani was the condition of pass defender Alex Wizbicki, who was injured in the second quarter of the Ram game. Jug Girard, who has played little defense, was rushed into Wizbicki's spot and the Rams quickly took advantage for Girard's defensive inexperience. The rest of the Packers came out of the game in good condition and the change to cooler weather in Northern California is expected to bolster their spirits Used to playing in 35-degree temperatures, the Packers sweated in 72-degree heat in LA Sunday...BOEDECKER TO EAGLES: The Packers, training at Mission Inn, were more than a little disgusted when they heard that Referee Ross Bowen said that the officials ruled incorrectly on the Packer punt which Ram tackle Bob Reinhard blocked in the second quarter. The ball bounded up, hit a goal post and Ram end Larry Brink pounced on the ball in the Packer end zone. It was ruled a touchdown, but the Packers protested vehemently and Coach Ronzani came storming out on the field. The officials went into their own huddle, and reversed the original call, ruling it a safety. But Referee Bowen volunteered Monday that the first call (a touchdown) was correct but the final score remains - Rams 51, Packers 14. The Packers also learned that halfback Bill Boedeker, released two weeks ago, has been signed by the Philadelphia Eagles as a replacement for Toy Ledbetter, who has been called into service. The Packers previously had obtained Boedeker from the Cleveland Browns.



1950 Greatest Season in NFL: Bell; Eight Clubs Finish in Black

1950 GREATEST SEASON IN NFL: BELL; EIGHT CLUBS FINISH IN BLACK

DEC 6 (Philadelphia) - A jovial Bert Bell asserted Tuesday that this has been "the greatest season in NFL history." The rotund, \$30,000-a-year professional football czar, making no secret of his joy over the probability both NFL divisions may wind up in ties, called attention to the closeness of the races, the balance of the teams and the coins jingling in the pockets of the club owners. This season marks the first since the end of a bitter, four-year war between rival pro football leagues, a war that swelled salaries and bonuses for football players, and brought financial headaches for club owners. Now all is peaceful in the professional football world. The All America conference is no more and the NFL has been expanded from 10 to 13 teams. An NFL spokesman, who declined use of his name, said at least eight teams will wind up the 1950 season in the black and that only three will lose money. Two others - the New York Giants and San Francisco 49ers will just about break even. This, the spokesman said, is in sharp contrast to recent seasons, when nearly all clubs in both leagues suffered heavy financial losses. The spokesman named the 1950 money losers as the New York Yanks, Baltimore Colts and Los Angeles Rams. Los Angles, which already had clinched at least a tie for the National conference title, however, will not lose much, he said. A television contract covers most of the Rams' losses. This means

that eight teams wound up on the profit side of the ledger. The spokesman would not say, however, how much money these teams made. They are Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Washington, Cleveland, Detroit, Green Bay and both Chicago teams, the Cardinals and Bears. Bell would say nothing about the league plans for next year, which will be decided at the annual meeting after the championship game, which will be played either at New York or Cleveland. There has been rumors that Baltimore and/or Green Bay may surrender its NFL franchise. Other cities, notably Buffalo and Houston, are anxious to become members. What action will be taken on applications will not be made public until the league meeting. Packer officials at Green Bay shrugged off the loss of franchise rumors as "just some more of that eastern talk." "They don't have to worry about us," commented Emil R. Fischer, club president. "We've been around this league a lot longer than most of the other clubs and we'll be in it next year and a good many more." The Packers drew 118,621 fans to six home games this year, an attendance gain of over 32,000 over the 1949 season. Snow cut the expected crowd at the home finale with San Francisco on Nov. 26 by about 7,000, with the gate announced as 13,196. The club played four games at Green Bay and two in Milwaukee this year, compared with an even split of three each at the two cities last season. Before the windup here two weeks ago, Fischer declared the Packers were in "the best financial condition in our history", and that the club was in the "best shape it's ever been."

INJURIES WEAKEN PACK FOR 'FRISCO

DEC 6 (San Francisco) - Trainer Bud Jorgenson is working overtime at the Packer training camp near here. The Bays came out of their bruising battle with the Los Angeles Rams with 10 or 12 assorted injuries and four of them are in the serious class - so serious, in fact, that they may see little action in the Packers' NFL finale against the Forty Niners Sunday afternoon. Most damaging to the team is the leg sprain suffered by pass defender Alex Wizbicki, who went out of action in the second quarter. It was after Alex went out that the Rams soaked the air with passes – not to mention five touchdown throws. Others hurt include fullback Ted Fritsch, knee; halfback Larry Coutre, leg bruise; and Steve Pritko, leg bruise. Fritsch developed knee trouble in the Lion game in Detroit and Jorgenson "snapped" it into position on the sidelines and Ted was able to continue on kickoffs, extra points, etc. Out in Los Angeles, Fritsch was unable to continue and Clayton Tonnemaker, the rookie backerup, kicked the last extra point – his first in major league football. Clayton likely will be asked to do the kicking if Fritsch fails to respond Sunday. Both Coutre and Pritko probably will be ready for action against the Forty Niners. The Frisco team roughed up Coutre pretty good in the game in Green Bay Nov. 26, and he might have been weakened some for the Ram tilt. Pritko's injury could be damaging since he plays both right and left end on defense or offense...Billy Grimes, presently observing the birth of his third son, is the only Packer listed among the first 10 players in National league statistics released today. Grimes ranks 10th among the ground gainers but has the best average, 5.9 per try. Bill has carried the ball only 81 times but tacked up 479 yards. Marion Motley of Cleveland leads the ground gainers with 762 yards in 136 attempts. Grimes ranks second among the punt returners with 29 returns for 555 yards – an average of 19.1 per runback. Herb Rich of Baltimore has the top average, 24.9, but has returned only 11 for 274 yards. Norm Van Brocklin

of Los Angeles, with his season completed, is leading the passers with an average gain of 8.85 yards on 127 completions in 233 attempts for 2,061 yards. He has thrown 18 TD passes. Van Brocklin's battery mate, Tom Fears, tops the receivers with 84 catches for 1,116 yards. Doak Walker of Detroit tops the scorers with 125 points – just 13 short of Don Hutson's all-time record of 138.

TONNEMAKER, GRIMES PLACED ON NY PAPER'S 'ALL' TEAMS

DEC 6 (Green Bay) - Annually, this department has participated in the selection of the New York Daily News' all-pro football team. And almost annually, the votes from the metropolitan areas of the east seemed to have kicked out our usual two, three or four Packer choices into the street. But we struck gold this year. Two Packers made the first team — Billy Grimes on the offensive lineup and Clayton Tonnemaker in the defensive squad. Giant Ed



Neal landed on the second defensive unit. Hy Turkin, Daily News sports editor, in his story on the team, reported that Grimes beat out the Philadelphia Eagles' Steve Van Buren for one of the halfback spots because of his many power drives outside tackle and around the ends. Joining Grimes in the top offensive backfield are Pittsburgh's Joe Geri at halfback, Cleveland's Marion Motley at fullback and the Chicago Bears' Johnny Lujack at quarterback. Others on the first offensive team are Tom Fears, Rams, and Mac Speedie, Browns, ends; Dick Huffman, Rams, and George Connor, Bears, tackles; Dick Barwegan, Bears, and Frank Kilroy, Philadelphia, guards; and Johnny Hapacz, New York Giants, center...This Tonnemaker really must be in a class by himself. All of the 50-odd ballots contained his name for a linebacker spot on the first defensive squad. Clayton, 22, was the only rookie to make either of the first teams. The other linebacker selected as Tonnemaker's crashing mate was Joe Muha, the Eagle veteran...The first string defensive backs, or outfielders, working behind Tonnemaker and Muha are the Giants' Otto Schnellbacher, Detroit's Don Doll, and the New York Yanks' Specs Sanders. This trio intercepted a total of 33 passes through last Sunday's games, with Doll and Sanders getting a dozen each. The defensive line is composed of Ray Poole, Giants, and Ed Sprinkle, Bears, ends; Arnie Weinmeister, Giants, and Bob Reinhard, Rams, tackles; and Ray Bray, Bears, and Bill Willis, Browns, guards. We would have liked to see the Packers' Bob Forte working as a linebacker with Tonnemaker, rather than Muha. Forte has been playing both left and right linebacker in the last four games. He's deadly on wide runs and can jam up stuff coming straight at him. Two hundred and 75-pound Neal was a good possibility for either offensive or defensive first-team spots. While Neal has trouble on the long pass back on punts, he's a bulwark of strength on offense, giving the quarterback absolute safety. Behind him, a quarterback sneak is

a cinch for two or three yards...Having seen Rapacz, the first string offensive center, only once (the Packer-Giant non-looper which was won by Green Bay, 10-0), we don't feel qualified to argue on the merits of Rapacz. But, in that one game, Neal seemed to have much the better of the argument...The second team offensive backfield is composed of the Yanks' George Ratterman at quarterback, Van Buren and Detroit's Doak Walker at halfbacks, and Dick Hoerner of the Rams at fullback. The linemen are: Bob Shaw, Cardinals, and Pete Pihos, Eagles, ends; Lou Rymkus, Browns, and Al Wistert, Eagles, tackles; Lin Houston, Browns, and John Mastrangelo, Giants, guards; and Bob Naumetz, Rams, center. Working with Neal at guard on the defensive second team is Les Bingaman of Detroit.

John Torinus, a member of the Packer executive committee, Wednesday scotched rumors in the east that the Packers might surrender their NFL franchise when the annual meeting rolls around after the championship game this month. "The only reason for our folding would be finances," Torinus told the Associated Press. "And we don't have any financial problems at all. We're busy now on season tickets and player plans for next year. We're in the league to stay." The best financial condition in the club's 32-year history, Torinus called it. "We have more than \$100,000 in cash from our fund drive last year still not touched. We'll not only pay all expenses out of this year's gate receipts, but we'll have a little left over." President Emil Fischer was just as optimistic. "They don't have to worry about us when they start talking about trimming the 13th member of the league," he added. "We've been around this league a lot longer than most of the other clubs and we'll be in it next year and good many more, too." For a club with a record of three wins and eight losses and only one game to go that's pretty confident talk. And remember how things were this time last year? For the second time in their history, the Packers faced a major financial crisis. But the folks in this smallest town in the league rallied around when a drive for funds was started. An intra-squad game was played in a Thanksgiving Day snowstorm. A whirlwind campaign was started to sell stock in the non-profit corporation which operates the club. When the drive wound up the Packers had \$100,000 in cash - the money Torinus said they haven't even touched. The Packers reported that home attendance for six NFL games and three exhibitions was 40,037 above the figure for the same number of games in 1949. The report from the Packers front office revealed that 152,000 fans attended the nine games this season, compared with 111,693 last year. The 1950 figures were based on one exhibition and four league games here, and two league games and one exhibition in

Milwaukee, and an intra-squad game in Kingsford, Michigan. The 1949 totals included one exhibition and three league games both here and at Milwaukee and an intra-squad tilt at Marinette. Attendance at the six league games jumped, too, by 28,503. The split of the three games each between here and Milwaukee last year drew 86,987, compared with 115,400 for four here and two at Milwaukee. Previous Packer attendance stories, based on figures announced in the press box during the games, had showed the league games drawing 118,621 this year, compared with 104,832 in 1949. A Packer spokeman said the figures announced are based on official reports to the league.



John Torinus, a member of the Packer executive committee, speaking in the absence of President Emil R. Fischer, stated: "The only reason for our folding would be finances, and we don't have any financial problems at all. We're busy now on season tickets and players plans for next year. We're in the league to stay." Torinus called it the best financial condition in the club's 32-year history. "We have more than \$100,000 in cash from our fund drive last year still not touched. We'll not only pay all expenses out of this year's gate receipts, but we'll have a little left over." Fischer, at the time of the Baltimore spurt, said: "They don't have to worry about us when they start talking about trimming off the 13th member of the league." He added: "We've been around this league a lot longer than most of the other clubs and we'll be in it next year and a good many more, too." Ticket plans for the Packers' 1951 season already have been started with the sale of Christman and birthday gift certificates. The purchaser can buy a season "certificate" for four game in any of the three price brackets. In announcing their gift plans, the Packers revealed that four National league games will be played here next fall and two will be played in Milwaukee...SAN FRANCISCO: The Packers launched the offensive phase at their practice near here today in preparation for the 1950 NFL finale against the Forty Niners in Kezar stadium Sunday afternoon. Head Coach Gene Ronzani is anxious to finish the season with a rush of touchdowns – especially after being held to two by the Los Angeles Rams last Sunday. While the Forty Niners hold edges on the Bays in yards passing and rushing, the Packer have outscored the Frisco club, 230 points to 188, and 32 touchdowns to 25. The Bays made 20 of their teedees by rushing while the Forty Niners scored 13 by rushing. Each club counted a dozen in the air. Of the Packers' 12 air TDs, Paul Christman, the veteran quarterback, hurled seven of them and rookie OB Tobin Rote got the rest. The Forty Niners' ace quarterback, Frankie Albert, hurled all 12 of their air scores. On the defensive side, the Forty Niners held an advantage over the Packers. The Frisco team permitted 286 points while the Packers allowed 376 – 96 to the Rams in two games. Packer opponents have gained a total of 4,283 points while Forty Niner foes picked up 3,629.

It is indicated that this will be the final game for one of the grandest guys and greatest players of the last ten years. The angle is this. Standlee played his final college game for Clark Shaughnessy. He will be playing his final professional game against a team Shaughnessy helped to prepare for the season as backfield coach. Standlee's last game with Stanford was in the Rose Bowl against Nebraska, dropping the curtain on the first fabulous T-formation team in college football history. Shaughnessy, Standlee



and Frankie Albert launched a trend or era that persists to this day. Probably none of the three realized at the time the impact that team and that season would have on football. But, getting back to the Rose Bowl game itself, Standlee was so seriously injured he could make only a token contributors to the Stanford cause. Yet, Shaughnessy used him as the central theme of a clever piece of propaganda. He talked Standlee constantly - his tremendous power and speed, an unstoppable battering ram. Clark was particularly eloquent when Nebraska newspapermen were around, especially Cy Sherman from Lincoln, who bestowed the name of Cornhuskers on the Nebraska team and was a potent force throughout the state. Finally, at last, Shaughnessy knew he had accomplished his goal. Every Nebraska newspaper headlined, "Husker set defense to stop Standlee". They did - and Hugh Gallarneau, Pete Kmetovic and Albert's passing arm had a field day. It was not until the middle of the first half that Nebraska coaches realized they had been duped and that the Big Chief was virtually helpless. Then it was too late except for hasty patchwork on a firmly planted defense...Returning once again to Shaughnessy, he is no longer with the Green Bay Packers. His contract extended until August 1, and then, as Head Coach Gene Ronzani puts it, he "flew the coop". He was lured away by a fatter paycheck offered by his long time friend, George Halas of the Chicago Bears. "He did a good job with us, and I was sorry to see him go," Ronzani added. Canadeo 16 Yards Shy Of New Ground Record

CANADEO 16 YARDS SHY OF NEW GROUND RECORD

DEC 8 (San Francisco) - The Packers' Tony Canadeo gets his last chance of the 1950 season to break Clarke Hinkle's all-time Packer ground-gaining record when the Packers meet the San Francisco Forty Niners in Kezar stadium here Sunday afternoon. Canadeo needs but 16 yards to crack Hinkle's mark of 3,860 yards, which stood for 10 seasons, and become the league's No. 2 all-time ground gainer. Hinkle's 3,860 ranks him second behind the Philadelphia Eagles' Steve Van Buren,

who has 5,492 yards through last Sunday's game. Tony was limited to 11 yards in five tries against the Rams in Los Angeles last Sunday. He lost a 20-yard gain in the first quarter when a penalty nullified the run. Canadeo, in 11 games this season, gained 217 yards in 85 trips for an average of 2.6 - below his all-time average of around 4.5. Somehow, Marion Motley, the big Cleveland fullback, enters Canadeo's fight. But the question is whether or not Motley's gains, nearly all of which were made in the defunct All-America conference, will be counted in the NFL figures. At any rate, Motley is only 75 yards way from the runnerup spot himself and, on the basis of what the two men have shown this year, has as good a make that much to Washington on Sunday. As of now, Canadeo has gained 3,845 yards in his nine year pro career, while Motley has ground out 3,786 yards in five years. Each has passed the all-time No. 3 runner, Cliff Battles of Boston and Washington, who retired in 1937 after six years with a total of 3,542 yards. Both now are shooting at the 3,860 yards Hinkle rolled up for the Packers over the 10-year span from 1932 through 1941. Van Buren's seven-yard figure is, of course, out of reach of either man at the moment. The Eagle ace had 4,904 yards at the end of last season and has picked up 588 more this year for a 5,492 yard total. He, too, has one game to go this year against the New York



Giants. Canadeo, running from the unaccustomed fullback post, has had a mediocre season after pounding out more than 1,000 yards last year. In his last two outings, he's gained only 29 yards - 18 against San Francisco in the snow at Green Bay two weeks ago and 11 against Los Angeles. The old "grey ghost of Gonzaga" will be wearing Green Bay's Green and Gold for the 90th time on Sunday...The Packers move into San Francisco after a workout Saturday morning. They're practicing at Sonoma Springs, about 35 miles northeast of San Francisco. Coach Gene Ronzani is far from optimistic about Sunday's game - the 1950 finale for both clubs. The Packers may be operating without two crack defensemen, Alex Wizbicki and Steve Pritko. If Wizbicki and Pritko play, they will be operating well below their usual efficiency.

49ERS SET FOR FINALE

DEC 8 (San Francisco) - Rain prevented both the San Francisco 49ers and the Green Bay Packers from training yesterday for their Sunday professional "concluder" in Kezar Stadium. But reports from both camps were good. The Buck Shaws looked at pictures of their 25-21 defeat at Green Bay two weeks ago and shivered about the white Sunday they had gone through. Meanwhile, Coach Shaw declared that two of his injured will be ready for the Packers - Alex Loyd, pass snagging end, and Jimmy Cason, Louisiana State halfback who can play offense or defense. The Packers lolled around Sonoma Mission Inn, praying for sunshine and resting from the beating they got from the Los Angeles Rams last Sunday in Los Angeles.

PRO GRID LOOP FINALS SUNDAY

DEC 8 (New York) - The string runs out on the NFL's regular schedule tomorrow, but three key games must determine whether some playoff-for-payoff competition will be necessary. Could be that the Cleveland Browns and the New York Giants will remain tied for the American Conference lead after their respective games tomorrow, and that the Chicago Bears will draw even with the idle Los Angeles Rams in the National Conference. That is anticipated, in fact. The Browns visit the Washington Redskins, whose veteran of 14 years in pro football - Sammy Baugh - still is playing hard with his passes. Two weeks ago, during a blizzard at Green Bay, Wisconsin, the Packers came from behind to whip the 49ers in their first league meeting since the National combined with the now erased All America Conference. The teams have been prepping for this one like it was the championship. In reality, it is just a football game between a team that has won three and lost eight, that's Green Bay, and the team that is holding it up from the dank depths, the 49ers, with two wins and nine defeats...LITTLE TO CHOOSE: Since there is so little to choose between their records, this should be a whaleuva scrap and it will be enhanced because it is Chief Norm Standlee Day. A lot of friends of the big fullback have gathered money, clothing, liquor and dozens of other gifts to present to the hardworking 49er fullback, including an automobile, brand new. If only the Baltimore Colts, who are holding up the 49ers, who are holding up the Packers in the National Conference of the National League, could be present, it would be a great day for the underdogs. Except that Standlee, moving from defense to his old bull-rushing job on attack, is no underdog. Just a smart enough guy to retire while he's still near his peak. One of San Francisco's two victories was over Baltimore. And one of the several losses the Packers suffered was at the hands of the Colts...ROTE DUELS ALBERT: Frankie Albert, the tough, smart little field general of the locals, will be opposed today by Tobin Rote, a 6 foot, 3 inch, 200 pound quarterback from Rice Institute, and by old Paul Christman, still a passing genius from Old Mizzou. The ace ball packer of the invaders is right half Billy Grimes of Oklahoma A&M. He's averaged six yards on 81 carries, run back a pair of punts for touchdowns, including an 85 yarder, and has averaged 23 yards hauling back kickoffs. Grimes alternates with Larry Coutre, last year at Notre Dame. An old familiar face will be presented by Tony Canadeo, a nine year veteran.
